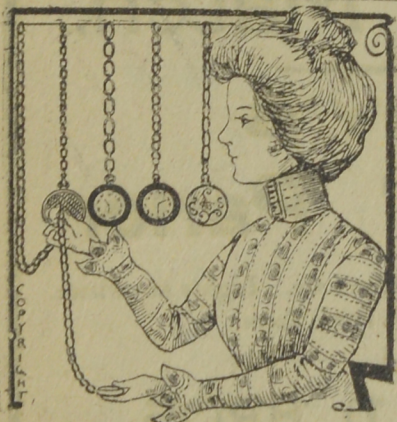

RUSSIAN CRISIS PAST.

Social Democrats and Revolutionaries Fail to Induce General Rising of Peasants and Working-men.

St. Petersburg, May 15.—(Special)—Now that the Russian May Day happily passed without general disorders, the authorities are inclined to regard the danger of a really serious interior crisis this spring as remote as ever.
Turbulence will doubtless continue, but the plans of the social democrats and social revolutionaries to spread disaffection among the troops and form a peasant workman's government for creation of a state of general anarchy has signally failed.
It is now evident that while the social democrats and social revolutionaries made a lot of noise, they had neither organization nor real leadership behind them.
Even the terrorists held aloof, while waiting for bigger game. These two parties, which have already forfeited the sympathy of the major portion of the Liberals now stand discredited by their failure in working the lower classes generally.
Their attempt to retrieve their lost prestige at St. Petersburg by proclaiming a general strike today broke down, the workmen refusing to follow their leadership.

SOME POLITICAL RUMORS.

A Grand Falls Correspondent Who Reorganizes the Cabinet and Gives New Brunswick Two Portfolios.

Grand Falls, May 15.—(Special)—It is reported that Hon. John Costigan, M. P. for Victoria and Madawaska, will after the session closes, be appointed to the senate and made secretary of state in succession to Hon. R. W. Scott.
Rumor also says he will be succeeded as representative of this constituency by Hon. Dr. Pagsley who becomes minister of railways and leader of New Brunswick Liberals.
(These are old rumors revamped, and little credence may be placed in them. There is at present no indication that Hon. H. R. Emmerson has any intention of retiring from the ministry. It is also very unlikely that should he retire, New Brunswick would receive two portfolios as the above rumors provide. It is possible however that Mr. Costigan will be called to the Senate.)

British Steamship Lost off Coast of Port Arthur.

FRENCH NEUTRALITY QUESTION STILL STIRRING THE JAPS.

Tokio, May 15.—(Special)—It is definitely known that Rojstevsky, after temporarily leaving Honko Bay on May 8th re-entered the bay and continues at anchor there.
Tokio, May 15.—British steamer Sobralense, southbound from New Chwang to Kobe, struck a mine off Port Arthur Friday and sunk immediately. Boats from Port Arthur rescued all the Europeans aboard, but it is believed that several of the crew and passengers were drowned. It is also believed that the steamer was inside the zone that ships have been warned to avoid.
London, May 16.—A despatch to Lloyds from New Chwang says that twenty-eight of the passengers and crew of the British steamer Sobralense, which sank immediately after striking a mine off Port Arthur on Friday, were drowned. Boats from Port Arthur saved sixty of those who were on board the steamer.
Tokio, May 15.—Detailed confirmatory information concerning Vice Admiral Rojstevsky's use of Indo-China waters has reached the Japanese government from a variety of sources, both official and private. A high Japanese officer today sketched to the Associated Press the important facts of the Russian fleet since France was first moved to preserve neutrality. He said:
"The governor general of Indo-China officially reported that the Russian fleet had entirely departed from Kamranh Bay on April 22, but on April 23 there still remained in the bay one cruiser, one torpedo boat destroyer and fifteen transports of the Russian fleet. On April 24 the entire Russian fleet re-entered the Kamranh Bay and rode at anchor until April 26, when a majority of the warships sailed, leaving behind four converted cruisers and one torpedo boat destroyer. These latter vessels took supplies of coal and provisions. On April 26 toward evening these vessels stopped and examined the German steamer Providence, which passed outside of the bay. On April 27 more than thirty Russian vessels were anchored at Honko, and at five o'clock in the afternoon they stopped and examined the British steamer Staettin, which was passing."
According to French official report, Vice-Admiral Rojstevsky promised Admiral DeJouquières that he would leave Honko on May 7. It is evident however, that the Russians were anchored at Honko on May 8.
The latest telegrams from Indo-China indicate the presence at Honko on May 12 of seven Russian battleships, seven cruisers, two torpedo-boat destroyers and four converted cruisers.
"Since the appearance of the Russian fleet in the far east Siazon has become a base for the transportation of military supplies for Admiral Rojstevsky's fleet. The number of vessels furnishing supplies to the Russians is so great that those which were countable by tens, on May 5 were countable by tens. A Japanese attack on Indo-China has been slowly maturing into conviction. The first suspicion was aroused some months ago by the publication of a detailed plan of campaign said to have been drawn up in the Japanese war office for the invasion of Indo-China and the denials which followed to change the popular belief that Indo-China is menaced and Foreign Minister Delcasse and other ministers have advised parliament to give suitable attention to the requirements of the colony.
The recent agitation at Tokio against Admiral Rojstevsky using the waters of Indo-China has given new gravity to the question. Such Conservative papers as the Temps and Figaro say that Japan's action clearly discloses ulterior motives against the French colonies while the radical newspapers, like the Patrie, give sensational prominence to statements alleging that Japan is able to land troops above Hanoi (capital of Tonquin) sweep southward with practically no opposition and simultaneously occupy Kamranh Bay and other unprotected coast points. This is in every way exaggerated, but it contributes to establish the belief that energetic measures are necessary to place the French colonies in a complete state of defence.
The reassembling of the chamber of deputies on Monday is expected to renew the agitation on the questions of Morocco and French neutrality. The notice given to Foreign Minister Delcasse by M. de Pressense (Socialist) of his intention to interpellate the government on its foreign policy promises to bring about a decisive issue between the minister and the Socialists who have been criticizing his policy.

BREACH OF TRUST.

Ontario Lawyer Arrested for Wasting Client's Money.

SAID TO BE OVER \$30,000 SHORT IN HIS ACCOUNTS.

Toronto, May 15.—(Special)—Thos. Hiram Lloyds, a well known and prominent barrister in the Sharkey building opposite the Post Office, and has been arrested, charged with neglecting to account for fifteen hundred dollars trust funds. He gave bail for one thousand dollars with his father, David Lloyd, registrar of North York, as security.

Young Lloyds, who is thirty-five years old, with a wife and child, handled money for dozens of clients in his vicinity and is said to be about thirty or forty thousand dollars short. There is the inevitable accompaniment of such cases, widows and helpless persons, who, it is feared, have lost all they had.

Lloyds owns the Sovereign building at Newmarket and a forty acre farm, and says that he can meet his dues. He lost money in War Eagle and Leroy mining stocks. He took his arrest coolly.

SENATOR WARK'S SEAT.

Senator King expressed his opinion that Senator Wark would not lose his rights as a Senator if he missed two sessions, as an exception could be made in his case without establishing a precedent. "Why," said Senator

King, "we will probably never have a similar case in the history of Canada."
