

WAR AND STRIKE.

Over a Hundred Strikers Killed or Wounded.

IN CLASH WITH MILITARY AT WARSAW.

The Japs' Immense Army Facing Kuropatkin.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 10.—The Putiloff iron works and the Franco-Russian works, are again closed, the men having walked out in a body at 10 o'clock this morning, consequent on the refusal of the employers to grant an eight hour day.

The men at the Putiloff works, who yesterday afternoon started to enforce eight hour shifts, returned to work this morning. Subsequently at a conference of the directors the latter adhered to their refusal to grant an eight hour day and the men then ceased to work, and induced their comrades to join them, and the whole body quietly marched out and formed groups in the streets.

The employees of the Franco-Russian works took similar action.

Lodz, Russian Poland, Feb. 10.—There is great excitement among the strikers who are gathering about the mills in a somewhat threatening manner.

An additional regiment of infantry has arrived.

The troops are stationed on the street leading to the Grand Hotel, where the governor has taken up his headquarters.

New York, Feb. 10.—At a meeting of the Author's club in Carnegie Hall last night, a memorial in the name of American literature was prepared for presentation to the czar of Russia, praying for the release of Maxim Gorky, the Russian author now in prison in connection with the recent internal disturbances in Russia.

Tokio, Feb. 10.—The Russians continued to bombard Field Marshal Oyama's extreme left Wednesday, and shelled his extreme right Thursday.

Small bodies of Russian infantry attacked the Japanese Wednesday night but were repulsed.

The general situation at the front is unchanged.

Vladivostok, Feb. 10.—The daily exodus of combatants, women and children, almost empties Vladivostok.

The frost is not severe and the thin ice breaks easily at the entrance of the port. Merchant steamers continue to arrive with supplies.

A naval officer from Port Arthur declares that the Russian warships are sunk in the harbor beyond the hope of raising.

Warsaw, Feb. 10.—Over a hundred strikers were killed or wounded by the military in a conflict which took place at the Kaciecin iron works, Kosmowice yesterday evening.

The strikers were attempting to put out the fires in the furnace of the smelting department works but three volleys finally scattered them.

JAPAN'S BIG ARMY.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 10.—The army organ publishes official statistics of Field Marshal Oyama's forces based on the regimental numbers of the uniforms of Japanese killed during the engagements with General Kuropatkin's forces. According to this report General Kuropatkin, commanding the Japanese right, has 76 battalions, 11 squadrons and 306 guns, about 85,000 men besides 70 to 80 reserve battalions. General Nodzu, commanding the centre, has 60 battalions, 6 squadrons and 198 guns, or 65,000 men. General Oku, commanding the left, including General General Nogi's forces, has 98 battalions, 23 squadrons and 342 guns, or 115,000 men. The number of reservists with Generals Nodzu and Oku is unknown. The total of Field Marshal Oyama's regular troops is placed at 265,000 cavalry and infantry, and 850 guns. The total number of reservists is probably 100,000. Military men estimate General Kuropatkin's superiority at about 50,000 men, without including the Sixteenth army corps, which is not yet in the Far East.

These figures are likely to dash the hopes of the peace party, which has distinctly been acquiring influence in high quarters during the last few days.

Legislature Opened.

WESTERN TRAGEDIES.

Swedish Girl Committed Suicide ---Drunken Men Frozen to Death.

Winnipeg, Feb. 10.—Bertha Berdstrom committed suicide at the Palace Hotel this morning with carbolic acid.

She was a Swedish girl that came to Winnipeg from New Brunswick.

An unknown man was frozen to death last night on the road between Duck Lake and Foulton, Man.

He left Duck Lake to drive to Foulton with a companion. Both men were drunk. One man fell out of the sleigh and the other was too drunk to notice. The victim's body was found next morning.

WANT TO BE CAPITAL.

Delegations from Edmonton and Calgary at Ottawa Urging Their Claims.

IN PARLIAMENT.

Questions Affecting Fredericton Asked and Answered.

CORRESPONDENCE RELATING TO BLAIR'S RESIGNATION SUBMITTED BY PREMIER.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier brought down yesterday the correspondence which passed between the government and Hon. A. G. Blair in regard to the resignation of Mr. Blair as chairman of the railway commission. On Oct. 18 Mr. Blair telegraphed the premier as follows:

"I have decided to retire from the commission and am sending my resignation to his excellency this afternoon. An opportunity offered of greatly bettering my position, which has to be accepted or rejected at once, and I did not feel my position had been so attractive that I should refuse the opportunity. I may add that beyond reaffirming my objection to the G. T. P. scheme, it is not my present purpose to re-enter or take part in public life or affairs."

"A. G. BLAIR."
Sir Wilfrid replied from Exbridge, (Ont.) a fellow in same (yesterday). "Your resignation comes to me as a surprise, but of course I cannot at present offer observations on the same."

(Sgd.) "WILFRID LAURIER."
Mr. Blair's letter of resignation to the governor-general read as follows:

"I hereby tender my resignation as the chief commissioner and member of the board of railway commission of Canada."

(Sgd.) "A. G. BLAIR."
On Oct. 31 the resignation was accepted.

In reply to Mr. Crockett Mr. Emerson said that the contract for rebuilding the drill hall at Fredericton N. B. was awarded to C. J. B. Simmons at \$12,955. The building is to be completed Nov. 15, 1905. The other tenderers were Willard Kitchen, for \$13,387; John Maxwell and Chas. A. Hall, \$14,000, and J. D. McLaughlin, \$15,300.

The minister of public works informed Mr. Crockett that the contract for "stables for officers' barracks grounds, Fredericton, was let by tender, the only tenderer being C. J. B. Simmons, at \$2,210.

Mr. Crockett moved for all correspondence re the purchase of the Canada Eastern Railway, also for returns showing the number of officials and wages of each when the transfer took place and now, and for the cost of operation and gross earnings of that railway from the date of transfer to Feb. 1, 1905.

The motion was passed, though Mr. Emerson said he was afraid he could not furnish the last information as no separate account was kept for this section of the I. C. R.

The public works estimates were discussed in committee. On the item of \$157,000 for harbor improvements for Quebec, Dr. Stockton asked why the government did not do more for St. John harbor. The people of St. John had spent \$800,000 of their own money to improve their harbor facilities.

Mr. Hyman said that the government had spent money in the St. John harbor.

Dr. Stockton—Not for the western export trade.

Mr. Hyman did not draw hair splitting distinctions of that kind, but he knew the government spent money there.

Dr. Stockton said that St. John was more deserving than Quebec because that although there were large sums of money spent in and loaned to Quebec there had been no reduction in the harbor dues of that city, whereas in St. John there was not one cent of harbor dues on the large western trade that it did.

Mr. Monk declared himself in favor of nationalizing Montreal, Quebec, Halifax and St. John harbors.
