

A DRAW GAME.

Trojans vs. Sackville at the Arctic Rink.

THE LEAGUE CHAMPIONS PLAYED TO A STANDSTILL.

The Trojans Had Clearly the Best of the Match.

SACKVILLE REFUSED TO CONTINUE THE PLAY.

The Trojans played a draw game with the Sackville hockey team, the champions of the New Brunswick league, at the Arctic rink last evening. Two twenty-five minute halves were played and at the end of the game the score stood Trojans 3, Sackville 3. The Trojans were ready and willing to play until one or the other of the teams scored a deciding goal, but the Sackville players left the ice and refused to continue the game.

About eight hundred spectators were in attendance, and that they were privileged to see one of the fastest and most exciting games of the season is beyond question. The Trojans were in fine fettle and played the game of their lives. They realized the fact that in the boys from Tantramar they had opponents worthy of their steel and every man did his level best. They played not only a fast game but a clean game, and not one of their men was penalized by the referee during the evening. McManiman in his old position as rover, was simply invincible, and managed to get all around his opponent. Ryan, as goal keeper, was right on to his job and time and time again during the evening blocked hot shots aimed at the Trojans' net. It was undoubtedly his strong defence work that saved the day for the home team.

In the first half each side scored once, the Trojans taking the lead at the end of fifteen minutes' play. They repeatedly carried the puck down the ice and kept it for the greater part of the time in the visitors' territory. The Sackville boys seemed to rally towards the close and No-man succeeded in tying the score by a pretty shot from near the centre of the rink. Each team ran in two goals in the second half, McManiman scoring for the Trojans on both occasions. The Sackville boys played a decidedly rough game, Cover Point Laidlaw being by long odds the worst offender in this regard. He seemed always to be watching a chance to get in some underhand work, and on one occasion deliberately struck McManiman with his stick. He was penalized four times by the referee, and even then most of the spectators thought he did not get more than half what he deserved.

When the game ended with the score standing 3 to 3 the enthusiasm of the spectators knew no bounds. A conference was held between the players and the Trojans offered to continue the play until somebody scored, but Sackville refused to entertain the proposition. They were evidently afraid that the game might go against them, and quietly left the ice. An effort was made to induce them to reconsider, but they positively declined. The Trojans have no reason to be dissatisfied with the result, having played to a standstill the champions of the New Brunswick league. They are probably the only provincial team that has succeeded in scoring three times against Sackville in a game this winter.
