

UMPIRE ADVISED HOW TO BEHAVE.

Tip O'Neill Tells Them to Soak the Home Team.

Cleveland, June 13.—President Tip O'Neill of the Western League, and Joe Cantillon, owner of the Des Moines Club, of that organization, are business partners in Chicago. "About nine out of every ten of the protests against the umpires that come to me are from Joe," said O'Neill the other day. "Those from Joe I read as far as 'We were robbed.' Then I throw them in the waste basket. But they keep coming."

One of the players asked O'Neill what he did about protests against umpires in general.

"Oh," said Tip. "I investigate, and if I find the umpire soaked the home team I either advance his salary or write him a nice letter of congratulations. If I find he gave the visiting team the worst of it I call him down. Any kind of an umpire can be fair with the home team. It takes a regular Silk O'Loughlin to give the visiting team a fair show."

"Tip" was an interested spectator at the Cleveland-Chicago games. "All sorts of problems come up to bother and perplex the president of a league," said he. "What, for instance, would you do, or, rather, how would you discipline a player, who in trying to hit an umpire with a stone missed that official and hit the second baseman, putting that player out of business for three weeks?"

"What will you do about it?" someone asked.

"I don't know," said O'Neill. "I first thought I would find the man \$50 for the assault, but I rather

think I shall suspend him for poor control."

"I regard it as a calamity that the umpires in the National League have allowed certain rowdy players to go as far as they have," says Umpire Silk O'Loughlin. "It is also to be regretted that there are players in the old organization who still cling to the wayback notion that aggressive ball playing means the spiking or assaulting of other players. Aggressive ball playing is all right so long as it is clean. It is best exemplified by running to and from the field between innings, by running out every ball hit into fair territory; by going after everything regardless of errors, and by never laying down until twenty-seven men have been retired. I am glad that there is such splendid good feeling between the players in the American League. It makes it possible for any man to take his wife, mother, daughter or sweetheart to one of our games in full confidence that she will hear and see nothing to shock her."

O'Loughlin's remarks regarding the safety of a "sweetheart or wife" at an American League game may have something to do with a certain application for a leave of absence now on file in President Johnson's office in Chicago.

"Going to make the honeymoon trip around the circuit?" someone asked Silk.

"And let her hear what the gang in certain cities think of her. Al beloved!" replied the arbitrator. "Not me. No we'll go to some place where the impression that the man of the house is a pretty good fellow will not be disturbed."

WALKS WITH A BROKEN NECK.

Painter Fractured Cervical Vertebrae

Chicago, June 14.—Doctors at the Cook County Hospital are amazed at the case of a patient who arrived in the institution a few days back and calmly announced that his neck was twisted. He was holding his head in an upright position, with one hand on either side of it. The superintendent had him taken to the emergency ward, where an examination was made. It was found that the visitor's neck was broken. He told the doctor that his head felt heavy but otherwise he was feeling tip-top. The doctor says he probably will live.

The patient had walked half a mile to a street car, and made his way to the hospital alone, all the time bracing his head with his hands. His name is Benjamin Quinette, and he is a painter living at Canal and Randolph Streets.

Quinette and several other men were at work painting a building, when suddenly he tripped over a paint pail and fell to the ground, a distance of fifteen feet. He was struck on the head and lay unconscious for ten minutes.

After recovering consciousness he insisted on resuming work, but his friends told him he had better go to his home. He took a Milwaukee Avenue car to 231 Milwaukee Avenue, where he told Contractor Scanlon, his employer, that he was unable to work. Scanlon advised him to go to the hospital.

In telling the story to Assistant Superintendent Colwell of the hospital, Quinette said that he felt occasional sharp pains in his back and neck, but experienced no other discomfort. He did not seem to realize the critical nature of his injuries.

Absence of paralysis, which usually accompanies a fracture of the vertebrae, Dr. Dilling says, is an encouraging feature in Quinette's case, and, unless complications set in, his recovery will be a matter of only a few weeks' rest at the hospital. He suffered a fracture and dislocation of the cervical vertebrae.

His temperature last night was 100. He rested easily and made no complaints, talking with the attendants freely about his case. Quinette is unmarried and is about forty years of age.

AN ACCOMMODATING GUEST.

Agreed to Marry Man Jilted on His Wedding Night.

Baltimore, Md., June 14.—When Mrs. Ida M. Gosnell did not appear at the home of Calvin E. Oler on Thursday night at the time set for her wedding to John C. As the jollification was drawing to a close it was announced that Mr. Oler had made other matrimonial arrangements. Miss Annie W. Higgins, one of the guests had agreed to heal his wounded feelings and another marriage certificate was obtained as soon as the Court House opened. After the marriage ceremony another feast was provided.

