DOING GOOD WORK.

Fredericton Young Lady Tells of Victorian Order of Nurses.

Telegraph.—Miss Margaret H. Allen, superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses, arrived in the city Saturday from Ottawa. Miss Allen, who is a native of Fredericton, a granddaughter of the late Sir John C. Allen, chief justice, and a graduate of the Waltham, Mass., Hospital, is on her annual tour of inspection, this being her second visit here in her capacity as superintendent.

To a Telegraph reporter last night Miss Allen said: "The people do not begin to know the work the order is doing. In western Canada especially we are getting a strong foothold. We have just given a grant of \$2,000 to the Victorian Order Hospital at New Liskeard, 113 miles north of North Bay, Ont., on the line of the Tamsicamung Railway, a line lately built from North Bay. At a meeting I attended there lately one man gave three acres of land and \$75 was collected from those present."

This town, Miss Allen says, has been in existence only ten years. It is in the heart of a district that is very rich in minerals, and the hospital will be of great assistance to miners and those working on the new road.

The order, Miss Allen says, is also opening a hospital at Rock Bay, 130 miles down the coast from Vancouver, on Vancouver Island. There are three or four logging camps there and boats touch there only once in three or four days. A number of men have died there of late for the want of proper surgical attendance, there being no doctors. Miss Sutherland, the nurse who is going there, and her housekeeper, are the only two women in the place.

A hospital that is also doing good work is at Arrow Head, on the Kootenay lakes, and one of which, Miss Allen says, the order is especially proud is that at Indian Head (B. C.). The people of the locality built this hospital themselves and asked that the order take charge and send nurses.

Among other places in the west where the order has hospitals are Swan River, 270 miles from Winnipeg; Revelstoke, Fort Francis, Red Deer, Indian Head and Copper Head.

"We have," said Miss Allen, "seventy-seven hospitals and fifteen districts. In Toronto the order has a well equipped training school where it is necessary to take a four months' course before going out in a district. If the central fund only had an endowment fund we could do so much more as we now are daily refusing calls for help."

Miss Allen will leave for Fredericton this evening, returning the next day, when she will go to Nova Scotia.

AGED CITIZEN DEAD.

Mr. Robert H. Rainsford Passed Away on Saturday.

Mr. Robert H. Rainsford, a well known and respected citizen, passed away on Saturday afternoon at his home on Smythe Street. He had not enjoyed good health for some time, and a few days ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis, which hastened the end.

The deceased gentleman was a member of an old and well known family, his father being the late Capt. Andrew Rainsford, who won considerable distinction as an officer of the famous 104th Regiment. He was born at Lepreire, P. Q., but was a resident of this city the greater part of his life. At one time he carried on a large grocery business in partnership with his brother, and four some years had the contract for conveying the mails between Fredericton and Woodstock. For several years past he has performed the duties of market clerk. He had a very large circle of acquaintances who will regret to learn of his death.

The deceased gentleman was seventy-eight years of age and a widower, his wife having died two years ago. He leaves no children, his nearest relatives being two sisters, Mrs. Andrew Phair who resides here, and Mrs. Adams of St. John.

The funeral took place at four o'clock this afternoon, and was attended by a large number of relatives and friends. The remains were taken to St. Ann's Church, where an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Roberts. Interment was made in the family lot at the old burying ground. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT.

old fences, vacant lots, burdocks, weeds, unswept sidewalks, scattered papers and handbills.

These men could also make suggestions as to other work, and improvements, or everything which will add beauty in anyway to the city.

Garbage cans could be placed in each block and give Mr. Doohan a job to supervise the carrying away and dumping the rubbish behind the city hall. Or on the other hand, hand over this latter part to the board of health and appoint a committee of women to look after them, everybody knows what that would mean, they would give them no peace until it was done and done right.

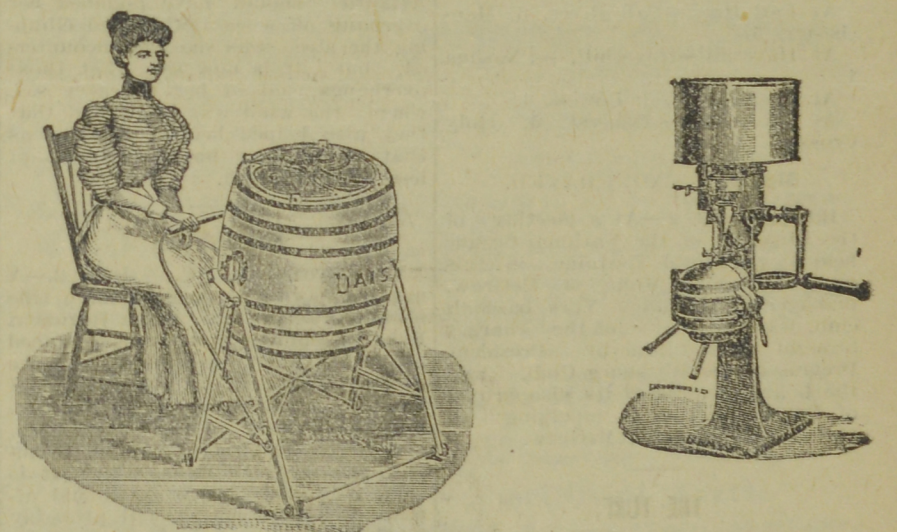
