Authorities at Amherst Have Prior Claim.

William Smith, the man who stole the horse from Archibald Staples at Amherst last week, and also the medals from Private Monk, of the B. C. R., appeared in court this morning. Application was made yesterday to Colonel Marsh by the Chief of Police at Amherst to hold Smith here until sent for by them.

Complying with their request, Col. Marsh this morning remanded Smith to jail until Saturday afternoon at three o'clock in order to allow the authorities at Amherst time to forward the necessary documents.

This morning Officer Rideout received a wire from Mr. M. Atkinson, a resident of Moncton, who was then on his way to St. Andrews, via McAdam, asking if Smith had in his possession an English waterproof grey coat which was stolen from him at Moncton.

Smith denies this charge. The medals were given back to Pte. Monk who did not prosecute.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

Judge Barker to be Chairman of the Restigouche Boom Commission.

The local government, presided over by Premier Tweedie, were in session in their rooms in St. John last night. They have been holding frequent meetings of late keeping well up with the transaction of the business of the province.

There was not much but routine last night, the only special matter being consideration of the commissioners to be appointed on matters in connection with the Restigouche Boom Company as provided for at the last session of the legislature. The names of the commissioners will be gazetted in a few days. It has already been announced that Judge Barker will be chairman of the commission.

On arriving there he sought the aid of Detective Power. The detective soon found the missing girl, who was staying with a friend. The girl and her father left for their home on Tuesday afternoon.

THE U. N. B.

Prof. Edwards Declines the Chair of Engineering.

Dr. Harrison, of the U. N. B., has been disappointed in securing the services of Professor Edwards for the engineering chair. That gentleman has decided that the salary is too small and has consequently declined the position. Applications are invited from Harvard, Yale, Dublin and London, but no appointments will be made until the middle of August.

The salary of the professor of engineering is \$1,200 with a suite of rooms in the college suitable for a married man, the heating to be supplied by the college. That does not imply that a married man is preferred.

Nor is a man in sight to succeed Prof. Clawson. The salary for this chair is \$1,000.
