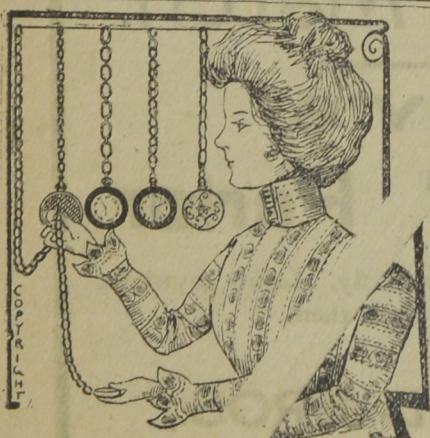

INTENDED FOR GOVERNOR GENERAL

Several Persons Including Two Detectives Killed at Warsaw.

BY THE PREMATURE EXPLOSION OF A BOMB.

Workman who Carried it Accidentally Slipped and Was Among the Victims.

PROPERTY ALSO RUINED BY THE EXPLOSION.

Warsaw, May 19.—(Special)—A workman who was trying to escape the observation of two detectives on Miodawa street, slipped on the curb of the sidewalk and a bomb which he was carrying in his pocket exploded, killing the workman, both detectives and some persons who were passing. It is believed that the bomb was intended for Governor General Maximovitch, who was expected to pass on his way to the Cathedral to attend services in honor of the Czar's birthday.

The bodies of the victims were literally blown to pieces and a cafe

near the scene of the explosion was entirely demolished.

All the windows in the neighborhood were smashed and a lamp post was torn out of the ground.

There was a report to the effect that the bomb had been thrown among local officials who were on their way to, or returning from the Cathedral. There was intense excitement.

Later it was stated that only the workman and two detectives were killed, though passers-by were severely injured and others were slightly hurt by fragments of the bomb.

HUNTING MORO OUTLAWS.

United States Soldiers Killed and Wounded in Philippine Jungles.

BUT TROOPS EXTERMINATED DANGEROUS ENEMIES.

Manilla, May 19.—(Special)—The Moro outlaws against whom General Leonard Wood has been campaigning, have been killed in action, together with all the principals.

The outlaws were supporters and followers of the Sultan of Jolo. The big chiefs of the Island of Jolo were not involved.

The outbreak was purely an aggregation of piratical outlaws and disorderly characters of Jolo and other

islands stretching down to Borneo.

The positions selected by the outlaws for defense, were almost impenetrable jungles, precluding the use of artillery, and necessitating close contact in many instances.

General Wood's force sustained a loss of nine killed, and twenty-one wounded all of whom are doing well.

The constabulary had two killed. General Wood has returned to Zamboanga with the troops.

ST. JOHN TERMINAL FACILITIES.

General Manager of C. P. R. Says More Wharf Accommodation is Required.

St. John, May 19.—(Special)—D. McNeill, vice president and general manager of the C. P. R., arrived here today and inspected the Sand Point terminal facilities.

He said the facilities here are not

adequate to the business of the port, and more wharves are required. He continues to report that the C. P. R. should build a bridge across the harbor. He leaves for Montreal tonight.

KALIEFF TO THE GALLOWS

Grand Duke Sergius' Assassin Executed at Moscow.

London, May 19.—(Special)—A despatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg says that Ivan Kalieff, who assassinated Grand Duke Sergius, has been executed.

Ivan Kalieff belonged to a noted "fighting group," of the Socialist-revolutionary party which had passed sentence of death upon the Grand Duke long before the tragedy.

At 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Feb. 17 Grand Duke Sergius was proceeding to the Governor-General's palace in Moscow in his carriage. Kalieff, attired as a workman, stepped forward from the sidewalk as Sergius was passing the courts of Justice and threw under his carriage a bomb, which he had concealed beneath his coat. Loaded with nails

and fragments of iron, this deadly missile tore the Duke's body into ghastly fragments. The assassin, stunned by the explosion, on being captured did not deny his crime, but gloried in its success. He expressed satisfaction that the Duke's wife had not shared her husband's fate. Grand Duke Sergius had been the recipient of repeated warnings, and the utmost precautions had been taken to insure his safety.

INSTANTLY KILLED.

