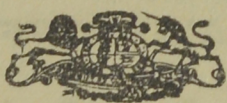

EASTER IN THE CHURCHES.

Appropriate Services, Excellent Music and Large Congregations.

The weather yesterday was fine and bright, but quite a strong wind prevailed which made it a trifle cool out of doors for comfort. Still, there was no cause for complaint and the ladies, both old and young, had an excellent opportunity to display their Easter finery and were happy in consequence.

The day was most fittingly observed in all the churches of the city, and the seating capacity of most of them was taxed to its fullest capacity both morning and evening. The choirs rendered special programs of Easter music and the services were of a character quite in keeping with the celebration of one of the most glorious events in the history of the human race.

At the cathedral the services as usual were of a most impressive character and attracted large congregations. The choir, under the leadership of Prof. Powell, rendered a splendid program of music, which included the anthems "Awake my Glory," and "Who Shall Roll Away the Stone?" The Lord Bishop preached at the morning service and Rev. Sub-Dean Street occupied the pulpit in the evening. The interior of the edifice was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

At the Methodist church the pulpit was occupied at both services by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Rogers. There were large congregations and all were delighted with the splendid musical programs rendered by the choir. In the evening Mr. L. A. Wilnot, Le-mont who lately returned from Boston, treated the congregation to an organ prelude of his own composition. The selections by the choir included the anthems "King of Kings" and "Christ is Risen," and solos by Mr. E. H. Ley. The program was most creditable to the choir and its efficient instructor, Mr. Frank Harrison. The pulpit platform was banked with plants and flowers from Miss Schleyer's conservatory.

At St. Paul's church the pastor, Rev. Willard Macdonald occupied the pulpit at both services, and drew many lessons on the subject of the

resurrection. The choir, under Miss Everett's leadership, rendered the beautiful anthem, "They Have Taken Away My Lord," at the morning service, and at the evening service gave "The Day is Past and Over," with tenor and soprano obligato by Mr. Edney and Miss Kelly. For a vocal solo Miss Maud McKee sang "The Resurrection Morn" in her usual exquisite style.

The Baptist church was crowded at both services yesterday. Rev. J. H. Macdonald preached both morning and evening and his sermons were most interesting and appropriate. The pulpit platform was banked with potted plants, palms, calla lilies, etc., and made a most attractive appearance. Mr. McKee presided at the organ and a splendid musical program was carried out by the choir. The selections at the evening service included "Grander Than Ocean's Story," by a quartette composed of Mrs. F. A. Good, Mrs. H. B. McDonald, (Chatham), Mr. F. L. Cooper and Mr. G. W. Adams.

Large congregations attended the Easter services at the Free Baptist church and listened to able and appropriate sermons by Pastor Ride-out. The choir rendered a splendid musical program, which was greatly enjoyed.

The Easter services at St. Dunstan's church yesterday were, as usual, of a very interesting and impressive character and attracted large congregations. The interior of the edifice was nicely decorated with plants and flowers and presented a very attractive appearance. Rev. Father Hannigan was the preacher at both morning services. A splendid program of Easter music, was presented by the choir, Miss Hanlon presiding at the organ.

The services at St. Ann's church morning and evening attracted large and interested congregations. Mrs. Cameron presided at the organ and the music was of a very high order. Rector Roberts preached at the morning service and Rev. Mr. Forster in the evening.

NAN PATTERSON WITNESS.

A Chicago man Says he Saw Caesar Young Kill Himself.

Chicago, April 22.—Samuel E. Eisenberg, the Russian Jewish coat maker, who has told of seeing a man kill himself while in a cab with a woman, June 24, 1904, on West Broadway, New York, expressed willingness today to go to New York and testify on the witness stand in the case of Nan Patterson.

"The cab in which Young and Nan Patterson sat passed within five feet of me," said Eisenberg. "The man appeared drunk and he appeared to be fighting with the woman. She was clinging tightly to his hands. The cab was moving very slowly, and the woman said something to the driver, as if to tell him to go faster. He cracked his whip and the horse went faster."

the woman's lap. The woman seemed to faint because her head fell on his shoulder."

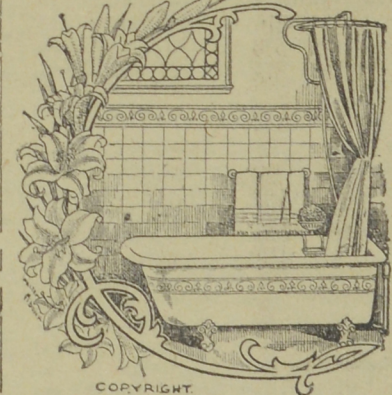
