

SPOILS SYSTEM IN ONTARIO.

Whitney's Partizan Methods Discussed in Parliament

MR. FIELDING LAYS DOWN A GUIDING PRINCIPLE.

On a vote for a wharf at Gaspe in parliament at Ottawa Wednesday, Mr. J. B. Morin complained that no man who was not a Liberal could get a day's work from the government.

Mr. Lalor (Haldimand) and Mr. George Taylor, said they never asked a man whom they employed what his politics were. They thought the government should act as a good business man does.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said it was very well to say this now, when they were not in power, but that had hardly been the Conservative practice in the past. If the government required the services of a man, and two equally capable one a Liberal and one a Conservative, applied, he would have no hesitation in giving the preference to the Liberal. If the gentlemen opposite were in power he would not blame them if they gave the preference to the Conservatives.

Mr. Geo. Taylor—That is not business. Mr. Barr (Dufferin) said the Finance Minister laid down the dangerous doctrine—"to the victor belongs the spoils." He had given a frank statement of the principles which had actuated the Dominion government in dismissing Conservative office-holders all over the country.

Mr. Finlay (East Peterboro')—How about the dismissals being made by Mr. Whitney?

Dr. Barr—They are for cause.

DISMISSALS IN ONTARIO.

Mr. Arch Campbell told Dr. Barr he had made a lot of declarations which had no foundation. When the Liberal government came to power in 1896 it had shown the greatest forbearance toward Conservative officials, even those who had been active partisans. There were hardly any dismissals. Mr. Whitney was taking just the opposite course. He had issued a wholesale order, sweeping the license commissioners and license inspectors out of office without complaint or investigation.

Mr. Lalor—Will you say these men were dismissed without cause? Had they done their duty?

Mr. Campbell—Yes, they were doing their duty, and they were dismissed without cause. Mr. Whitney has only just begun. He is only established in office. Give him a little time

and he will show what he can do. There will be few Liberals left in office. Mr. Campbell said the Liberals were not squealing about this. If Mr. Whitney wanted to conduct business this way he would have to take the consequences. The Conservatives in the House had for nine years been squealing about the dismissal of a few incompetent partisans by the Federal government. In view of what Mr. Whitney was now doing it would be well for them to stop.

Dr. Barr asked Mr. Campbell for a single instance of the improper dismissal of competent officials.

Mr. Campbell named the license inspectors of East and West York.

Dr. Barr declared these men had been partisans and it would have been a disgrace if they had not been dismissed. The had kept the gambling pools and the bars open at unwarranted hours.

Mr. Martin of Wellington, and Mr. Miller denied that there had been wholesale dismissals of Conservatives by the Federal government.

COULD NOT GET POST OFFICE.

Mr. Morin secured the floor again and said if the Postmaster-General were only here he would tell him some things. Mr. Morin said he had applied for the opening of a new postoffice in Dorchester county, where it was needed. He had not got the office.

The Finance Minister said he could sympathize with Mr. Morin. He had also asked for the opening of a new postoffice in his constituency a short time ago, and the Postmaster-General had refused to give it to him. Apparently the Postmaster-General was a very hard-hearted minister.

Mr. Lalor—Was the Finance Minister refused when the recent Ministerial strike was on?

Mr. Fielding said he had heard of no strike, but the country remembered a revolt in 1896.

Mr. Miller (South Gray) said he could produce even stronger proof of the flinty texture of Sir William Mullock's heart. He had applied recently for an increase in the salary of the postmaster in his riding. The Postmaster-General had looked up the revenue of the office, and instead of increasing the salary he had reduced it.

STRANGE CASTE AND NOVEL CREED

These Folk Will Enchain Satan and Save Their Souls.

Bound to Benton Harbor, Mich., to await the end of the world, which they expect in 1916, a small army of the lost children of Israel arrived in New York last month. The party numbered eighty-three and came from Australia by way of the Suez Canal, joining the Princess Irene at Naples. They consist of men, women and children, all in picturesque costumes. The men never having shaved, their beards reach down to their knees. The hair of the women fall over their shoulders and backs, and is without decorations. The hair of the men is long and shaggy.

