SUGGESTION FOR THE COUNCIL.

It is said that Prof. Muir Edwards the gentleman chosen to succeed Prof. Jack as head of the engineering department of the University of New Brunswick, is not likely to accept the position unless the salary offered is increased, and the suggestion is made to the Herald by a friend of the university that as the new professor whoever he may be, will probably be appointed city engineer, which position does not carry any salary, the city council might guarantee Prof. Edwards a retainer of \$100 a year as an incentive, or him to accept the professorship.

The matter is to be brought before the city council tomorrow evening, our informant says, and the idea is well worthy the consideration of that body. The university is an institution of inestimable benefit to Fredericton, not only as a money spender, but as furnishing to Fredericton young men a liberal education at a merely nominal cost, and the city council as in the past, will no doubt very carefully consider any reasonable suggestions for aiding the cap stone of our educational system.

Prof. Edwards is said to be well qualified for the position to which he has been appointed by the Senate, which has gone to their limit in fixing his salary, and it would be a pity if the lack of another \$100 should result in his declining the position.

The gentleman who has communicated with the Herald respecting the matter has this to say, and we take the liberty of quoting from his letter, although it was not written for publication:

"It is going to be difficult to procure a professor for the Civil Engineering course at the college at the present salary, and the man appointed is apparently unwilling to come at the salary named. Now my idea is that the city council, which is going to appoint the professor, whoever he may be, city engineer, should give him a retainer of at least \$100 per annum. The city will not lose by it, as they sadly need some advice and suggestions from an engineer as to the condition of the streets and sidewalks, and besides they will be an engineer's advice as to the sewerage and water supply, etc. The matter will be brought up before the council next Tuesday night. Will you give the idea a good word in the Herald Monday night? The city should at least help the U. N. B. to that extent, considering the benefits derived from having the college here."

WELCOME TO THE BISHOP.

A very hearty welcome awaits His Lordship Bishop Casey at St. Dunstan's Church this evening, and generally from his former fellow citizens of Fredericton of all classes, who recognize in His Lordship not only a popular and efficient Bishop, but a gentleman of wide culture, genial personality, and an earnest, faithful exemplar of the Christian church, broad in his views, an earnest student, and a man of true nobility.

Since last the Bishop visited Fredericton he has made a lengthy tour of Europe and the Holy Land, has paid homage to the head of his church, and comes back to his people refreshed for his responsible duties. His visit to this county at the present time is to dedicate a new church at Kingsclear, which through the energetic labor of Rev. Father LeBlanc has risen from the ashes of a historic structure burned only fifteen months ago, and the people of St. Dunstan's congregation are taking advantage of His Lordship's presence in the city this evening to offer their felicitations on his safe return from his trip, and from the immediate presence of His Holiness the Pope, and to bid him Godspeed in his mission.

The Herald heartily joins in the welcome to His Lordship, and wishes him continued health, prosperity and happiness.

THE TROUBLE REMOVED.

It will be satisfaction to the public to learn that the threatened trouble on the upper St. John river between the VanBuren Lumber Company and Mr. Pond, has apparently been averted, and that a spirit of compromise has led to a practical removal of the difficulty pending the action of the courts.

According to our advices the

objectionable booms which interfered with the driving of New Brunswick lumber, have been removed, and all danger of bloodshed and international complications have been removed.

This is no doubt due largely to the pacific advice of Attorney General Pugsley, who has the legal matter in hand, and the people directly concerned as well as the general public, are under obligations to Dr. Pugsley for having assisted in smoothing out the difficulty and relieving the province of threatening and unpleasant conditions.

JAPANESE GALLANTRY.

Admiral Rojestvensky, who is recuperating at a Japanese hospital, from wounds he received in the recent great naval battle in which his fleet was annihilated and himself made prisoner, finds that his successful foes are generous and gallant as well as brave and resourceful.

In his confinement the Russian admiral has received a visit from his antagonist and conqueror, Admiral Togo, who spoke kindly words to the fallen foe, and the secretary of the Japanese navy sent a bouquet to Rojestvensky with a thoughtful message of sympathy.