STOLE HUNDRED THOUSAND.

New York Steamer Thief Made Enormous Haul.

Boston, June 12.—A robbery, involving the loss of \$120,000 in securities by Henry W. Comstock of Boston, which occurred on board the Steamer Puritan during her trip from New York to Fall River last night, was reported to Chief Warrs in the Bureau of Criminal Investigation in this city today. The securities, which included twenty-two certificates of stock of various railroads and in the United States Steel Corporation, were taken from under a pillow in Mr. Comstock's stateroom by someone, who, it is believed, climbed in the window.

The valuable documents were received by Mr. Comstock in a business

transaction at a New York hotel on

Saturday, and it is suspected that someone who witnessed the incident followed the man on board the boat and then committed the robbery.

Shortly after Mr. Comstock had reached the city he received a telegram from New York informing him that he could regain his lost property by paying a suitable amount of cash. The whole case was placed in the hands of the police, together with a list of the missing securities.

JAPANESE BARRED.

Admiral Evans Found Former Servant a Naval Captain.

New York, June 14.—A despatch to The Sun from Baltimore says: When the Hornet, the flagship of the naval reserves, arrived here Saturday, she had aboard a Japanese chef who is said to have been adept in preparing palatable dishes. Yesterday before the Hornet started out for the war game the chef left the vessel.

It developed that the Navy Department has issued an order for the removal of all foreigners from the fleet during the manoeuvres. This order was directed especially against the Japanese, of whom there are quite a number in the ward and mess room of the American warships.

The order was the result of a story told by Admiral Evans upon his return from the Asiatic station. Upon paying an official visit to a Japanese battleship the Admiral was surprised to find in the commander a clever little Jap who had been his servant when he was a captain. This

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opened the eyes of the Navy Department to the methods used by the Japs to learn the secrets of naval warfare.

NIGHTMARE HURLED HIM TO DEATH.

Wealthy New Yorker Jumps From Fourth Story Window in Terror.

New York, June 14.—Springing from his bed in delirium of fear caused by nightmare, Carl A. Claussen, a wealthy broker, plunged through his bedroom window and dashed to earth on the stone paved roadway four stories below.

His skull was crushed and he was dead when a watchman, roused by the crash, found the body.

Claussen was fifty-six years old

his wife and son, with whom he lived, say his business was prosperous and that he was independently situated.

Mrs. Claussen was awakened when her husband jumped from the bed, and turned just in time to see him go through the window. Her scream aroused their sixteen-year-old son, and together they rushed down stairs to find the watchman bending over Claussen's dead body.

Claussen had been a member of the Produce Exchange for more than twenty years. He was an active dealer in grain for shipment and was popular personally.

BOY SWIMMER BROKE RECORDS.

Kiernan, an Australian Prodigy, Cannot Be Beaten, it is Claimed.

San Francisco, June 14.—Not since the days when they turned out one world-beaten oarsman after another have the Australians been as enthusiastic as they are at the present time over Bernard B. Kiernan, the phenomenal young swimmer. They think he is unbeatable at any distance from 200 yards up to one mile, and has not as yet found an opponent able to make him extend himself. He is going to England to compete in swimming contests.

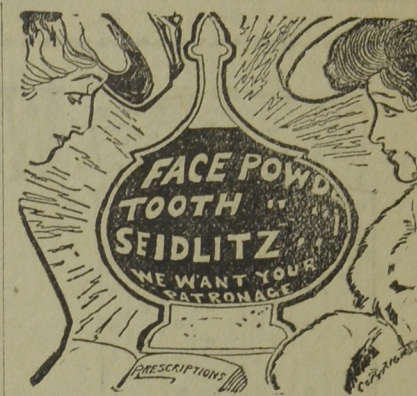

After the wedding the two brides received their friends and will continue to reside here. Mrs. Stacey's two former husbands still live near Manila, Ark.



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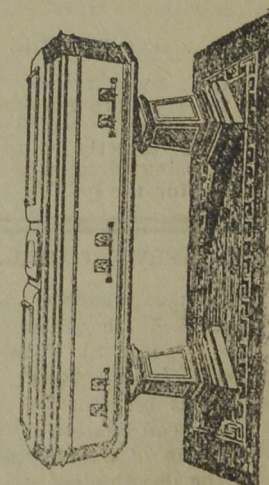
