Baltimore News—Threatening weather and wet grounds are the two bugsabars of scheduled baseball games, and in times past many rooters have taken the time and trouble to visit Oriole Park, only to find that the game had been postponed. How to inform such patrons in all parts of the city whether to start for the grounds is the scheme upon which the club is now working, and Secretary Albaugh believes that he has solved the difficulties that have stood in the way heretofore. His idea is to send up a big ball of the balloon order from one of the highest buildings in Baltimore on each day a game is scheduled, high enough and big enough to be seen from all parts of the city. This ball will remain floating until the game is over, or will be hauled down the minute it is decided not to play. In short, if the ball is seen, there will be a game. If there is no ball visible, there will be no ball that day. To work out the scheme practically, it will be necessary to get the ball large enough to be seen for miles, and to send it up in the air from the top of a high building. He has in mind an extensive balloon of about eight feet, at least, in diameter, of the material of which children's red toy balloons are made. The red color will be plainly visible against the sky, and it should not need inflation more than every two or three days. If such a balloon can be made and if the proper building will be put at the disposal of the club for that purpose, the scheme will be carried out by the time the Orioles return home.

YACHTING.

AFRAID OF JARVIS.

Rochester, May 11.—The Rochester Yacht Club does not want Aemilius Jarvis to sail the challenger in the Canada Cup races this summer. If the famous Canadian skipper is at the helm it means that the cup holders will have to go outside the club to find someone to cope with the Toronto yatchmen. The club did this in the last memorable series of races for the trophy on Toronto Bay. The Rochester club has made a suggestion to the R. C. Y. C. that in the interests of catching some other skipper besides Mr. Jarvis should be selected. If the R. C. Y. C. will consent to this it will appoint a skipper from its own club ranks.

CRICKET.

London, May 11.—The Australian team yesterday finished their game with Nottingham. The Australians, in their first innings, made 288, and in their second 234 for four wickets, when they declared. Notts scored 219 and 237 for four wickets. The game was drawn. Today Surrey made 224 and the Australians 98 for four wickets.

The Marleybone Club has 4,594 members. The loss on the team sent to Australia last year is stated in the annual club as £1,204, but the club's refreshment department paid for this, showing a profit on the year's operations of £1,230.

He is in a terrible state physically, from malaria and muscular rheumatism, and the veriest tyro in the fighting game could stand before him without fear of punishment, for the champion would not dare strike a blow with one of those terrible fists. They are swollen almost beyond recognition, and he cannot bear to have a finger placed on him. He jumps like a baby at an offer to shake hands. His skin is so tender that he cannot dress himself. The muscles of his legs, arms and trunk are pitifully contorted and he suffers excruciating pains a great part of the time. "I've quit the ring for good," he said last night, "and I'm through with the stage at the end of the week. There's nothing in either for me, and I'm going home to get well. This is the first time in my life that I ever was like this, and I'm like a baby with my first pain. I'd rather fight all the would-be champions in one night than suffer one-half of what I'm going through."

San Francisco, May 11.—James Britt and "Battling" Nelson have agreed to a match of 20 rounds before the Western Athletic Club, to take place either in July or August. The men are to weigh 133 lbs. at 6 p. m. on the day of the match. Each man posted \$2,500 and the club put up a like sum. The referee is to be agreed on five days before the fight.

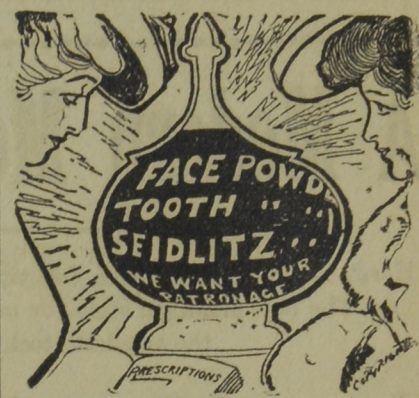

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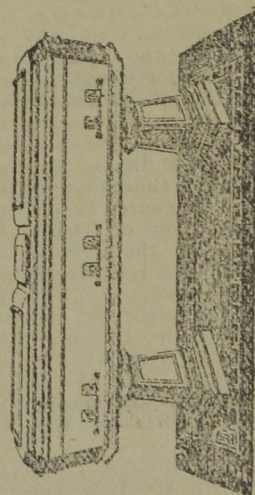
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