If these Japanese officers are not Christians, they are mighty near that type of humanity in virtues. No heathen at heart would exhibit such generosity and gallantry.

While public attention to the war in the east is now riveted on the forces which are likely to meet at any moment, Vladivostok is always a theatre of important pending events. It is believed that the great fortress will be isolated and besieged by the Japs as soon as their ships recover sufficiently from the effects of the recent naval fight. Already the Russians have passed an order notifying all non-combatants to leave Vladivostok.

Three more Russian ships have turned up arriving at Manila, Philippine Islands, in a battered condition with many wounded on board. Two others reached Vladivostok and these five are all of Rojestvensky's proud fleet that have been seen since the great naval fight, except those in the custody of the Japs.

A former popular Fredericton pastor, Rev. J. D. Freeman, now in charge of the Bloor street Baptist church, Toronto, is to attend the great World's Baptist Conference at London, next month, and will have the honor of reading a paper before that distinguished body.

GIBSON NEWS.

June 5.—The funeral of Mr. James A. Ruel, C. E., took place from his late residence at 11.30 yesterday morning, and was very largely attended. Several of the deceased's companions from Fredericton attended to pay their last tribute to a true and esteemed friend. Among them were Capt. Perkins, Sergt. Cochrane, and the Messrs. Coy and Smith, who with the late Mr. Ruel were members of the same company that were called to St. Andrews in 1866, it being the time of the Fenian Raid. Services were conducted at the house and the church by Rev. Dr. Duffy and the choir of the Church of England rendered some favorite hymns. The floral offerings were certainly beautiful and showed in what high esteem Mr. Ruel was held in his own community. Interment was at the Church of England burying ground at Upper Margerville. John G. Adams was the undertaker in charge.

There was a large congregation at the English Church yesterday afternoon when Rev. Mr. Forster, curate at St. Ann's, Fredericton, preached a very interesting sermon to men only, the members of the Rector's Aid attending the service in a body. In the evening Rev. Mr. Forster again preached in his usual able manner, this service being for both men and women.

There is to be a Baptist convention in the Baptist Church, beginning on Friday, June 23rd, to continue for three days.

VETERAN TO RETIRE.

Lieut. Col. Loggie's Tenure of Command in the 71st Has Expired.

It is understood that Lieut. Col. Loggie, commanding officer of the 71st Regiment, is shortly to be placed on the reserve of officers, and Major J. D. Chipman of St. Stephen, promoted to the colonelcy. Col. Loggie has been connected with the militia since boyhood, being identified for some years with the 73rd Regiment of Northumberland, before joining the 71st. He has long taken a warm interest in rifle shooting and is recognized as one of the best marksmen of the province. Three times he represented Canada at Wimbledon, and on one occasion helped to win the Kolapore Cup. The colonel's retirement will be a distinct loss to the militia. No doubt he will have frequent opportunities to do staff duty. He was appointed colonel of the 71st in May, 1900, so his tenure of command expired last month.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

Fred Isaac, an I. C. R. brakeman, had his arm and leg crushed and badly broken up generally while shunting in the Moncton I. C. R. yard Wednesday last, and died in the hospital Sunday morning.

E. H. Sampson, who died at his home at Cole's Island, Queens County, on May 19th, was a veteran of the American civil war, having served throughout nearly the whole war. He was born in Maine, but had lived in New Brunswick some years.

The death of Mrs. Sarah McIvor Dean of Dighton, Mass., was caused by poisoning, brought on by sprinkling hellebore on current bushes. Some of the powder entered the blood through a cut in her thumb, which had not entirely healed.

During the fog off Dungeness early Saturday morning the British battleship Caesar, of the Channel fleet, collided with the British bark Afghanistan. The Afghanistan sank two minutes after the collision. The crew of thirty-four were picked up.

As a result of an investigation by the police committee the entire night police force of Yarmouth, N. S., sergeant and two patrolmen, tendered their resignations Saturday. The men were charged by the chief with not always being on their beats at night.

