

ALL SUPPLY ITEMS PASSED.

Quite a Lively Discussion in House Over Dairy Matters.

SUP'T MITCHELL RECEIVES SPLENDID ENDORSEMENT FROM DAIRYMEN.

Repelling Charges Introduced by Mr. Smith.

HUBBARD A STRONG POLITICAL PARTIZAN.

After routine, Friday afternoon the House resumed consideration of supply and Premier Tweedie moved \$300 for assistance to scholars from New Brunswick attending agricultural colleges.

Mr. Smith complained that no provision was made for the education of young men in the judging of stock. The dairy people seem to be hostile to the importation of beef cattle. A large number of valuable animals had been imported by Mr. Hubbard, but he was informed that the sale of the last stock imported had been discouraged by the department of agriculture.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie.—Name these people. Who are these agents? Mr. Smith.—Messrs. Tilley and Mitchell have both discouraged the importation of live stock for meat production.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie.—Was it not merely that they thought that in dairy centres they should stick to dairy interests? Hon. Mr. Farris said.—This three hundred dollars is to pay the railway fares and travelling expenses of those who wish to take a short course at Truro or Guelph. The idea is to put them in the same position as if there was an agricultural college in the province. I think the member for Carleton is mistaken in saying there is a conflict of interest between dairying and beef production. I do not think that is good policy for a dairy section to become a beef section. It is better that the interests should be consolidated. I am a beef man myself, and I keep short horns, and the beef interests have my warmest sympathy. We advised Hubbard sale of cattle free of expense, and they were kept by us free. We also sent notice of the sale to all the societies. That does not look like discouraging beef importation. I do not think that you can combine beef and good milking qualities in a short horn. While in the upper provinces a few years ago I found that the short horn breeders did not look for milk at all, but kept Ayreshires for milking. They were breeding so exclusively for beef that the milking qualities were lost. I have received some telegrams from persons interested in dairies, which directly contradicts the member from Carleton's statement with regard to Mr. Mitchell. I will read them.

Lower Mill Stream, March 20. To Hon. L. P. Farris.—Have owned and operated a factory in this section for years, and have always found Mitchell on hand to assist me in every way. Statements in letter are untrue.

Mr. Flemming.—I would like to ask the commissioner of agriculture why it was that the production of butter and cheese in Carleton county last year was less than in former years? I have no hesitation in saying that I think the dairy superintendent from that district a thoroughly capable man. But why was Mr. Dow paid \$200 to do his work?

Hon. Mr. Pugsley.—Did that cause the decline in the production of butter and cheese?

Mr. Flemming.—Our farmers in Carleton county are in favor of Short Horn cattle rather than Dairy cattle. Hon. Mr. Pugsley.—That would be likely to cause the falling off would it not?

Mr. Flemming.—Our farmers consider what is best in their own interests. When the creamery was first established they were very enthusiastic, but afterwards they were not satisfied with the results.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley.—Then it was no fault of the department.

Mr. Flemming.—The officials of the department ought to enthrone the farmers more. I am satisfied our people want beef breeds of cattle.

Hon. Mr. Farris.—I am asked why dairying has fallen off in Carleton county. It is because the farmers there are selling their hay and oats and not keeping much stock. In Carleton I think there has been an agitation to kill the dairy industry and establish the beef industry. I think the farmers of Carleton are making a mistake in telling their hay. They should sell the finished

products, whether it be beef cattle or butter and cheese.

Mr. Flemming.—I know of no agitation in Carleton county to kill dairying.

Hon. Mr. Farris.—Large amounts are spent by the agricultural societies for the importation of pure bred stock, and we encourage them to do so.

Hon. Mr. Labllois.—One of the greatest reforms the department has made has been in the encouragement of the importation of pure bred stock by the societies instead of holding local shows.

Hon. Mr. Hazen.—The telegrams in reply to Mr. Everleigh's letter I presume were asked for.

Hon. Mr. Farris.—I did not ask for them.

Mr. Hazen.—I quite agree that we can produce good beef in New Brunswick, but it must be good to find a profitable sale. Too much beef is coming from the west. If the department would turn its attention to this question with regard to beef, with as much zeal as it has shown with regard to dairying, it would be a great benefit to the province.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie.—I do not think the department need feel alarmed at the criticisms which it is receiving from lawyers and insurance agents and merchants. Our policy with regard to agriculture has been consurged by farmers. It is absurd to criticize us for the reduction in the amount of wheat raised or of butter or cheese produced last year. The agricultural department is an educational department and does not undertake to do the farming of the people. Would it be good policy for us to refuse to assist roller mills? There are now two applications for roller mills. The only fault I find with the department is that they keep men connected with it who are opposing the government in every way possible. That is the case with Eveleigh, who is a rank enemy of the government, and it was a great mistake to give him charge of that splendid creamery which the government built. The action of Hubbard has also been entirely against the government.
