MCGRAW EXONERATED.

Boston, June 2.—At a meeting of the Directors of the National League held at the Hotel Touraine, in this city, yesterday, John J. McGraw, manager of the New York baseball club, was exonerated of the charges brought against him by President Dreyfus of the Pittsburgh Club, and the board expressed its disapproval of Dreyfus' action in indulging in the controversy with McGraw.

THE TURF.

New York, June 2.—Millard Sanders has his own ideas about the relative speed merits of Major Delmar and Lou Dillon, and if they ever meet and there is an opportunity offered to place a bet on the result of the meeting between the two-minute trotters, Sanders intends to back his opinion in a substantial cash consideration. The man who trained and drove Lou Dillon to her mark of 1.58 1/2, says:
"I don't like to talk of betting on Lou, for I know no one will drive her this year, except possibly Mr. Billings. I have too much respect for his feelings to offer to wager on Lou Dillon while he is driving, knowing that he does not endorse betting on amateur events, but I have \$5,000 that I would like to place against a similar amount that Lou Dillon beats Major Delmar when they meet."
"As I understand it, they are to clash at Cleveland, Mr. Billings to drive the mare and Harry Devereux to drive the Major. The public will see then that Lou Dillon has more speed than any other trotter living or any one that ever lived. Major Delmar's victory over her in the Memphis gold cup race last year was a fluke, plain and simple."
"Lou had thumps. She had never been in condition during the entire year except right at the start. I was interfered with in my plans of training, and by the time I was forced to keep her on a two-minute edge until the late fall meeting at Memphis she grew more nervous and finally collapsed."
"She can beat Major Delmar at any distance, and I believe from my experience with her that she will go further any longer than the rugged Major. Time alone will tell. At any rate, I would like to pick up \$5,000 on her beating Major Delmar in mile heats, two in three, such as they will have during the summer."

JOCKEY TO RETIRE.

New York, June 2.—Eugene Hildebrand, probably the greatest jockey in the United States, may never be seen in the saddle again. One suspicious ride may cut short his career. Other popular idols of the turf have passed over the same route.
The stewards of the Gravesend meeting took official action on Tuesday which may end his career and deprive Harry Payne Whitney of his services, upon which so much of the

stable's success in the big stake races depends. Mr. Whitney is paying \$10,000 a year for the first call on the jockey, and Hildebrand's entire earnings for a year will probably total \$50,000.

This latest turf scandal was caused by the ride of Hildebrand on Mr. Whitney's Duenna last Friday, when that filly was beaten by the heavily-backed favorite, Last Cherry, and brought hisses for the jockey from the race-goers. The stewards of the meeting, P. J. Dwyer, Andrew Miller and J. G. Follanshee, immediately began an investigation, and made the following announcement:

"Hildebrand's ride on Duenna was so incompetent that he has been set down for the rest of the meeting, and his case referred to the stewards of the Jockey Club."

This action is the most drastic that the stewards could take, and indicates that they found sufficient cause for complaint against Hildebrand to make it certain that the Jockey Club will inflict further punishment.

It was the general belief that among well informed racing men that Hildebrand is in grave danger of being ruled off the turf for life.

YACHTING.

The result of the great ocean yacht race should encourage those who have steadfastly maintained that our amateur designers, Duggan and Sherwood, could design a successful America's cup boat. The most important feature of the race was the fact that a schooner of up to date model won and broke three records. Breaking records is of more significance than winning the race, because a race may be won by the misfortune of an opponent, while the breaking of all records can be accomplished only by the merit of the winner.

The Atlantic is not a skimming dish, but she is an American model, built in 1903, since the last America Cup Race. She has a long overhang at each end, and her prow is more of the spoon shape than was that of the Vigilant, the first cup defender, built after the advent of the Gloria, Herreshoff's original departure from ancient lines. With overall length of 187 feet, to water line length of 135 and extreme beam of 31 feet, to draft of 16.5 the Atlantic is the nearest approach to the racing machine among the racers.

According to the critics who have scoffed at the racing machines that have defended the America cup, the Atlantic should have pounded her overhang off when taking and climbing the steep seas she has encountered, but it is now seen that those overhangs enabled her to carry sail when the wind was high, and that they also helped her to mount seas that would have boarded vessels of less overall length.

Rod and Gun.

Vancouver, B. C., June 2.—A meeting has been arranged for a rifle shoot between the Sixth Regiment Duke of Connaught's Own, stationed here at New Westminster, and the Second Regiment of the National Guard, of the State of Washington. Captain McHarg, of the Duke's Own, and Brigadier General Drake, Olympia, arranged the meet, which, it is said, will likely prove an annual affair. The first match will probably be shot at Lulu Island, B. C., next month.

A NEW CLUB RECORD.

At Duluth, Minn., April 8, Mr. A. A. Farrington, shooting under the name of "Cap," made the highest score ever made on the grounds of the Duluth Gun Club. Mr. Farrington's shooting at this time proved that he is one of the best marksmen in the Northwest. He made a run of 91 straight, finishing 100 with a score of 99. In making this score Mr. Farrington used U. M. C. "Arrow" shells.

Fox Hounds.

On board the steamer Winifredian which arrived last month from Liverpool, were 40 valuable fox hounds, which had been brought over for A. Henry Higginson. They are all blooded animals, taken from some of the best English packs. They will be taken to Lincoln to the Middlessex Hunt, where they will be used for breeding purposes. Robert Cotesworth, huntsman for Mr. Higginson, met the dogs at the pier. This is the fourth batch of fox hounds imported for Mr. Higginson from England. Included in the last batch were a number of crack hunters, and they will be match in November with the Grafton hounds, owned by Harry W. Smith. This match will be held at Piedmont, Va., for \$1000.

