

TOGO, HERO OF THE HOUR.

Rose From Humble Station to World Wide Eminence.

OF SAMURIA GLASS, A NAVAL STUDENT IN ENGLAND,

He Sank First Ship in Chinese War and Won Great Fame at Port Arthur.

Admiral Togo, commander-in-chief of practically the entire Japanese navy for the battle with Rojestvensky, has won in the past 14 months a high place among the greatest naval victors by utterly destroying a powerful fleet of the most modern battleships and making possible Japan's signal victories on land.

Togo learned his naval science in England. He is about 55 years of age. He is not of princely or noble birth, but is a simple gentleman, a Samurai of the great Satsuma clan, as so many of his fellow officers are. Admiral Togo received a great part of his education at the naval college, Greenwich, Eng., where he went through the regular courses of instruction current some 30 odd years ago. He also attended the Incorporated Thames Nautical Training College, H. M. S. Worcester, studying on that ship during 1873 and 1874. The records of the college show that he was a diligent student and a well behaved young man.

He thus understands a good deal of the history, training and traditions of the British navy, and he has brought the knowledge thus acquired to bear on his own with excellent effect.

Returning to Japan, he was employed in various capacities. In 1894 when war broke out between China and Japan, he was in command of the Naniwa, a cruiser of 3650 tons, one of the vessels composing what was then known as the first flying squadron of the Japanese navy. During the war he greatly distinguished himself, and earned the reputation of being a first class fighting man.

It was in connection with the episode of the sinking of the Kowshing that his name first came into world-wide prominence. At the time some adverse criticisms of his action on that occasion were heard, but these died away on a fuller knowledge of the circumstances. The story reveals something of the character of the man.

During 1894, though there had been no actual declaration of war, it was evident that Japan and China were about to fight over Korea. Warships had been assembled, and large bodies of troops were either on the field or were on the way to the scene of conflict. The Kowshing, a transport vessel flying the British flag, with a British captain and crew, and carrying some 1100 Chinese soldiers for Asan, was met by Togo in the Naniwa, who signalled to her by firing two blank cartridges to stop, which she did. Thereafter a Japanese lieutenant went on board the Kowshing with a peremptory order from Togo that the transport must proceed no farther toward her destination, but at once accompany the Naniwa to the main Japanese fleet. Capt. Galsworthy of the Kowshing, who also was educated on the Worcester, was willing to obey these orders, but not so minded were the officers of the Chinese forces on the vessel; they immediately raised a great clamor and threatened Galsworthy.

DOLLARS, NOT AUTONOMY.

Only Kind of Bill the West is Thinking About.

Toronto Globe.—The Rev. G. M. Milligan, D. D., LL. D., moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, preached at Old St. Andrew's church Sunday after his recent visit to the west. At the evening service he took for his text Ephesians ii, 15: "Having abolished in his flesh the enmity, even the law of commandments contained in the ordinances; for to make in himself of twain one new man, so making peace." In the course of his remarks he said the dependence of every country for its unification was upon the Gospel. As his hearers were aware, he had been away to the western land. His visit was worth the journey ten times over, for he was glad to say that in the new land there were elements for unification, for the reception of the Gospel. It was a young land, and had the characteristic of youth that it was hopeful. In the

west everything was unformed, there was no sticking for form; perhaps there was not form enough, and yet it was an advantage. He had been asked what people out there thought about the autonomy bill. Well, he did not know that they thought much about it; indeed, he did not know that they thought much about any bills except dollar bills. (Laughter.)

The preacher alluded to the growth of certain towns out there since his visit fifteen years since, and spoke highly of the academic conferences, remarking that he came back rejoicing at the type of ministers he found in British Columbia and elsewhere. They were doing their work well. The churches were well administered, and, therefore, there was a deep interest in religion. They had a great problem in that country, and must equip accordingly. They had a heterogeneous population; there was certainly diversity of manifestation. Now the problem was, could they get unity of spirit? They could not get uniformity, they did not want it. How was it to be done? By the Gospel and Christ, who created of himself one new man of twain. He was sure they all believed that there was "a tide in the affairs of men which, taken at its flood, led on to fortune," and there was a time for Canada now that would never return.

DEATH TOOK FATHER.

English Immigrant Fell From Train and was Killed.

Montreal, May 30.—A peculiarly sad accident happened yesterday morning between St. Clet and St. Lazare, when Thomas Townsend, a newly arrived English immigrant, fell from a C. P. R. train and was killed.

Townsend, his wife and seven children, who have recently come from England, had passed through every danger of the voyage until this, and it seems particularly hard that just when on the borderland of their new home the father and bread winner should be taken away.

The family arrived in this city from Quebec on Saturday and early yesterday morning left on the immigrant special for Toronto.

After passing St. Lazare Townsend was missed by his wife, who in alarm notified the conductor. The train was stopped and the track searched, but no trace of the missing man could be found. The search had to be given up and the train moved on, leaving orders for the section-men to examine the track farther back. At daybreak they found the body lying beside the track near St. Lazare.

It was taken to the morgue and an inquest held.

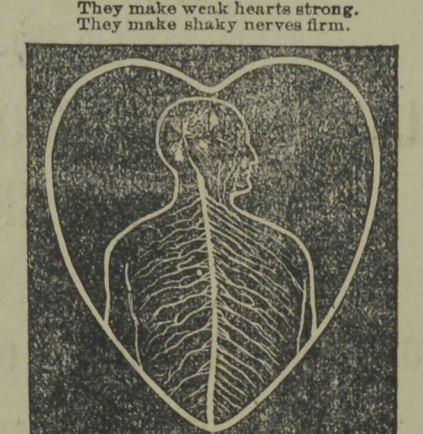

AN ODD PUZZLE.

The Cryptic Inscription That Ornaments a Swiss Church.

A picturesque tower is the oldest part of the Swiss church at Champéry, a village which lies in a valley under the shadow of the towering Dent du Midi.

Dedicated to St. Theodule, this church was built in 1726 on the site of an ancient chapel. The tower, with its unique pierced crown, carries a gilt statuette of the patron saint, a quaint old clock and the following cryptic inscription, which has puzzled many travelers:

QUOD AN TRIS MULCE PA
GUIS TI DINE VIT
HOC SAN CHRIS DULCE LA

By taking the syllables above and below with those in the middle it reads:

Quod angust trist mulcedine pavit,
Hoc sanguis Christi dulcedine lavit,
which may be freely rendered:

That which the serpent with sad charm imbued
The blood of Christ with sweetness has renewed.
