SUPREME COURT.

Argument in the Cushing Case Finished—
County Court Appeals.

Argument in the Cushing appeal case, which has been engaging the attention of the Supreme court since last Saturday, was concluded yesterday afternoon, and judgment reserved.

The case of Patterson, (defendant), appellant, and Larson, (plaintiff), respondent, an appeal from the Victoria County Court, was next taken up. T. J. Carter appeared in support of the appeal; A. B. Connell, K. C., contra. Court considers.

In ex-parte Albert J. H. Stewart, G. W. Allen, K. C. moved for rule nisi for a mandamus to the Municipality of Gloucester to compel them to pay the applicant his fees amounting to \$577.79, as valuator for said county. Rule nisi to compel the council to fix and determine the amount due. Hanington dissenting.

Porter et al appellants and Tibbits respondent, T. J. Carter supports appeal from Victoria county; Thos. Lawson, contra. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Rouquette appellant, and Hebert respondent, LaForest supports appeal from Madawaska county court. J. M. Stevens, K. C., contra. Still before the court.

The court will deliver judgments tomorrow morning.
