TOLERATION AND UNITY.

Incidents are multiplying to disprove the oft-repeated Tory assertion of French domination which is held up to the English-speaking people of Canada as a bogey to scare them into deserting Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The election of Hon. W. A. Weir, an English-speaking Protestant, to the speakership of the Quebec legislature is an instance of French Canadian broad mindedness and toleration to those of a different race and religion.

Mr. Smith, an English Protestant, who represents the county of Megantic in the Quebec Assembly, at a recent banquet to Premier Gouin of that province, expressed the wish that some of the fanatics of Ontario could know that he represented a county of which 85 per cent. of the population were French Roman Catholics, and they were not narrow-minded enough to give him opposition.

Lord Grey in an address at Toronto on Monday, declared that Canada should effectively sit down on any effort to arouse race and religious prejudices in this country, and his observations were no doubt intended as a remonstrance against the present effort of one party in Canada to inflame the country on these undesirable issues.

Canadians must recognize the fact that while this country is a dependency of the British Crown, and owes allegiance to no other power, our population is made up of many races and religions. We are inviting immigration from all over the world and this country is broad enough, and big enough to shelter all who desire to settle in it, but we must all learn to respect the race and religious prejudices of our neighbors, who have the same rights in those respects that we possess.

It matters little at what altar we worship, so long as we are good, loyal citizens of Canada and determined to build up our country, perpetuate its splendid institutions, and remain true to the King whose sovereignty we are proud to own.

Any country occupied by people of different races and religions must be one of compromise to secure that unity of purpose which is the key to peace and prosperity, and he who seeks to arouse race and religious animosities is an enemy of Canada, and a dangerous citizen.

From the very moment of his first political prominence Sir Wilfrid Laurier has never ceased to preach the doctrine of conciliation and unity, and his influence and speech have helped to allay the passions of the people aroused by demagogues for a political advantage.

THE RESTIGOUCHE VERDICT.

The county of Restigouche has declined the adoption of the Scott Act and the number of counties in this province under that law remains at nine.

The majority against the Act was apparently cast in the French speaking parishes, and that nationality in New Brunswick has steadily opposed this form of local option.

Some temperance extremists may argue from this fact that the French people are given over to intemperance, but there is nothing to justify such a conclusion. There is we believe, at least as much, if not more, sobriety among the French Acadians than is prevalent with their English speaking brethren.

Perhaps the Restigouche voters who opposed the Scott Act have heard that in certain places in New Brunswick under the Scott Act, the enforcement of the law is made on the basis of a municipal revenue producer, and they preferred to collect toll from the liquor dealers in a more regular way by the imposition of license fees.

IN CIVIC HARNESS.

Our good friend Prof. Walter C. Murray, sometime on the staff of the University of New Brunswick and a native of Sussex, has assumed the responsibilities of an alderman of Halifax, in addition to his duties at Dalhousie University, in which he is one of the most popular and efficient instructors. It may be accepted without quibble that he will serve in his new office intelligently and faithfully, and our sister city is to

be congratulated on having succeeded in harnessing him in the aldermanic yoke.

The new mayor of Halifax, Mr. Robert T. McElreith, is not unknown in this city. Besides being a clever and rising young lawyer he is very much interested in sports, and not many years ago officiated as umpire in a football game in Fredericton.

With such energetic and intelligent young men in her civic government as Mayor McElreith and Ald. Murray, Halifax is pretty certain to enjoy a clean and progressive administration.

A VETERAN CLERGYMAN.

If Rev. W. H. Street, the esteemed sub-dean of the Cathedral lives until the third of June next, (and his hosts of friends hope he will survive for many years yet), he will have completed half a century in the Anglican ministry. He is the oldest active Church of England clergyman in New Brunswick, and although carrying the weight of seventy-four years, is able to discharge his clerical duties as efficiently as much younger men.

Mr. Street graduated at the University of New Brunswick in 1851, was ordained to the ministry June 3rd, 1855, and has occupied several important charges in the Church in this province.

May the veteran and esteemed clergyman, whose buoyancy and activity are remarkable in one of his advanced years, continue long in his sacred office, is the wish of his friends in which the Herald very cordially joins.

The Quebec legislature composed almost exclusively of French Canadian members, has given the Tory sectarian agitators a forceful lesson in tolerance by electing an English speaking Protestant to the highest office in their gift, Hon. W. A. Weir, who has been unanimously elected to the speakership, is the first gentleman of his race and religion to occupy that exalted position, and henceforth we should hear less of the Tory outcry against French domination and more of French toleration so remarkably illustrated in Mr. Weir's case.

The late Captain Whittier enjoyed a large degree of popularity in this his adopted city, and his death, announced today, will be sincerely mourned. He was a gentleman of attractive personality, and passed through life without making an enemy. The sympathy of the community will be extended in no mean measure to his bereaved daughter, who has lost both her parents within a comparatively few years, and who was her father's almost constant companion in his declining years.

Its very funny. The Toronto News, one of the leaders against the school clauses of the autonomy bill, and in the sectarian agitation so vigorously nursed by the Tory party says: "Archbishop Langevin is not pleased with the separate school clauses of the autonomy bill. For once we are able to entirely agree with the learned prelate of St. Boniface." Thus do extremes meet, the newspaper ultra-Protestant and a Roman Catholic Archbishop.

Our old friend, Lt.-Col. George Rolt White, District Officer Commanding in New Brunswick, who succeeded in getting his office and himself removed from this city to St. John, finds himself under the direction of Col. Drury, the officer recently appointed to the maritime province military district.

Local bye-election took place today in Mountain, Manitoba, the seat vacated by the resignation of Ex-Premier Greenway, now a member of parliament. The Roblin government have made every possible effort to carry the constituency and the fight has been a hot one.

It is expected that a division will be reached on Tuesday next on the autonomy bill, and the government will probably have a majority of ninety.

Oddfellows' Entertainment --- Address by Rev. A. R. Rideout---Personal.

April 27.—That the Marysville Oddfellows are royal entertainers was proved last evening when they and their friends assembled at Oddfellows' Hall to celebrate the 85th anniversary of the noble order, on which occasion over one hundred and fifty were present, all of whom thoroughly enjoyed every minute of the time spent together. Shortly after eight o'clock the guests began to arrive, and were ushered into the large handsome lodge room on the second floor, where they were entertained by several selections from the Marysville orchestra under the able leadership of Prof. Cadwallader, who also carried out the duties of chairman in his usual pleasing manner, and made a few well chosen remarks of welcome, after which he called on Mr. Barry Allen, who recited several amusing selections as only Barry can. This was followed by an address by Rev. A. A. Rideout, who spoke in his eloquent way, dwelling on the wonderful growth of the Oddfellows' Order throughout the world. How it started in Baltimore with a membership of seven on the 26th day of April, 1819, and how the membership has increased until it is nearly three million today, with lodges all over the globe. He spoke in reference to the Order's emblem, especially the link of love and dwell to some length on the beneficial past of the organization, and of their valuable services in time of need. Mr. Rideout's interesting and instructive address was followed by a comic character sketch by Mr. Allen, which was certainly the feature of the evening, and he was compelled to respond to a well earned encore.