U. S. LADIES OUT OF IT.

London, June 2.—The chances of the Americans securing the ladies' golf championship at Cromer disappeared with the sixth round. The Englishwomen are breathing easier, as golf experts were beginning to think that the visitors would go to the final round.

The defeat of Miss Margaret Curtis, of Massachusetts, at the 19th hole, was a disappointment to a large number. A big gallery followed this match, which was the best up to the present. Miss Curtis lost on a faulty short put, after a brilliant game with the experienced champion player, Miss Thompson.

Miss Adams, the last of the American players left in the contest, was defeated in the sixth round by Mrs. Brown by five up and four to play.

THE FUTURE OF MANCHURIA.

Baron Kaneko's Notion of what Japan Should do if Finally Victorious.

In Public Opinion Albert Britt gives the substance of a recent interview with Baron Kaneko, a well known Japanese statesman and a former member of the Mikado's cabinet, who is now in the United States on a government mission. One of the most interesting points which the Baron made was that relating to the attitude of Japan toward Manchuria in the event of ultimate victory over Russia.

"The first step," replied the Baron, "will be to open Manchuria to the traders of the world alike, and to establish the industries of the province on a firm and prosperous basis. We are fighting for an equal share for all nations in the development of Manchuria. We are fighting for the freedom of the world's commerce, and not for a monopoly of Manchuria. When Russia came in after our war with China, she drove out the foreign enterprises. The Chinese officials who were nominally in control of the province might grant a license to a foreigner to trade, to mine, to manufacture, but unless it was viced by the Russian official it was worthless."

"Manchuria, prosperous, is merely the opening wedge to China. The Chinese question still looms large and forbidding. If Japan, by throwing open Manchuria to the world, by establishing peace and prosperity there, can impress upon the minds of the Chinese merchants that here is a lesson they will do well to imitate, the whole eighteen provinces may yet be opened up. It is a gigantic experiment that we are taking upon our hands. The Chinese of the southern provinces must learn by the experience of the Manchurians

MR. FACING-BOTH-WAYS.

Being Some Further Account of Hon. Geo. E. Foster's Moment of Weakness.

Toronto Globe.—The electors of North Oxford and of London are being treated to much eloquence in support of the Conservative candidates, and ostensibly in support also of the sound doctrines of provincial rights. The chief orator is Hon. Geo. E. Foster, the man with a past. Do the electors remember that when Mr. Foster last had a chance to act a serious part in public affairs nine years ago he was the chief lieutenant of Sir Charles Tupper in seeking to coerce the Province of Manitoba into the restoration of the separate school system deliberately abolished by the legislature? The London and North Oxford electors are invited to clip out the following extracts from Hansard, giving a portion of Mr. Foster's remarks on the remedial bill, and compare the "Hands off" Foster of 1896 with the "Hands off" Foster of today:

"The assertion is made in this house, and in the country as well, that for the Dominion parliament to attempt to legislate on this subject is to interfere with and invade provincial rights. I beg to state my humble opinion that it cannot be fairly maintained either in this house or in the country, looking to the distribution of powers by the Confederation Act, where the jurisdiction is plain and unequivocal that for the parliament to exercise its powers, to exercise its jurisdiction, is to interfere with any rights that belong to the province in question, is this question, at this time, or of any other province, if this question touching any other province were to come up."

"This side issue has taken the pop-

ular form of a cry "Hands off Manitoba." In reality it seems to me the proper opinion that contemplated by the constitution, that carried out by the practice of this country, up to the present time, is not embodied in that cry but would be better expressed in the statement that THE MAJORITY OF MANITOBA SHOULD HAVE KEPT "HANDS OFF" THE PRIVILEGES OF A MINORITY, which privileges were given under the constitution, and were supposed to be secured to them by the constitution."

"Another side issue that is brought up is the question of separate schools, and men range themselves in opposition to remedial legislation because, forsooth, they do not believe in the principles of separate schools. Sir, the question whether separate schools should or should not be established is one which might well have been debated in 1867 and 1870, when these schools were being perpetuated under the Confederation Acts. But it is not a principle which is at stake today in the least degree; and, for my own part, I believe that I have no right to take my preference on that principle into consideration in the least on this occasion, but that I am now called upon to deal with the question of a clause of the constitution, and a case which arises out of it, in which that principle was settled once and for all in regard to the minority's right by the fathers of Confederation, and embodied in the constitution itself."

I believe that they are ready for the lesson. As merchants they are astute, quick to seize upon every advantage, ready to learn what outsiders may have to teach them.

"In addition to that the Chinese of Manchuria and of the northern provinces generally have learned a bitter lesson from Russia in the last seven years. They have been cruelly treated and despoiled of their property. Under the mild and civilizing rule that will follow a conclusion of the war, the country will come into a new life. The attitude of the present dynasty in China counts for little. The rulers have practically no control over the acts of individuals, especially in the far provinces of the empire. If the Chinese of the south see the Manchurians prospering under the new condition they will join the procession. All that we of Japan can do is to give good advice and to see to it as far as possible, that conditions are kept free and favorable. If the experiment fails, the Chinese empire is lost. It is her one chance, and if she fails to use it, it

will probably never come again."

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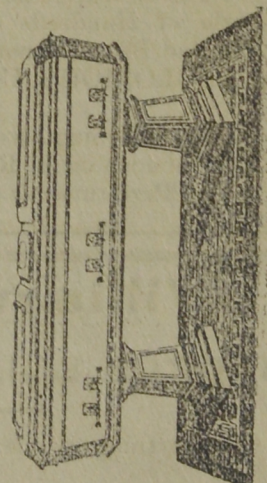
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
