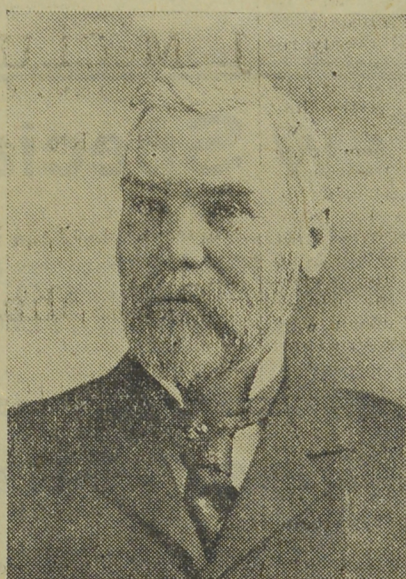

UNANSWERABLE ARGUMENTS.

Hon. Mr. Farris Completely Disposed of Opposition Criticisms

TOUCHING HIS ADMINISTRATION OF THE AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT.

Facts and Statistics Quoted to Sustain His Defence.

Speaking in the budget debate Wednesday evening, Hon. Mr. Farris, commissioner for agriculture, said:

I did not propose to take any part in this debate and might not have done so had it not been for the attacks that have been persistently made upon the agricultural department by speakers opposite, and partment by speakers opposite, and Carleton this afternoon.

The shortage in the wheat crop, and indeed in all the crops in 1903, has already been explained, and the opposition seem to hold the department accountable for the unfavorable weather of that year. We have reason to be proud of the progress made in the last few years in the dairying industry in this province. We have pursued an enlightened and progressive policy, and a reference to the statistics of butter and cheese production is only necessary to show the great progress we are making. In 1897 there were 41,768 pounds of butter produced in New Brunswick, while in 1904 this had increased to 907,125 pounds. The total cheese made in 1896 was only 698,267 pounds, and in 1904 it was 1,866,426 pounds. And what is of more importance, or at least of as great importance, is that before the instruction and supervising given by the dairy superintendents the quality of the dairy products was not such as to command a price for export. Each factory and maker was making a different kind and quality of cheese and it was impossible to get together a sufficient quantity of cheese of uniform quality for profitable export, and the result was that New Brunswick had practically

NO EXPORT TRADE IN DAIRY PRODUCTS.

At the present time, owing to the supervision and instruction given to the cheese makers, and the same instruction being given to each maker, the result is that a car load of cheese can be made up from several factories and it will all turn out of uniform high quality. Instead of New Brunswick cheese being practically unknown on the English market as it was a few years ago, it is now in great demand and commands the highest prices of any cheese in the world. This is surely something accomplished, and of which any government might be proud.

Our Farmers' Institute system has been attacked. I may say that our system is modeled after the system in Ontario, and which has proved of such immense benefit to the agricultural interests of that province. The work is educational and is of almost incalculable value. We procure the best available speakers from Ontario and Quebec as well as from the ranks of the intelligent and successful farmers of our own province, and I may remark that so highly are our provincial speakers thought of, that their services are in demand to address the Farmers' Institutes in Ontario.

I was surprised this afternoon when the Hon. Member for Carleton read in the House, a letter from Mr. Everley, the manager of the Sussex Creamery, No other factory in the province has received one twentieth of the government assistance that the Sussex factory has had. The government built that factory, keeps it in repair, and insured and gives it to the creamery company rent free. The services of the dairy superintendents are available at any time they are wanted and are often secured. They have all the advantages of the dairy school, which is conducted in the same building, but does not interfere with the work of the creamery. We know that Mr. Everley is a bitter opponent of the government, he is a violent partizan and he never loses what he thinks

but I think he has gone too far in writing to the member for Carleton

the letter which has been read here. Only last fall the directors of the Sussex Creamery passed a resolution unanimously thanking Dairy Superintendent Mitchell for the interest he had shown in their creamery, and the assistance he had been to them, and Mr. Everleigh is one of the directors. Mr. Mitchell, Mr. Tilley and Mr. Daigle, the three dairy superintendents, are practical men, as well as educated cheese and butter makers, and when they go into a butter or cheese factory they assist in putting things right, fixing the machinery and staying at that factory just so long as is necessary to have the work properly running. It is owing to the intelligence and hard work and constant application of these three men that the standard of dairy products in this province has been brought up to its present high plane, and we cannot say too much in commendation of their efforts.

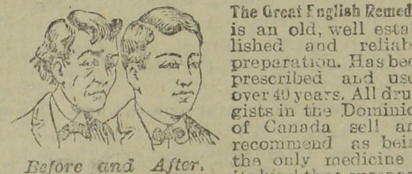
Another criticism passed by Mr. Smith was that the Dairy School was only for the benefit of Kings County. In this he is entirely astray. The school is for the benefit of and is open to the whole province, and we have young men attending there from all sections of the province. Take, for instance, the attendance in 1903. The students were from Madawaska, Victoria, Charlotte, York, Albert, Kings and Westmorland for the butter courses, and for the cheese courses from each of the above counties and also from Queens. During the present dairy season which has just closed, students from almost all sections of the province attended. These students receive free tuition, their only expenditure while in Sussex being their board.

THE BONUS TO WHEAT MILLS.

Our system of bonusing wheat mills has been criticised, and the hon. gentleman seems to be under the erroneous impression that we give a lump sum of one thousand dollars to three mills. The amount of the bonus is based upon the capacity of the mill. A mill with the capacity of one hundred and fifty barrels of

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will apply to the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick during the present session for the enactment of the following bills:

1. To authorize the City Council of Fredericton to appoint a Commission to revise, amend and alter the present Assessment Laws of the said City; and to authorize the payment of \$300 annually to Charles W. Berwick, Esquire, late City Clerk, to authorize the City to assess for a grant of \$1000 to Agricultural Society No. 34, and to guarantee a further and like grant; to bring into force the second part of the Act to provide for a system of sewerage for the City of Fredericton, passed in 1899, without the formality of public sale.

2. To issue debentures not exceeding \$25,000 to pay off the floating debt of said City, said debentures to be payable by annual instalments of \$1000 each.

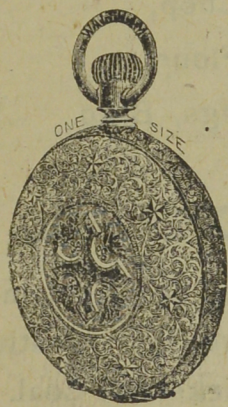