B. C. Miner Fell 100 Feet Down Shaft—Car on Top of Mine.

Vancouver, B. C., May 19.—(Special)—Thomas Neelands fell a hundred feet down a shaft at the Cumberland colliery and a car fell on top the man meeting instant death. He was horribly mangled. He had pushed a loaded car into an open shaft and fell with it.

THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.

Another Fishery Question: Which Americans Are Concerned.

AGITATING MINDS OF SOME MEMBERS OF THE COMMONS.

Ottawa, May 19.—In answer to Mr. Wilson in the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Oliver said that the government had not received a copy of the report of H. Rider Haggard, secretary of the Imperial Fishery Commission, the workings of the Salvation Army colonies in the United States.

Mr. Oliver also informed Mr. Wilson that Mr. Neill, who was looking into the position of immigrants from boards of guardians in Britain had not made any proposal to the government, in reference to the immigration to Canada of selected children from English work-houses.

On motion to go into committee of supply Mr. Demers, of St. John's and Therville, brought up the Lake Champlain fishery dispute. He called the attention of the government to the fact that the legislature of the State of New York had passed an act forbidding the admission of Canadian-caught fish. This action had shut the Canadian fishermen out of a profitable market and had caused them considerable financial losses. The New York law was a retaliatory one passed because the Canadian government declined to make the regulations for fishing in Missisquoi Bay, which the United States authorities demanded. It was retaliatory legislation.

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There had often been trouble with the United States over fisheries. It was hard for Canada to get along harmoniously with the American fishermen. There had once been an agreement with the United States by which restrictions were placed upon fishing operations in Lake Champlain and Missisquoi Bay for the purpose of preserving the fisheries. In 1901-2 it was found that the United States fishermen were not living up to the agreement. They were setting open nets. Representations from Ottawa had produced no results, therefore licenses had been issued to Canadian fishermen to cast their nets in Missisquoi Bay and take their share of the fish of these waters.

The State of New York had discovered that the waters lying within Canada formed the best fishing grounds and an effort has been made to have the seining on the Canadian side stopped. In view of the past action of the United States fishermen the Canadian government had not seen its way clear to cancel the Missisquoi Bay licenses.

This was not the only fishery dispute between Canada and the United States or with one of the states. On the Pacific coast the American fishermen had for years been capturing Canadian salmon. It had been impossible to reach any sort of an agreement for the preservation of the fisheries there. Canada had offered to refer all differences over the fisheries to a commission, but so far nothing had been done in that direction. He hoped for a settlement of all differences some day. It would not be possible or politic to adopt the retaliatory measure suggested of placing the Chamby tolls.

F. D. Monk thought more was likely to be accomplished by peaceful negotiations than by hostile acts. If the tolls were replaced on the Chamby canal the Americans would not be the only sufferers. He thought that there should be no action taken until parliament had seen all the papers.

Hon. Mr. Prinfontaine promised to bring down all the information when his estimates were under discussion.

Mr. Boyce (Algoma) brought up in the case of James Dobbie, postmaster of Thessalon, who was in some difficulties and who was asked to resign on account of some shortage in funds, which were made good.

The postmaster general discovered that the postmaster was not guilty of any wrong doing, but some one close to him and therefore he was re-instated.

It appears that the postmaster's daughter is his assistant. At any rate the member for Algoma made a very bitter speech against the postmaster notwithstanding that Mr. Mulock gave him access to the correspondence, private and otherwise, which he (Mulock) said showed that no one could come to any other decision than what he had reached. He offered all the correspondence to the leader of the opposition who, he was satisfied, would have done as he did.

CALLED A CLERGYMAN.

St. Andrews Church of Sydney Wants Brantford Pastor.

Sydney, N. S., May 19.—(Special)—St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church of this city has extended a call to Rev. F. W. Anderson of Brantford, Ont., as successor to Rev. Clarence McKinnon, transferred to Winnipeg. It is understood that Rev. Mr. Anderson will accept the call.

ORDERED TO REST.

Ex-Attorney General Gibson Going to England for His Health.

Hamilton, Ont., May 19.—(Special)—Hon. J. M. Gibson, ex-attorney general, has been ordered by his physician to rest, and will leave shortly for a trip to England. His indisposition is said to be due to overwork while not in very good health.
