GREATEST THAT HAS BEEN.

Defalcation of Bigelow Bank President Between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

ONLY RECORD OF HIS STEALINGS KEPT ON BIT OF PAPER.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 27.—(Special)—Frank G. Bigelow, the defaulting bank president, has confessed indebtedness to banks, commercial institutions, estates which he had charge of, which will aggregate between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000, and based on his confession a voluntary petition in bankruptcy has been filed in the United States district court. It cites the names of as many of Mr. Bigelow's creditors as he can remember, together with a list of assets on which Mr. Bigelow puts a valuation of \$1,419,000.

By his own admission creditors extend all over the United States. His indebtedness to the Brought estate is placed at \$100,000. The debt is unsecured. It is also believed other trusts held by Mr. Bigelow have suffered.

Attorney Spooner who filed the voluntary petition on behalf of Mr. Bigelow was compelled to make up the petition in such a short time that it is not complete and will necessarily have to be amended.

So far as could be ascertained Mr. Bigelow had no system of keeping a

record of his financial transactions, and the schedule of liabilities and assets had to be made up from a list in pencil on a half sheet of note-paper in Mr. Bigelow's hand writing.

Mr. Bigelow was not positive as to the names of some of his creditors, and the attorney was obliged to use his best judgment in figuring out what concerns were meant.

Revelations of the system of Mr. Bigelow's way of conducting his affairs are such as to stagger the belief of bankers, to whom method in such transactions is a second nature.

The filing of the petition of bankruptcy will necessitate the withdrawal of securities which were turned over by Mr. Bigelow to the First National Bank, having been made within four months of his failure.

It constitutes an act for preference creditors, and the proceeds, estimated at \$200,000, will be equally divided among the creditors.

This will in no way affect the bank, however, as the guarantee of its directors and stockholders more than covers the default.

TERROR OF ST. PETERSBURG.

Serious Outbreak Feared and Public are Fleeing from the City.

St. Petersburg, April 27.—(Special)—The publication in the morning papers of rumors of an impending popular outbreak, caused consternation and it is feared that the slightest incident among the vast congregations at Bua this Saturday might be enough to cause a panic with appalling consequences.

The mayor has been ordered to take instant steps to cope with the situation.

Many people will flee at Easter. All accommodation at neighboring resorts have been taken.

It is the widespread opinion that the police are implicated, and are inciting the masses against the intellectual classes.

At present a state of terror prevails.

The appointment of General Kosloff as governor general of Moscow, has aroused the bitterest feelings.

PENSIONS FOR COLLEGE PROFESSORS.

Carnegie Donates \$10,000,000 for this Purpose.

AND HIS BENEFICENCE EXTENDS TO CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

New York, April 27.—(Special)—Andrew Carnegie has given \$10,000,000 to provide annuities for college professors who are not able to continue in active service.

Mr. Carnegie announces in a letter that the fund will apply to professors in Universities, colleges and technical schools without regard to race, sex, creed or color.

State and colonial governments which have established colleges, may prefer to pension professors themselves, therefore these are not included.

Among trustees named by Carnegie is Principal Peterson of McGill.

United States Steel Corporation, 5 per cent. mortgage bonds to the extent of \$10,000,000 have been transferred to a board of trustees, who will organize a corporation to receive the donation. Canada, United States and Newfoundland professors are included in this bequest.

The idea is to provide a pension for hardworking, ill paid men when they are too old or otherwise incapacitated for active service.

The bequest was announced today by President Vanderlip of the New York National Bank, and it is the topic of conversation on the streets here.

MAY BE BATTLE NOW.

Two Detachments of Russian Fleet Have Been United.

St. Petersburg, April 27.—(Special)—According to calculations of the naval staff, Nebogotoff should reach Singapore tomorrow, and unite with Rojestvensky about May 5.

The report that they have already united is hardly credited here, but it is believed that there will be no difficulty in effecting a junction.

Tsing Tau, Shantung Peninsula, April 27.—(Special)—Private telegrams received here today say that Rojestvensky's fleet has joined Nebogotoff's detachment.

Kamranh Bay, April 27.—All Russian ships have left, and now form a line from Cape Varella to the head of Kamranh Peninsula.

Torpedo boats are scouting in all directions.

The fleet seems unusually active waiting for Nabogotoff, who has not yet been officially sighted.

OYAMA'S STRATEGY.

London, April 27.—The correspond-

ent of the Times at St. Petersburg cables: Some light is thrown upon operations in Manchuria by private advices claiming that the Japanese merely left a screen before General Linevitch while pouring their main forces along the eastern mountain passes into the Valley of the Sungari towards Kirin and Ningota, the ultimate plan being to completely isolate Vladivostok. Meanwhile bands of Chuchuses made a diversion on the Russian right.

If the information is correct, it is believed that Linevitch will decide voluntarily to attempt the offensive in order to save Vladivostok.

SCOTT ACT DEFEAT.

Restigouche Electors by Majority of 151 Refuse to Accept the Law.

Campbellton, April 27.—The voting on the Scott Act petition in Restigouche county yesterday resulted in a victory for license, the total vote polled being 871 for the *Alcool* and 720 for the *Prohibition*.

Although the time was short in which to prepare for the fight, both sides entered the contest fully organized, and the campaign was carried on with vigor.

From the prohibition point of view the one bright feature of the result is the vote in Campbellton, where, notwithstanding the heavy odds against them, the temperance people defeated their opponents by a majority of 130.

In spite of their defeat the temperance workers profess not to be disheartened. When the result was known they met in their committee rooms and decided to enter into another contest on the local option clause of the present license act as applicable to the town.

A SERIOUS LOSS.

Round House and Engine of the Stanley Railway Destroyed by Fire.

The York and Carleton Railway Company met with a serious loss last evening in the destruction by fire of their round house at Stanley Village and also their locomotive. The fire broke out about eight o'clock after the locomotive had been stored for the night, and the flames had made great headway before being discovered. A large number of people were quickly on the scene, but it was found impossible to get out the locomotive, and the flames were not long in converting it into scrap iron. The railway station, located about one hundred yards distant, escaped destruction.

The locomotive was the only one owned by the Company, and the loss of it will cause them no little inconvenience. Trains on that road have been cancelled until such time as the Company can procure another locomotive.

Dr. Moore, president of the Company, estimates the loss at \$2,500 or \$3,000, and says that there was no insurance.

The fire is supposed to have started by a spark falling from the locomotive.

FOR CANADA'S NEW ARMY

London Standard Wants Military Material Kept at Home.

London, April 26.—Tempting promises are held out, says The Evening Standard, by the Canadian government to young Englishmen of military ambition. The responsibility of defending Halifax has necessitated an increase in the regular military forces of the Dominion, and the demand for recruits is said to offer "an exceptional opportunity to healthy young Englishmen with a spice of adventure in their patriotism and some desire for the freedom of colonial life."

The scheme opens possibilities which are not altogether pleasant to contemplate. Mr. Arnold Forster has not yet succeeded in convincing the British public that we have more fighting men than we can do with. While, therefore, they may be good patriots in joining the Canadian army, there may be just as good in remaining at home and joining the British force. The obvious moral is that if we expect to retain the best military for home purposes Pall Mall must be inspired with the desire to compete with the advantages offered by the Canadian government.
