MAY BE BLOODSHED.

Yankee Obstructionists of St. John
River NavigationGUARDING THEIR BOOMS WITH WINCHES-
TER RIFLES.Dastardly Treatment of Mr. Pond and His
Men of the Corporation Drive.REFUSED PASSAGE OF THE BOOMS, THEIR BOATS
WITH FOOD SUPPLIES SENT ADRIFT.Sheriff of Madawaska with Posse and Armed Drivers
Will Oppose Force with Force.CONDITION OF AFFAIRS THAT MAY LEAD TO SERIOUS STRAIN OF IN-
TERNATIONAL RELATIONS.

Grand Falls, May 31.—(Special.)—On Sunday, when Mr. Pond, who has charge of the corporation drive from Edmundston to Grand Falls, reached St. Leonards, opposite Van Puren, Mr., with the drive, he encountered the first boom of the Van Buren Lumber Company, obstructing the passage.

He cut the boom and passed safely through with his men and boats. When the second boom was reached an insurmountable difficulty arose.

Having anticipated trouble Saturday morning, Mr. Pond had telegraphed to the sheriff of Madawaska and the Maine sheriff at St. Francis, to be on the scene and afford him protection.

The Sheriffs did not show up, and when Mr. Pond arrived at the second boom of the Van Buren Co., Allan Hammon, president of the company, and twenty Americans armed with Winchester, stood on the Van Buren shore and threatened to shoot the first man who touched the boom.

Mr. Pond's drivers were unarmed and after demanding a passage he declared he would hold Hammon and his company responsible for the delay and would sue Allen for dam-

ages if forced to hang up the drive. Sunday night the trees to which Mr. Pond had tied his boats were cut down, and the boats containing all the food supplies for the men were adrift.

The same night three of Pond's sheer booms below St. Leonards were cut and sent adrift. One of the booms is now hung on a pier of the Grand Falls railway bridge, obstructing the channel.

One shot was fired at Mr. Pond at the second boom.

The booms of the St. John Lumber Company, another concern operating on the river, were blown up by dynamite on Monday night.

Further trouble is expected. The drivers are angry, and in an ugly state of mind.

A report reached here last night that Mr. Pond had armed his men with Winchester, and, supported by the sheriff of Madawaska with a posse, intends to again demand a passage today, and, if refused, to cut the boom, and repel force with force. Armed Americans are entrenched on the shore to guard the boom night and day.

NATION'S THANKS TO TOGO.

A Nation's Thanks.

Tokio, May 31.—Admiral Yamamoto, minister of the navy, today sent the following telegram to Admiral Togo. "The enemy's second and third squadrons successfully overcoming difficulties of voyage eastward, showed themselves no mean power, but your squadron intercepting them in advance of their destination, put them to confusion, and destroyed and captured nearly all their units."

"Your victory does not end here, you captured the enemy's command-

er-in-chief, and it is most gratifying to the national cause that you achieved such a victory.

"We send sincere congratulations, and take occasion to praise the virtue of the emperor, to thank you and those under you for your service extending over many months, and to express sympathy for the killed and wounded."

Nothing In It.

St. Petersburg, May 31.—1.30 p. m.—The Admiralty denies the report telegraphed to the London Daily Express that cruiser Gromoboi, of the Vladivostok squadron, has been sunk with nearly 800 men on board.

The Gromoboi sailed out of Vladivostok Saturday, as soon as Admiral Rojestvensky was reported to have arrived in the Straits of Korea, but the admiralty declines to say whether the Gromoboi was engaged.

No Further News.

The admiralty had no further news to communicate this morning.

A report of the battle however, has been received from the captain of the Russian transport Korean, and it is understood that the emperor received a communication from Japan possibly from Rear Admiral Nebogatoff or Admiral Rojestvensky.

In Blissful Ignorance.

St. Petersburg, May 31.—Despatches from the front say that the news of Admiral Rojestvensky's defeat, has not yet been made known to the Russian armies in Manchuria and the soldiers are still hoping for a Russian naval victory.

The non-commissioned officers and men of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry stationed at Stanley Barracks, Toronto, have received orders from Ottawa to prepare to leave for Halifax, where they will form part of the force being organized to take over the defences from the Imperial troops. The wives and children of the men are directed to be left in Toronto for the present as there is no accommodation for them in Halifax.
