Messrs. Babbitt Kindly Remembered by Late Employees of the Firm.

On Saturday evening a genuine surprise party took place at the home of Mr. T. D. Babbitt, of Gibson, when a large number of the former employees of the late lumber firm of Messrs. T. E. and T. D. Babbitt of that place assembled with their wives and some friends, and presented to Messrs. Babbitt the address below, and to each of the gentlemen a handsome silver mounted cane.

Rev. W. R. Robinson, by request of the men, read the address and made the presentation.

The Messrs. Babbitt, as well as many of the men, were visibly affected by the thought of severing the old ties which had for so many years bound their interests together.

Mr. T. D. Babbitt very feelingly replied, cordially welcoming the men and their friends to his home, and thanking them for their handsome gift and kind words of appreciation. In all the years as an employer of labor he never had to discharge a man from his employ.

Mr. T. E. Babbitt, the senior member of the firm, delivered a most eloquent and happy speech, pointing out the true interest of employer and employee. If they had given the men an opportunity to earn their living, they—the men—had by their labor earned money for the firm, the interest of one being bound up in the interest of the other. Both gentlemen were loudly applauded.
