A WESTERN PREMIER.

The profession of journalism is honored by the selection of Hon. Walter Scott, editor and proprietor of the Regina Leader, as premier of the new province of Saskatchewan. And the position is honored by the acceptance of Mr. Scott, who in his professional capacity has been helping to make politicians for some years, and has now done something for himself in that line.

Like a great many other leading men of western Canada, Mr. Scott is a native of Ontario. He was born in London township, county of Middlesex, of Scottish parentage thirty-eight years ago, and after a fair education took up the newspaper business. Removing to Regina some eighteen years ago he became connected with the press of that town, and soon had control of the Leader, with which he amalgamated the Times, and he also publishes the Moose Jaw Times.

Mr. Scott sprang into political prominence when he defeated the late Nicholas Flood Danin for parliament in 1900, and he was re-elected in 1904. He took a prominent part in the public business at Ottawa and if Hon. Frank Oliver had not been in the way the newspaper editor would have been Hon. Clifford Sifton's successor as minister of the interior in the federal government. However, the premiership of Saskatchewan was open to Mr. Scott, and perhaps he prefers to be a big toad in a small puddle rather than the reverse. At any rate Mr. Scott has a position that leaves him at his home in Regina, and he has gathered around him a cabinet of talents with every prospect of a successful appeal to the people.

Mr. Scott is premier of Saskatchewan before he is quite thirty-eight years old, and has a great start in his political career. Hon. A. G. Blair was thirty-nine when he became premier of New Brunswick and Mr. Fielding was premier of Nova Scotia when only thirty-six.

THE CARLETON FIASCO.

It remains true that the solicitor general of New Brunswick owes his election by acclamation to the fact that one of his supporters hid the court Bible.—Sun.

A COMPLICATED CASE.

The Montreal Herald notes that a rather complicated case of disputed insurance payment was opened Thursday morning in that city by Mr. Justice Loranger. Mrs. Kool suing the Providence Savings Life Insurance Company for payment of a ten thousand dollar policy, held by her deceased husband.

The company refused payment on the ground that at the time the policy was taken out Mr. Kool was suffering from spinal meningitis. Also the company alleges that Mr. Kool had not paid his first or any premium.

Mrs. Kool denies the meningitis and declares that Mr. Kool paid the first premium by note to the agent. The company sets up that it does not accept such notes for premiums. Mrs. Kool counters by alleging that the agent for the company told Mr. Kool that the company owed him money, and that he would take the note as a personal matter, and arrange the payment between himself and the company.

In the meantime Mr. Kool died, and the company refused to accept payment or recognize the policy at all.

If all notes given for life insurance are so much waste paper and do not insure the applicants, there is a lot of useless negotiable articles extant in this country.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his speech at the directors' luncheon at the Ottawa exhibition, talked of the beauties of the Annapolis Valley, certain attractive districts of Ontario and of the Red River and Saskatchewan Valleys declaring those to be beauty spots of Canada. But he has never seen the St. John Valley which beats them all. If the premier will see to it that the Grand Trunk Pacific railway is routed this way he will be able to take a ride down our magnificent St. John Valley and he will see a country surpassing in beauty any he has yet witnessed in Canada.

Toronto Star, Tory.—Sir Wilfrid has clearly inherited Sir John Macdonald's buoyant faith in the future of the Dominion, and particularly in that of the west. His "eye of faith" sees it literally gridironed with railways, as is the American west to the south. Canada is not to be a strip along the northern border of the American Republic, but a great nation, with depth and a mighty power of self sustenance.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

W. E. Vroom, of St. John, has been appointed a provincial lieutenant for the Cashing Sulphite Fibre Co.

E. F. Blake, son of Hon. Edward Blake, died at Toronto, Friday, at the age of thirty-nine years. He was a member of the firm of Blake, Lash, Cassels & Co.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will attend the banquet of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at Quebec on the 20th inst, and will be accompanied by Lady Laurier.

Detective Inspector Goldrich has left Birmingham, England, for the purpose of bringing back John Forbes, who is in the hands of the Montreal police, on the charge of stealing various sums from the Canada Life Assurance Company, of which he was the Birmingham manager.

Judge Sullivan in the municipal criminal court at Boston Friday acquitted Elmer E. Young, who was arrested Wednesday charged with stealing \$45 from Emma Rogers under false pretences. The defendant was declared not guilty because of lack of evidence. Young was the father of Minnie Young, for whose murder Hope Young is now awaiting execution in Nova Scotia.

Sir Gilbert Parker, M. P., who is the guest of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at Ottawa, speaking to a reporter referred to the coming political campaign in Great Britain, saying: "The tariff question will have but little prominence in the campaign, which will be waged chiefly on the educational and liquor license question. I believe that the government will meet with defeat in this election, but in opposition will present a very strong and united front."

Tenders for the construction of the section of the Grand Trunk Pacific from Fort William to Lake Superior Junction, where it will join the main line, were opened at Montreal Friday at the offices of the vice president and general manager of the company. This section of the road is 210 miles in length and almost from beginning to the end the work will be of heavy character. This is the kind of work that railway contractors prefer, and for this reason, the number of tenders already received has been unusually large. No award has as yet been made.

ANGLICAN SYNOD.

Business of the Closing Session at Quebec.

Quebec, Sept. 16.—The General Synod was prorogued yesterday afternoon, a great number of resolutions having been withdrawn or held over till next synod.

Amongst them were those of Rev. Dr. Langtry, concerning religious education in schools, which Mr. Lake, M. P., declared raised a political question, and declaring those believing the higher criticism were ineligible to hold office as professors in church theological colleges.

The committee on candidates for holy orders reported that in consequence of the illness of the Bishop of Toronto, chairman of the committee, the report had not been prepared.

A resolution in favor of the publication of a church paper in Canada, under direction of the synod, was held over.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Scott, it was decided that the government be memorialized to establish in the various military depots of Canada well built and well-equipped cafes where refreshments and temperance drinks may be obtained and opportunities for recreation afforded. He said that the government did not do its duty in respect to the morality of our soldiers.

Another motion by Dr. Scott was adopted calling upon church people to discourage the pernicious habit of treating.

A message was received from the upper house declining to concur in the continuance of the committee on the diaconate.

Fifteen bishops entered the lower house at 1 o'clock, and after a short concluding address from his grace the primate, he declared the synod prorogued.

There was a large attendance at the farewell reception at St. John's Presbyterian church, Toronto, Friday night, to Miss Janie McKinney of Florenceville, N. B., and Miss Cornell of Allison, Ont., who are going to Formosa to conduct and establish a native school for girls under the auspices of the foreign missionary committee of the Canadian Presbyterian Church.

It has been decided that the Grand Trunk will take over the Canada Atlantic Railway on October 5. The company has already begun strengthening the bridge and culverts on the line in anticipation of increased heavy traffic.

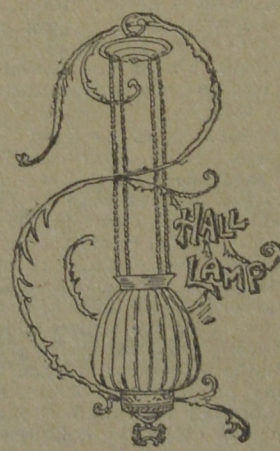
