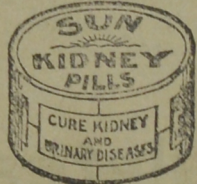

VERY IMPOSING

Was the Military Display at Roosevelt's Inauguration.

ROUGH RIDERS AND PICK OF THE ARMY

Escorted President to the Capitol.

Washington, March 4.—The White House was astir earlier than usual this morning, and after breakfast the President's household began earlier active preparations for the day's important events. The time set for the assembling of the cabinet and the presidential escort was nine thirty o'clock, but the arrivals began nearly a half hour earlier. The first of the cabinet to reach the White House was Postmaster General Wynne. He was soon followed by Attorney General Moody, Secretaries Hitchcock, Hay, Taft, McCall and Morton. Secretary Shaw walked over from the Treasury with Jacob Riis, a personal friend of the president from New York. About the same time Senators Spooner, Bacon and Lodge, and Republicans Baisell, Williams and Crumpacker, members of the Congressional Joint Inaugural Committee, arrived in carriages about nine thirty.

In the meantime the troops to serve as the president's escort, had formed on Pennsylvania Avenue and the adjacent streets, ready to fall in at the sound of the bugle. At ten o'clock the president entered his carriage drawn by four bay horses and with a detachment of his old regiment, the famous Rough Riders, commanded by Col. Alex. Brodie, riding on either side, as his personal escort, started for the Capitol, to take the prescribed oath as the Nation's Chief Executive.

The president was seated on the right, rear seat of the carriage, and to his left sat Senator Spooner, chairman of the Congressional Inauguration Committee, while facing

him on the front seat was Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, and Republican Dalsell of Pennsylvania.

Vice-President Eliot Fairbank's carriage followed the president's carriage, with him being seated Senator Bacon of Georgia, and representatives Crumpacker of Indiana and John Sharp Williams of Mississippi. Then followed the carriages of the cabinet.

It was a stirring spectacle when into Pennsylvania Avenue to the strains of "El Capitan," the presidential cavalcade swept along past the Treasury Building, there to be met by a mighty roar, which was kept up by the thousands who lined the way to the Capitol. From every flag pole and window American flags stirred in the stiff breeze of the March morning, and crowds, the densest that ever lined historic Pennsylvania Avenue and its debouching side streets, waved welcome with flags and banners. The magnificent boulevard, was cleared from curb to curb its full width and the president and his escort was seen at their best.

Lieut. General Chaffee, the Grand Marshal of the day, accompanied by Brig. General John O. Johnson, headed the General Staff of the Army, the first time this splendid body of military genius has participated in an inauguration. Directly behind the General came the "Color Guard", composed of four cadets from the military academy and four midshipmen from Annapolis. The staff was composed of eight officers of high rank, and they in turn were followed by eight special aides wearing blue silk sashes.

The came the pick of the Empire State soldiery, Squadron A., splendidly mounted and preceded by their own band. These were greeted with applause, which swelled into a mighty ovation, as President Roosevelt was seen by the multitude in an open landau drawn by four shining bay steeds. Most of the time he was hatless and bowing constantly to the right and left in answer to the tumultuous applause.

Surrounding the carriage as he rode down the avenue were thirty picked men clad in khaki chosen from the famous Rough Riders commanded by Col. Alexander Brodie. Behind the Rough Riders were the carriages of the Vice-President and the Cabinet and then came a reminder of the grim past, a detachment of veterans of the Spanish-American war, of men who had taken part in the march to Peking, and of soldiers who had fought in the Philippines. Closing the escorting column came the Veterans of the regular army and navy, the whole veteran organization led by Major General Oliver O. Howard.

The President's carriage, surrounded by his personal escort and preceded

by Grand Marshal Chaffee, and the "Color Guards," left the line of march at B. Street and Delaware Avenue escorting the party to the Senate wing of the Capitol. The more military character of the return from the Capitol as contrasting with the march to the Capitol was due in part to the fact that the old veterans who followed the President on foot in the morning bade him farewell at the Capitol and their places were taken by the mounted officers on the staff of the Grand Marshal and their special address. The military grand division of the procession came after the Rough Riders.

Major General Jas. F. Wade as chief military aide with a splendidly uniformed staff representing each staff corps of the army led the div-

ision. Foremost in the line was the West Point cadets and the Middles. The midshipmen surprised everybody and gave the West Pointers the hardest contest they ever had for first place in the parade. In their wake came the Revenue Marine Cadets, a new feature in the inaugural parade. Splendidly drilled army engineers were represented by the Second Battalion, Major Burr commanding, and as the men marched in files of twenty double ranks in perfect alignment they received unlimited applause. The pick of the army had been chosen for this splendid procession, so that while the representation from each branch of the service was small it was beyond question the finest body of troops ever gathered on Pennsylvania Avenue.

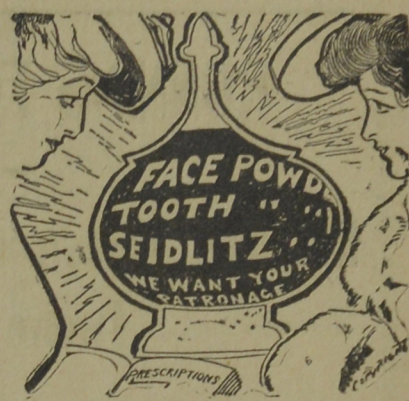

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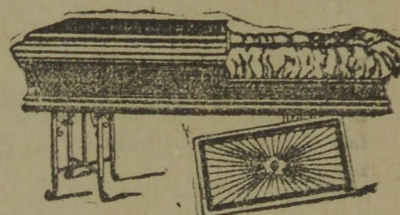
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
