TAX COLLECTIONS.

The amount collected in taxes by City Treasurer Golding so far this month is \$4500 against \$5000 for the same period last year. About \$2500 was paid in on Monday alone. The voters list for the next civic election will contain about 1050 names.

The Woodstock hockey team arrived here last night and are domiciled at the Barker House. Tomorrow evening they are to play a match with the U. N. B. at the Arctic Rink. The party is made up of F. Drysdale, G. Lister, W. Lister, W. Hall, M. Munroe, A. McLean, G. Hull, W. Dalling, G. Merier, O. A. Townsend and R. U. Townsend.

The Trojans left for St. John this morning and play the Neptunes at the Queen's Rink this evening. Tomorrow evening they play a return match with the Mohawks.

SKATING RACES.

At the close of the hockey match at the Arctic Rink last evening, there was two skating races that proved quite interesting. A. E. Hanson and F. G. Spencer competed in a quarter mile go, and Mr. Spencer won, hands down. Both were a trifle rusty on skates, but Mr. Hanson, had he kept his feet, might have secured the victory. As it was he went down three times and his competitor had a lap to the good at the finish. The other races were participated in by Tom Rutter, Larry White, Brown and Harry McCoy. Rutter won quite easily.

GRAND FALLS POWER.

Premier Tweedie Confident That it Will Soon be Developed.

Montreal, Feb. 23.—In an interview here Premier Tweedie made an announcement regarding the harnessing of the Grand Falls.

New York capitalists, he said, have already made a deposit of \$40,000 as a guarantee of their good faith that in the near future they will put in an electric plant that will eventu-

ally lead to an expenditure of \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000.

The construction of a large pulp mill is also comprised in this Grand Falls enterprise, and Hon. Mr. Tweedie says they will be able to generate 40,000 horse power, and supply the city of St. John and all the intervening towns with light.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie says the project is quite feasible and will no doubt be carried out.

The premier also announced that his province had just received the first coal royalties ever paid into the provincial treasury and he felt greatly encouraged at the prospect of revenue from this source.

HIS FATHER DEAD.

Mr. Nalder, a University Student, Suffers Severe Bereavement.

Windsor, N. S., Feb. 23.—The death of John Nalder at his residence early yesterday morning was a terrible shock to the whole community.

About ten days ago Mr. Nalder was taken ill with inflammation of the bowels, but no serious results were anticipated until pneumonia and pleurisy set in, making a serious complication hard to deal with. All day Wednesday his doctor, his nurse and friends had been fighting the disease inch by inch, but without avail, and at 3.40 o'clock yesterday morning the sufferer passed away.

Mr. Nalder was about 56 years of age, and up to his last illness had always enjoyed good health. Mr. Nalder leaves a wife and one adopted son, Arthur, to mourn his loss. Wednesday morning a telegram was sent to Arthur, who is attending the University at Fredericton, and he was expected last evening.

Mr. Nalder was a native of London, England, and came to Nova Scotia about thirty years ago. He married Miss Rachel Clay, also an English woman, and, about twenty years ago came to Windsor to reside. He was a valued member of the Baptist church and filled the office of deacon. He was a Sunday school teacher and a member of the choir. Mr. Nalder will be missed in the life of the town as well. Mr. Nalder was in the employ of the J. B. King Company. Before accepting that position he had been on the staff of the Union Bank here, and has always been most highly thought of by his employers.

THE ABERDEEN.

Up River Boat Will be Retained by the Company.

A meeting of the directors of the Fredericton and Woodstock Steamboat Company to open the tenders for the purchase of the steamer Aberdeen, was held at the office of Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C., last evening. There was only one tender, a joint one from Messrs. Robert Scott, J. P. Johnson and David Munroe, and it was decided not to accept it.

Mr. Robert Scott was appointed managing director of the company, and it was decided to retain possession of the boat and continue her on the Fredericton and Woodstock route next season.

Mr. Scott offered to purchase the stock of those shareholders who were anxious to sell the boat, and it is likely that his offer will be taken advantage of by several of them. The board of directors will be the same as last year.

Mr. Scott was manager of the company during the season of 1903, and his efforts were attended with success. No doubt he will succeed in making the boat pay this season.

THE SCHOOL BOARD.

Regular Monthly Meeting Held on Wednesday Afternoon.

The regular monthly meeting of the city school board, was held in the secretary's office yesterday afternoon with Dr. Atherton in the chair.

Reports were submitted by several committees appointed at the last meeting and there was quite a lot of discussion. The committee appointed to consider the recommendation of the teachers that bi-monthly reports on the progress of pupils be made to the parents instead of monthly reports, reported against making any change in the system.

It was decided to introduce fire-drill for the pupils forthwith and printed forms containing all information will be posted in the several rooms.

The secretary-treasurer reported that on account of the storm the teacher at Doak Settlement was unable to reach her school last week, and it was closed during the whole week. He also reported that information had been laid in the police court against a down town resident for chopping trees on the Morrison's Mill school property.
