THE CENTRAL REPAIRS.

Brown Bros. Proceeding Vigorously With the Work.

A steam shovel and plow and locomotive have been purchased by the Central Railway commissioners, in accordance with the agreement, for the repairs now in progress by Brown Bros. on the line. The shovel was recently purchased in Hull at a cost of \$5,000 by W. C. Hunter, who went west for that purpose a fortnight ago and returned last Thursday. The plow and locomotive were also purchased by Mr. Hunter while away.

Senator King says that the work of cleaning and ditching the track is well under way and that the contractors are making preparations for the new bridge at Norton. Negotiations for the Sussex bridge are still in progress, and Mr. McAvity has made some offers for other I. C. R. bridges. As soon as the shovel arrives Brown Bros. will proceed with the ballasting.

Senator King, in speaking of coal operations in Chipman, said that miners are now wanted there. Because of the lack of them the operators cannot supply the coal demanded. Good men, he says, can earn on job work from \$50 to \$80 per month.

Citing a case in point, Senator King said the one remaining man of the twenty-one Belgians who a short time ago went there to work and with this single exception, left because, as they said, they could not earn a living wage, is now making the latter amount each month. A short time ago money was advanced him by his employer to build a house payments to be made monthly out of his wages, and the first month he was able to make a payment of forty dollars in addition to paying all the living expenses of his family.

Senator King has a great deal of faith in the Chipman coal mines. The I. C. R. line from Moncton to St. John is now being exclusively operated on Grand Lake coal. If they had sufficient men there would be no difficulty in turning out three or four hundred tons daily.

A PLEASING INCIDENT.

Mr. Joseph Starkey Honored by the Employees of the Palmer Company.

A pleasant incident took place at the office of the John Palmer Company, Limited, this forenoon, when the employees assembled and presented Mr. Joseph Starkey, the retiring bookkeeper, with a beautiful gold watch, neatly engraved. He referred to his long connection with the Palmer Company, and to the pleasant relations that he had always enjoyed with the employees. He thanked them very heartily for the gift and assured them that it would always be prized highly by him. Mr. Starkey's remarks were followed with three rousing cheers and a tiger. Mr. Starkey has accepted a position with the C. S. Hyman Company and will leave this evening for Chatham, Ont., to take up his duties. Mrs. Starkey and children will spend the winter at St. Stephen.
