LAST SAD TRIBUTE.

Funeral of the Late Miss Frances
Fisher Very Largely Attended.

The esteem in which the late Miss Frances Fisher was held in the community was attested this afternoon by the large number of prominent citizens assembled to pay their last tribute to her memory.

The funeral took place from Mrs. Fraser's residence, Farralline place at three o'clock. The remains which were encased in a beautiful cloth covered casket with oxidized silver mountings, were conveyed to Christ church cathedral, where an impressive funeral service was conducted in the presence of a large congregation. The Very Rev. Dean Partridge, was the officiating clergyman and the Lord Bishop and Rev. sub-dean Kent also took part.

Prof. Powell presided at the organ and the choir rendered with splendid effect the beautiful hymns "Hark the Resurrection morning," "Peace, Perfect Peace," and "Rock of Ages, cleft for me."

At the conclusion of the service the funeral cortege reformed and slowly wended its way to Forest Hill cemetery where interment was made in the family lot.

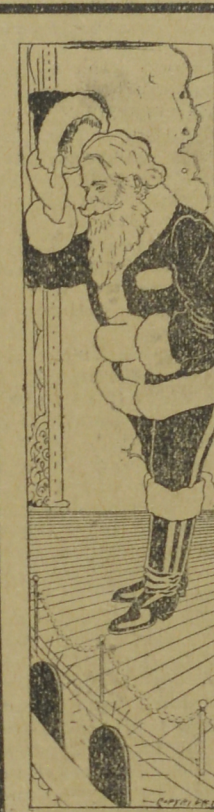
