WANTS TO KNOW IF SHE'S MARRIED.

Mrs. Julia B. Porter of Salem Brings Suit Against Her Former Husband to Learn Her Standing.

Lawrence, Sept. 16.—Mrs. Julia B. Porter of Salem told Judge Gaskill in superior court today that she brought a suit for divorce against Samuel H. Porter of Roslindale to ascertain her standing before the world. "I want to know whether or not I am a married woman," she said.

The Porters were married at Salem, Aug. 26, 1890. In 1896 Mr. Porter went away. In 1898 he went to North Dakota and obtained a divorce on the ground of desertion. He came back East a month after secured the divorce, and in 1901 married Isabel Hamilton, with whom he now resides in Roslindale.

Mrs. Porter contends that the Dakota decree was illegal and seeks to have it so declared. She also asks the court to allow her alimony for her support and that of her two children. Atty. Chappel of Salem appeared for Mrs. Porter, and Lawyer Keizer of Boston, for the libellee.

In her testimony, Mrs. Porter said she received notice that her husband had filed a divorce libel in the North Dakota courts, but she had no money with which to contest it, and, therefore, did nothing about it. She later received a copy of the decree,

and was surprised to find that she had been represented by counsel, at the trial in Dakota, and had been allowed three dollars a week alimony. She said she never authorized a lawyer to represent her. Her husband did not pay the alimony, she said, and she has received very little money from him for the support of the children. When she learned of his second marriage, she brought divorce proceedings herself to test the legality of the Dakota divorce.

Porter testified that, after leaving his wife in 1896, he was employed in Brookline for about two years. "Things went wrong," he said, "and I decided to go West and begin over again. I had lived in Minnesota when a boy, and I went to my old home. I remained there but two days, and then proceeded to Fargo, N. D., where I secured employment. I decided to apply for a divorce. After I made application, the court appointed a lawyer to look after my wife's interests. The divorce was granted."

In his argument, Lawyer Chappel contended it was plain that Porter went to Dakota for the sole purpose of securing a divorce, and that the Dakota decree could not be valid because, even if there was any desertion, it had not continued for three years, as required by Massachusetts law in order to obtain a divorce. Judge Gaskill took the case under advisement.

SPRANG SENSATION.

First Vice President of New York Life Insurance Co. Admits Company Gave Heavy Contributions to Republicans.

New York, Sept. 16.—George W. Perkins, member of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., and first vice-president of the New York Life Insurance Company, was the star witness at yesterday's session of the special legislative committee which is probing the methods of life insurance companies in this state and his testimony was replete with revelations in the development of finance as applied by insurance companies.

The climax of the day came when Mr. Perkins was asked concerning an entry of \$48,702 in a ledger, marked "ordered paid by the president." Mr. Randolph, the treasurer of the New York Life Company, who had been sharply questioned as to the purpose of this entry, but he was unable to explain it. He thought no one but the president could. Mr. Perkins had been called to testify as to some other transactions and after the recess he was asked to produce the check. It was made out payable to J. P. Morgan & Co., and Mr. Perkins frankly stated that it was a contribution to the national Republican campaign committee and had been paid to Cornelius N. Bliss.

Mr. Perkins said: "This payment was made because we felt that the assets of the New York Life Insurance Company would be jeopardized by Democratic success."

Mr. Perkins said contributions were also made in 1900 and 1896.

WOOS THREE AT SAME TIME.

Gentleman Crook Robbed Homes, Attended Divine Worship and Made Love During Spare Time.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 16.—William Henry Peterhans, who is in jail in \$4000 bonds, for alleged robbery of four West side residences, and under suspicion of robbing four others, has proved as artistic at lovemaking as he was at housebreaking. About to be engaged to Miss Letitia C. Whittaker, who worked with him at the George C. Whitney Company valve factory, he had made the marriage proposition to Miss Mary A. Conaty, 29 Jefferson street. While making love to both Misses Conaty and Whittaker, he was taking canoe rides and keeping regular appointments with Miss Maude Eay of Russell street.

All three young women regret the fellow's troubles for he made a most favorable impression upon them all. Miss Conaty refused the offer of marriage, after he told her he had been in prison. Miss Whittaker, who is a leader in the First Baptist Church Sunday school, took Peterhans to church with her, thoroughly believing the reformation plan would win. Miss Eay says she never knew of him keeping company with any girl other than herself, and reluctantly admitted such was the fact.

He gave her a coral necklace, which, he said, belonged to his dead sister, and he wanted her to wear it. In jail, Peterhans is repentant and admits his guilt. He says he meant to do right, but the robbery inclination came over him so completely he could not shake it off. He says he walked around town early in the evening to learn who of the West side people were away, and visited the houses for robbery motives later in the night. He is sorry he has made so much trouble for so many people.

APPROACHING WEDDING.

The nuptials of Mr. John E. Miles, of Boston, and Miss Phoebe A. Belanger, of Fairview Cottage, Nashua, are to be celebrated at the bride's home on Wednesday, the 20th inst. The prospective bridegroom is a nephew of Mr. C. A. Miles, of the New Brunswick foundry, and is well known in this city.

ROCKS NO MORE.

"Rocks," the handsome little cocker spaniel owned by Landlord McCaffrey, a great favorite among the patrons of the Queen, was taken ill yesterday and had to be shot. He was highly prized by his owner and the loss is doubly severe now that the hunting season is on.

With his left foot caught in a switch and with a passenger train bearing down on him, Frank Spellisy a ten year old newsboy, exhibited remarkable self possession Thursday night at Marlboro, Mass., and thereby saved his life. The boy's foot was caught in a switch as he was crossing the railroad tracks and he was unable to release himself. Hearing the rumble of an approaching train, young Spellisy clambered stretched himself on the ground at right angles to the rails. The train severed his foot at the ankle. The boy's leg was later amputated at the knee, but the physicians say that he will undoubtedly recover.

George White, aged about thirty, who a few weeks ago absconded with five hundred dollars belonging to the Canadian Pacific railway, on Friday at Quebec was sentenced to two years imprisonment in the penitentiary.

SETTLERS FOR AUSTRALIA.

General Booth Offers 5,000 Families For That Country—Why Not to Canada?

Montreal, Sept. 16.—A London cable says: General Booth has asked Alfred Deakin, Australian premier, whether he can place in Australia 5,000 families now destitute and who are expected to be available during the coming winter.

Contrasting General Booth's Australian scheme with H. Rider Haggard's in Canada, the Daily Chronicle says the general of the Salvation Army has a fondness for acting whilst other people are thinking. Offers to Australia to supply settlers are much more numerous than contemplated by Mr. Haggard's Canadian scheme.

Interviewed by the Daily Chronicle, regarding the scheme, General Booth said that the Salvation Army was now engaged in reducing emigration to a system by which, on a large scale, able bodied men with their wives and families may be fitted to earn a living in another country. Last year he sent 1,000 to Canada, and only four or five turned out failures. Canada can swallow up people by the thousands, but there are other countries besides Canada open for the purpose.

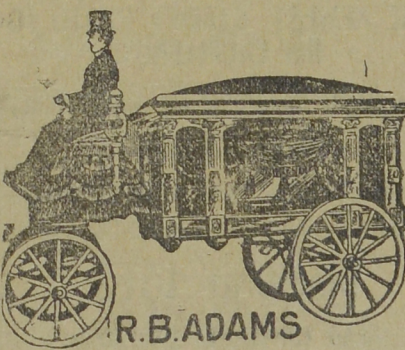
