THE SHERIFF'S STORY.

Respecting the Tory Charge That He
Connived

To Prevent Simms' Nomination in Carleton.

Respecting the charge that Sheriff Hayward of Carleton, was a party to the prevention of Mr. Simms being nominated for the legislature against Hon. W. P. Jones, that official says:

"I opened my court at sharp ten o'clock by my watch. The nomination papers of Mr. Jones were in my possession on Friday. At eleven o'clock Mr. Simms arrived at the court house. He appeared to take matters cool at first but shortly afterwards he became excited and I understood that something was wrong with his nomination papers, as he telephoned to Woodstock for C. T. Boyer. At eleven thirty Simms told Deputy Sheriff Foster that he was not sure whether he could file his nomination papers or not. Mr. Boyer appeared about this time. The Bible could not be found. I do not know what became of it. At four minutes to twelve Messrs. Simms and Boyer went out to find a Bible. At twelve o'clock they returned. I was about to close my court. I told Mr. Simms that he was too late. He handed me his nomination papers and money, and asked me to count the latter. I picked up and counted the money. I showed him my watch and it was four minutes after twelve. Simms also produced his watch. I told him that I opened the court at sharp ten by my watch, and as the law requires, he had two hours to file his papers. He said that I must have set my watch ahead, and I called him a liar and told him that I had not touched my watch for two years. I told him my oath required that I should be just to every citizen, that he had eight days to make out his papers, and that if Jones was in the same box he would be used likewise. The only one who had any conversation with me was John S. Leighton, J., who was anxious to know the time by my watch, but I gave him no information. Mr. Leighton protested against receiving the nomination of Mr. Simms, but I told him it was my court and I would conduct it. When my watch showed twelve o'clock, I refused the paper, and would have done the same if the paper had been that of Mr. Jones."

AGAINST GODLESS SUNDAY.

Heads of Church of England Lead
Movement—Directed at the
Smart Set.

London, Feb. 21.—Under the auspices of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, a majority of the bishops and a number of other dignitaries of the Episcopal Church, there will shortly be inaugurated a crusade against England's "Godless Sunday."

The movement has been initiated by Layman Kingscote, a high official of the King's household, who has obtained the co-operation of the leaders of the Established Church and many clerical and lay enthusiasts in the fight against the secularization of the Sabbath, which, undoubtedly, is now more widely condoned and even defended than at any time since public opinion in England was first ordered by evangelical influences.

It is not so long ago since respectable people stigmatized one of their class who defied the Sabbath conventions based on the Decalogue. This is no longer the case. Even dwellers in small country towns where attendance on at least one service every Sunday and a reasonable excuse for absence from the other was necessary a few years ago to avoid social ostracism, take the most lenient view of a man or woman who goes on excursions or bicycle rides or takes part in a golf game on Sunday.

It is for this reason that the present campaign has been launched. It is nominally directed mainly at the smart set of society people, who, although they have the whole week to amuse themselves, increase, so their accusers say, their amusements on Sunday. They rush out of London to the seaside or on to the river, and indulge in automobiling and other amusements all day, and hurry back in the evening to dine at fashionable hotels and restaurants, attend concerts and card parties, or entertain guests and selfishly prevent their servants, railway men, waiters, and other workers of this class from enjoying a day of rest.

It must be said that no complaint is heard from those who minister to the wants of the offenders, as all of them benefit thereby in a pecuniary way, and most of them obtain leisure on other days.

The attitude of the crusaders varies widely. Some confine their denunciations to people of the leisure class for compelling others to work for their benefit, and support the movement as purely economic. Others take their stand on the fourth commandment, saying they desire to crush the indulgence of all classes of the people in amusement on the Lord's Day, which they would restore to the Puritan ideal of the seventeenth century. The mission will be begun by a simultaneous attempt of the bishops and clergy to awaken England's conscience by addresses from the pulpit.