Rigor Bissert, who states that he can trace his ancestry to 606, A. D., and who claims to be a direct descendant of the King of Wales, otherwise known as the Son of Man, met the tribe at the pier. All the members of the tribe believe it is necessary to save the body as well as the soul, and for that reason are vegetarians. The end of the world is to occur sometime in August, 1916, the leader stated today, and the gathering of the various tribes in Michigan is that they may ascend into Heaven in company.

POWER TO OVERPOWER SATAN.

They are quite positive as to how they are to get to Heaven. The plan is first to overpower Satan, put him in bondage some time in August 1916, and then all will ascend in golden chariots. The present king and queen of the tribe are Benjamin and Mary Urnell, who are already at Benton Harbor, with about 400 other lost children of Israel. Their first king was Johann Southcott, who held the position in 1792. There is only one great regret on the part of the tribe over the predicted ending of the world. The tribe of Judah has not yet been found, but the tribe of Israel teaches its children that Christ will show the sons of Judah to Benton Harbor before 1916.

HOW DATE WAS FIXED UPON.

Asked through Mr. Bissert how they arrived at the conclusion that the end of the world was coming in that year, the members of the tribe figure it out this way: A total of 2000 years elapsed between Noah and Christ. In the middle of August, 1916, 2000 years will have elapsed since the time of Christ. The end of it all will come then.

Many of the members of the tribe are prosperous, and boast of ages of living by means of food grown by themselves. They brought their own food from Australia, and refused to partake of anything furnished by the Princess Irene's gallery.

"The most profitable passengers we ever had," is the way the steward of the Princess Irene referred to the colony.

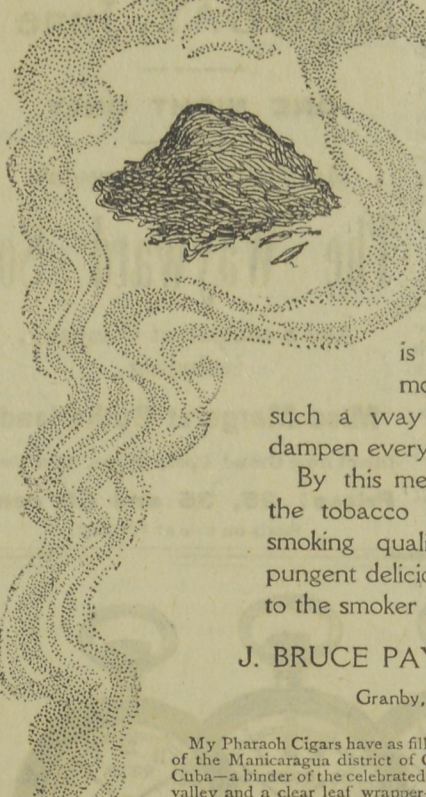
Another odd thing about the tribe is that there is but one purse carried and this is in the hands of the leader, who distributes funds whenever necessary.

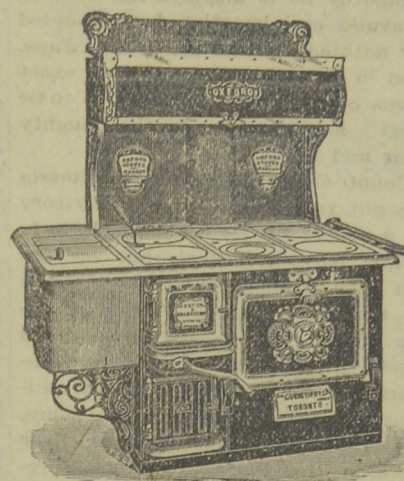

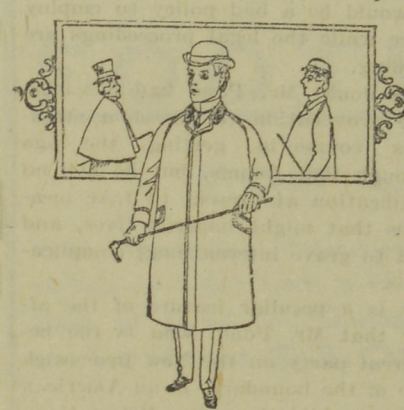
