THE CHARGES FAILED.

Dairy Superintendents Vindicated Against the Accusations of Eveleigh of Sussex.

WHOSE MANAGEMENT OF THE CHEESE AND BUTTER CO. IS ATTACKED

Sussex, N. B., May 19.—A sweeping denial of the charges made by N. W. Eveleigh against Messrs. Harvey Mitchell, Frank Tilley and Daigle, as read in the legislature by B. F. Smith, M. P. P., was made yesterday at the investigation opened before Premier Tweedie.

Mr. Eveleigh was first called and stated that he never saw any indication of the dairy superintendents being drunk and did not intend to infer that at any time they were incapacitated through the influence of strong drink.

It was brought out during the course of the examination that some one he could not remember the name had called his attention to the condition of one of the instructors, but he had no personal knowledge further than that he had looked through the door and thought that something was wrong. Upon being asked by Hon. A. S. White, who was conducting the case for the commissioner of agriculture, what he saw that would confirm suspicion, he replied that he could not say.

The balance of Mr. Eveleigh's evidence was relative to his own management of the affairs of the Sussex Cheese and Butter Company.

SWEEPING DENIALS.

The other witnesses called were Robert Burns, Harry Hughes, James Murphy, Daniel Keith, R. T. McCready, Walter Nealy, John Conrad, Walter McMonagle, Henry S. Parlee, and Elkanah Hall, the first six names all being cheese or butter makers or students of the provincial dairy school, who swore that they had never seen any indications of liquor in the school building, neither had they any knowledge of the instructors drinking at any time. They also testified to the efficient manner in which the instructors had discharged their duties, as well as to the attention and assistance which had been rendered them from time to time by Harvey Mitchell, who super-

intends the work in this section, all speaking in the highest praise of Mr. Mitchell's work of instruction during the dairy season.

COMPLAINT AGAINST EVELEIGH

The others who gave evidence testified to the general management of the Sussex Cheese and Butter Company by Mr. Eveleigh, all of them having some cause for complaint. In the case of Mr. McMonagle, he said that he had been given credit for twenty-eight per cent. of butter fat in his cream during January and February when tested by Mr. Eveleigh, and of having received a test of forty-eight per cent. during March when tested by Mr. Mitchell, this being in face of the fact that through an abnormal condition of his separator the cream was thicker in February than it had been in March.

Mr. Hall testified that, not being satisfied with the returns given him by Mr. Eveleigh, he had withdrawn his patronage. He said that from 160 pounds of cream of the same quality he had been sending Mr. Eveleigh, he had made at home sixty-two pounds of butter, while he had received considerably less from the factory. He also said that he had received no credit on the sheet kept by Mr. Eveleigh for upwards of 300 pounds of cream delivered by him in June last, but after complaining in regard to returns received, Mr. Eveleigh gave him credit for the amount asked.

At the conclusion of this evidence the investigation was adjourned until Tuesday next, when a number of patrons will be called.

ANOTHER POLICE SENSATION.

Darby Ingalls, a Halifax Tough, Worked the Henry Moore Smith Game.

Another daring escape from the police station was effected here this morning by a man named Darby Ingalls, a notorious character from Halifax, who has been loafing about the city for several days, trying to enlist in the Royal Regiment.

Darby was arrested by Police Sergeant Phillips and Constable Hawthorne, on the strength of a telegram from Halifax, which stated that the fellow was wanted by the authorities of that place for escaping from the city prison. The officers found their man near the barracks gate and looked him up in the police station. He seemed to take the situation quite philosophically and readily admitted to parties who conversed with him in his cell that he was the man wanted. He even went further and boasted that he enjoyed quite a reputation as a jail breaker, having escaped from different prisons no less than five times. This information, so gratuitously furnished, was not accepted by the police as a warning, and no extra precautions were taken to guard the prisoner.

Shortly after twelve o'clock Sergeant Phillips procured some cabbages from the restaurant and gave them to Ingalls, and then went to his dinner. When he returned shortly after one o'clock he was greatly astonished to find that Ingalls had made his escape. He had in some manner broken the lock from his cell door, and, after accomplishing that much, his task was easy. The other lock between him and freedom was on the big door in the outer lobby, and he apparently had no difficulty in smashing that. Once in the open air the fellow probably lost no time in getting out of sight.

Sergeant Phillips reported the escape to the police magistrate and then started out to look for the prisoner. At last accounts he had not been successful in recapturing him.

The lock on the outside door which the prisoner smashed so easily was a new one, purchased a few weeks ago, shortly after Devine's escape from the police station. Sergeant Phillips, in conversation with The Herald, stated that he was at a loss to know how Ingalls got out of his cell. The padlock, he said, was protected by a piece of iron projecting outwards, and it would be impossible for a man in the cell to reach the lock with his hand. The officer was not inclined to think that Ingalls had help from outside, although he said that it was hard to see how it had been done otherwise. When he entered the station after dinner he found the door of Ingalls' cell open, and the padlock hanging on the door of an adjoining cell. Before leaving Ingalls he remarked to him that he thought that cell would hold him, and the prisoner laughingly replied "I guess so."

KILBURN'S DRIVE.

Well Known Fredericton Lumberman Has Six Millions Hung Up.

