JUDGE DOWNS'S DOG LEE.

Unfortunately He Died Without Making a Will.

Binghamton, N. Y., Feb. 23.—Judge F. W. Downs today applied to Surrogate Robert S. Parsons to appoint an administrator for the \$10,000 estate of the Judge's dog Lee.

Lee was run over by a fire engine last week and died before it was possible for him to make a will.

Judge Downs and Lee had equal affection for each other. The Judge is certain that had Lee made a will he would have been the sole heir. But, being a good lawyer, the Judge knows too that this certainty carries no weight in a Surrogate Court. So he wants an administrator appointed who will settle up the dog's estate on the principle that, as Judge Downs owned Lee he owns all that Lee owned.

A long time ago the Judge bought western mining stock of the par value of \$20,000. He came to regard the stock as worthless. About a year ago he heard that an assessment was to be levied on the stock.

So the astute Judge formally transferred the stock to Lee, remarking to the dog, "If any one can get money out of you, Lee, he's welcome to it." At which pleasantries Lee barked jovially and knowingly wagged his tail.

No assessment was made on the stock; the miners "struck it rich," and the stock is worth \$100,000 now. Sudden wealth had no effect on Lee. He was as grateful and loving as ever to Judge Downs. But unluckily Lee died intestate. He had no known relatives and the learned Judge considers himself legally and logically entitled to the dog's estate.

KILLING OF THE ATTACHES.

French and German Officers Thrown Overboard From a Junk.

Chefoo, Feb. 23.—The two Chinamen arrested here on charge of being concerned in the mysterious disappearance of Captain Von Gilgenheim and Lieutenant de Couverville, respectively the German and French naval attaches at Port Arthur, have given the following details of the affair:—

"The attaches and one Russian civilian embarked on a junk manned by five Chinese from Laoteishan. Fearing an approaching storm, the Chinese insisted on returning to Pigeon Bay, and the passengers attempted to force the Chinese

to continue the voyage. In a fight which followed the foreigners were thrown overboard. Fearing to return, the Chinese on the junk went to Liaochowfoo, north of Chefoo."

The junkmen were identified by refugees who hired the junk for the attaches at Port Arthur. The arrest of the three other Chinese implicated in the affair is impending.

BURNED BABY IN FURNACE.

A Horrible Crime Reported From Rochester.

Rochester, N. Y., Feb. 24.—One of the most shocking crimes in the history of this city was reported to the police tonight. G. W. McCaffrey, engineer in charge of an eighty-horsepower boiler in a building on Furnace street, used to heat several business places, told the story. He said that about 2 o'clock last Tuesday morning two men and a woman entered the boiler room and while one man covered him with a brace of revolvers the other threw a package into the firepot on the red-hot coals.

The woman uttered a shriek as he did so and one of the men threatened her life also. McCaffrey says he heard the screams of a baby as the package struck the fire. The men waited several minutes and then opened the furnace door again and raked the bundle about on the coals. Before leaving the men threatened to kill McCaffrey if he ever breathed a word of the matter.

FISH SEEKING FOR AIR.

Acres of Them Struggling in a Mass Five Feet Deep.

Watertown, S. D., Feb. 23.—One of the most remarkable sights that has ever been witnessed at Lake Kampeska was seen when millions of fish crowded into the outlet of the lake seeking air and water. The extremely cold weather froze the Sioux river to such a depth that in many places there is but little water left, and the swarms of fish seem to find it difficult to get a sufficient quantity of air. The funny tribe has therefore crowded into the outlet of Lake Kampeska until there are acres of struggling fish confined in a mass about five feet in depth and numbering millions.

In a few hours five waggon loads were taken out by men fishing with spears, rakes, poles, and even some using hands. Twenty and fifteen pound pickers were frequently scooped out, while the smaller fish, such as carp, suckers, buffalo perch and bullheads, were taken by the bushel basket full. Old fishermen say that they have never seen anything approximating the present condition in point of numbers. The channel into the lake is frozen solid, and therefore the retreat of the fish into the lake is cut off.

In Canada the number of cigarettes manufactured and sold increased from thirty-four millions in 1890 to eighty-three millions in 1895. One hundred and twenty three millions were manufactured in 1900, while in 1904 the output was two hundred and sixteen millions.

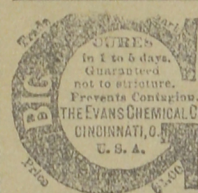

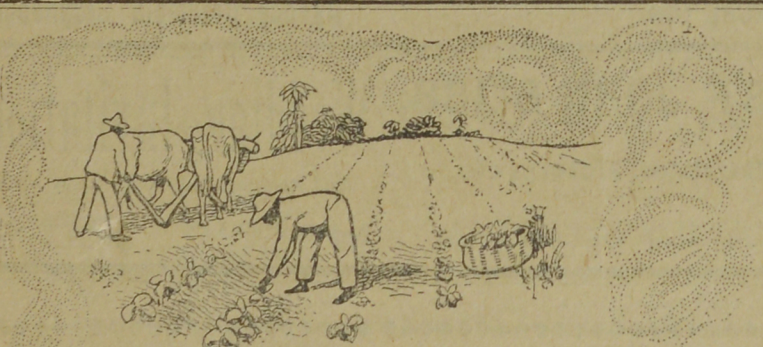