Mrs. Stanford left to the university that was named for her son, besides the bulk of her great fortune, all her jewels, which included five sets that belonged to Queen Isabella of Spain. These are valued at \$1,000,000, and they are soon to be sold at auction for the benefit of the university.

The death took place very suddenly Friday evening at Montreal of Miss Osla Clouston, eldest daughter of E. S. Clouston, general manager of the Bank of Montreal. Mrs. Clouston and her two daughters returned from Europe Thursday, leaving Mr. Clouston to return later. Miss Clouston was dressing to go out to dinner with a party of friends when she suddenly collapsed and expired in a few minutes. Her death is attributed to heart failure. Miss Clouston, who was twenty-two years old, was to have been one of the bridesmaids at the Beaudmoro-MacKenzie wedding next week, which was to be one of the most fashionable of the season.

The Chicago strike is again assuming a serious condition. Yesterday twenty policemen fought with a crowd of 1,500 persons for twenty minutes, two officers being nearly killed. The rioting at this point was followed by another disturbance in the same vicinity. In the first riot two deputy sheriffs became excited and discharged their revolvers toward the crowd. It was later reported that a twelve-year-old boy had been shot. The shots attracted a crowd of 1,200. Policemen Hanson and Larsen used their clubs freely to beat back the mob and were almost killed in doing so. Additional officers were sent to the scene and Hanson and Larsen, bleeding and nearly exhausted, were rescued.

Among the passengers from Montreal to St. John Saturday was little Amy Constance, the youngest daughter of B. Johnson Franklin. The little miss had just completed a journey from England by the Steamer Tunisian to Montreal, and as she is only four years old that is quite a feat. Mr. Franklin came from England last year with his two other daughters, but as the little tot was quite ill she could not be brought, and so was left in good care at Liverpool. Now she is strong and hearty, with rosy cheeks that are good to look upon and she is one of the happiest little girls in the city because she is with her father and brothers, and needless to say they are delighted at having her with them again.

A frightful explosion occurred on the Sydney and Louisburg locomotive Saturday morning, when it was being taken out of the repair shop at Glace Bay, and as a result Jonathan Tutty will probably die and Albert Macken-

zie is very seriously injured. Both men were on the engine at the time and were hurled with terrific force to the ground several yards away. The top gear of the locomotive was thrown some hundred yards distant. The engine is a total wreck. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

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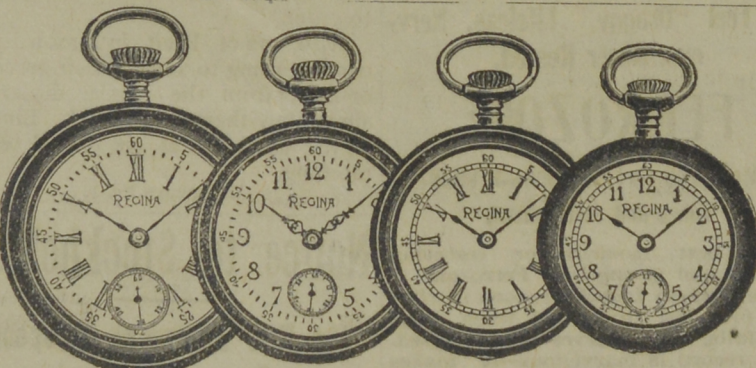

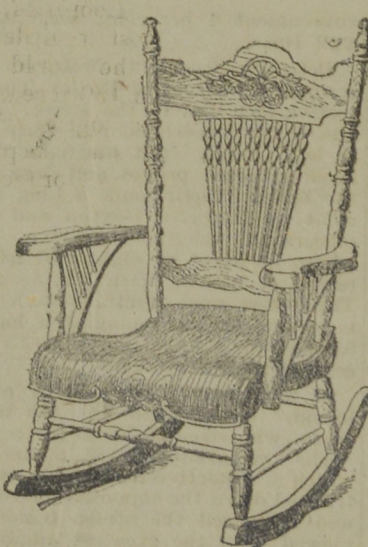
