

THE SITUATION IN LONDON.

Conservative Appeals to Prejudice Falling Flat.

MR. HYMAN'S GREAT PERSONAL POPULARITY—THE WORKING MEN RALLYING TO THE LIBERAL STANDARD.

London, Ont., June 1.—An appeal to reason and a fair discussion of the questions at issue are the features of the by-election campaign in this city as conducted by Hon. C. S. Hyman and his supporters.

On the other hand, his Conservative opponent, Mr. Wm. Gray, and those working for him, are bending their energies toward an attempt to arouse religious and racial passions in the vain hope of stampeding the electorate. Many Conservatives regret this course, though it has apparently been deliberately decided upon by those having the fight in charge, and to this there is added the not unnatural irritation caused by the feeling that the fight is being practically conducted from Ottawa and Toronto instead of being left to the local party men.

It is certain that for these reasons alone Mr. Hyman will poll some Conservative votes, while his immense personal popularity will draw many more. The Liberal vote is solid for him; of that there is no doubt. His narrow majority at the general election is no criterion of the real feeling of the city toward him. On that occasion he made no canvas, and in spite of the vigorous and unfair campaign made against him he was returned. This time he is making a personal canvas, every worker being enthusiastic and zealous, and the results of their efforts will, it is safe to predict, upset the calculations of the Conservatives.

WORKMEN SOLID FOR HYMAN.

One gratifying feature of the canvass is the manner in which the workmen are rallying to Mr. Hyman's side. It had been hoped by the Conservatives that the workmen could be blinded to the real issues of the day by the old shibboleths that, whatever measure of success might have attended them in the past, are now too threadbare to satisfy men who bring intelligence to bear in the consideration of public issues. As an example of the manner in which the Conservatives canvassers are carrying on their fight, particularly in the workshops and factories, it may be noted that one of their stock appeals is, "Are you going to vote Protestant or Catholic?" That ap-

peal will not carry the election; the men to whom it is made are keen to recognize its weakness, and are far readier to listen to and act upon the well reasoned arguments of the Liberals.

CONTEST WILL BE HOT.

While the Liberals are confident, for the reasons given, as to the outcome of the fight, there is no lack of enthusiasm on the part of the Conservatives, and as the days pass there is a perceptible increased interest in the contest, and even a promise of excitement. Both sides are arranging a number of big meetings. Tomorrow night Hon. Geo. E. Foster will speak on behalf of Mr. Gray. The coming of the gentlemen who was returned after many days of wandering in search of an oasis, and found it in North Toronto after several misadventures had lured him on to the salty marshes of disappointment, is looked forward to with interest only by the ultra Conservatives. Sir William Mulock, Mr. Walter Scott, M. P., and Hon. C. S. Hyman will address a Liberal mass meeting on Friday night, and it promises to be a memorable. Other meetings are being arranged for this week and next by both sides, so there will be no lack of opportunity for those who have not done so already and who desire to do so, to compare the appeals being made for their support.

SOUTH LONDON LIBERALS.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of South London Liberals was held in their club room on Saturday night, when Hon. Charles S. Hyman spoke on the autonomy bill, and addresses were made by Ald. Greenlees and Gerry and Ex-Ald. Parnell. Mr. Hyman dealt with the false cries that had been raised by unscrupulous members of the opposition. At the conclusion of Mr. Hyman's address a resolution, moved by Ald. Greenlees, seconded by Ald. Gerry, that the meeting was satisfied with the explanation, and the Liberals of South London are in accord with the government in the matter, was carried unanimously. The minister was tendered a great ovation as he took his seat.

Hôtels Unable to Accommodate Even Princely Visitors.

Her party will include her mother, the Grand Duke and Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and Prince and Princess Christian of Denmark. At Wietzenberg, on the Hamburg-Berlin line, the Duchess Cecilia and Grand Duchess Anastasia will transfer to a Prussian special train which will be sent to meet and bring them to Berlin.

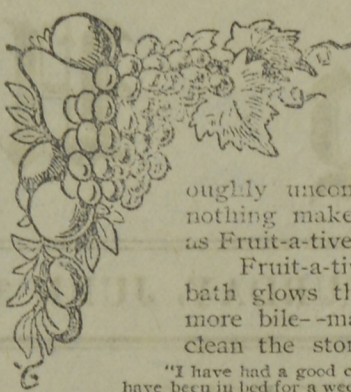

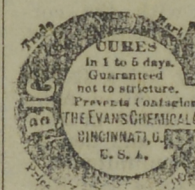

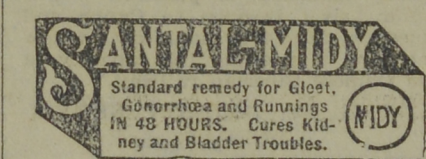