A crew of men who have been working on John Kilburn's drive on the Northwest branch of the St. John, arrived home by the I. C. R. express this afternoon. They report that Mr. Kilburn's drive of six million feet for W. H. Murray had to be abandoned on Tuesday last half a mile below English Lake. The crews had been working on the drive for twenty days, and succeeded in getting all of the logs out of the brooks but scarcity of water prevented them making much headway after that. They report that the snow is all gone from the Quebec woods, and the weather is getting quite mild. The drive hung up includes some old lumber of last year.

Mr. Kilburn is now on his way home, and is expected to reach here tomorrow. His numerous friends will be very sorry to learn of his failure to get his lumber drive out. As far as can be ascertained, the other drives on the upper St. John and tributaries are mostly all in safe water.

It has been raining here steadily all the forenoon and there has been a slight rise in the river.

TELEPHONE ENQUIRY.

Further Evidence Heard by the Parliamentary Committee at Ottawa.

Ottawa, May 19.—(Special)—E. Frenette, of Riviere du Loup, who is connected with the Kamouraska Telephone Company, was examined before the special committee on telephone lines today.

He said that the company got its charter in 1902, but 18 miles were constructed before that time. The capital of the company was placed at \$14,000.

Walter Crowe, barrister, of Sydney, N. S., secretary of the Eastern Telephone Company, said that the company had 916 telephones and a capital of \$215,000.

COURT UPHELD DECISION.

Judge Lafontaine Had Authority in Gaynor-Greene Case.

Montreal, May 19.—(Special)—The full bench of the court of Kings bench today upheld the decision of Justice Davidson in the superior court, who held that Judge Lafontaine, extradition commissioner, was qualified to sit in the extradition proceedings against Gaynor and Greene, wanted by the United States government.

The court held that the Dominion government had the right to appoint extradition commissioners.

OCEAN YACHT RACE.

Some of the Contestants Sighted Off Nantucket Light.

Newport, R. I., May 19.—(Special)—Nantucket lightship signalled the Government Wireless Station here at 8 a. m. today that the identity of the vessel sighted at midnight had

not been fully established, but there was little doubt that it was the ship Valhalla, one of the contestants in the ocean race for Emperor William's cup.

Additional yachts had been picked out at that hour.

The weather was fine and the light-ship reported a twenty-three mile southwest wind with the sea moderate to rough, and barometer at 26.28.

DEAD IN THEIR CABIN.

Mysterious Tragedy in Sandon Mining District.

Sandon, B. C., May 19.—(Special)—A friend going on a visit found a horrible state of affairs at the cabin of Gus and Charles Kurlin, a quarter of a mile east of Alamo Siding.

Both occupants were found dead one lying on the cabin bed with several ugly gashes on the head, evidently done with an axe, the other was lying on the floor with a double-barrelled shotgun near; the top of his head was blown off.

Nothing is missing from the cabin, the door was fastened on the inside, but the window was broken. There was not much signs of hard fighting. The deed appears to have been done by one brother killing the other while asleep and then committing suicide. Both men were steady workers in the mines around Sandon.

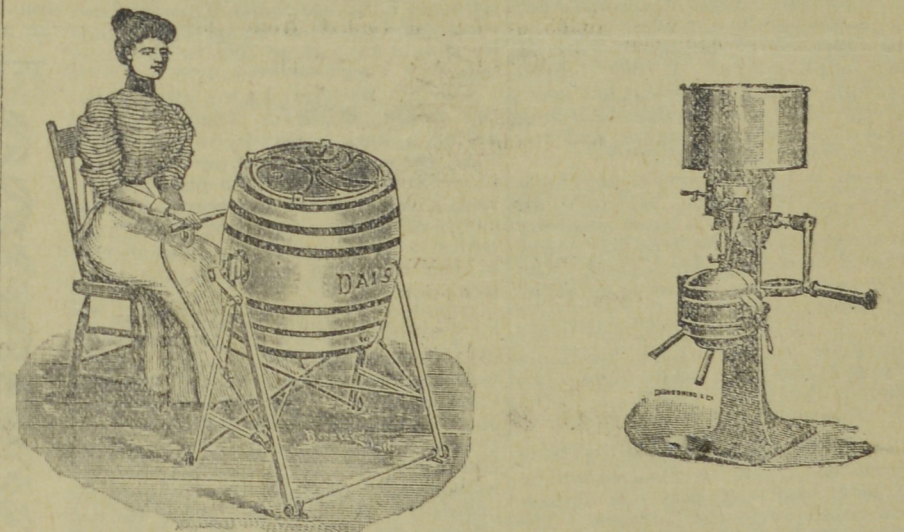

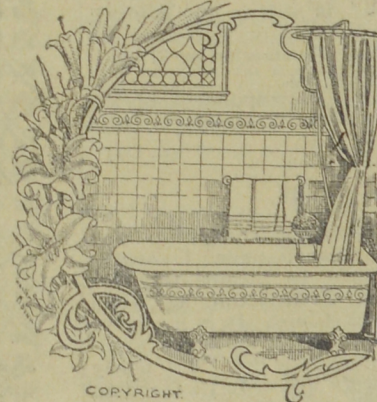
