RUSSIA WILL CONTINUE WAR.

President Roosevelt Endeavoring to Promote Peace,

BUT GOT LITTLE SATISFACTION FROM RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR.

Washington, June 3.—The president yesterday struck a blow for peace in the Far East.

In a conference at the White House with Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador, the president presented the earnest hope that Russia would forthwith conclude peace with Japan. Prolongation of the war, he believes, will not result in victory for the Russian arms and can only serve to increase Japan's demands and render more difficult the drafting of a treaty of peace which the Tsar as well as the Mikado can sign. Until his words have reached Tsarko-Selo and have been communicated to Emperor Nicholas in the friendly spirit in which they were uttered, their effect cannot be estimated.

Throughout the diplomatic corps there is a strong hope that yesterday's conference marked the first step toward peace, but the general opinion is that weeks may elapse before even preliminary negotiations can be begun.

Appreciating the natural feeling of the ambassador on such an occasion, the president began the conversation by a frank expression of sympathy for Count Cassini, alluding to the severe strain under which he has been for the past few days, and deploring the terrible loss of life and consequent sorrow caused by the recent battle in the Sea of Japan.

Without further preliminaries a general and entirely informal and personal conversation upon the whole situation followed.

The president informed the ambassador that he earnestly hoped for an early peace in the Far East, and that in expressing this hope he voiced not only his strong personal sentiments and those of his government, but he believed these were held by all the powers. His opinion was that it would be a mistake for Russia to continue the war. In addition to the suffering entailed by the naval conflict, he did not believe that Russia has anything to win in prolonging hostilities.

Having received no word from his government since the annihilation of the Japanese fleet save the brief official despatches telling of the engagement, Count Cassini was unable

to do more than give the president his own personal opinion on the situation.

The ambassador was deeply touched by the sincere cordiality of the representation and frank and friendly manner in which the president spoke. He could not see, however, that there was anything in the present situation, unfortunate as it undoubtedly was, for his government, which necessitated Russia's suing for peace. As to territory, he pointed out that China and not Russia, had been the loser, for even Port Arthur was held only under lease. On the sea Russia had nothing more to lose, he said.

It was the ambassador's firm opinion that this was not "the psychological moment" in which to discuss peace with Japan. Whatever might be the ultimate decision of his government, he took the ground that Russia could lose nothing either by waiting or by continuing the war on land. There was hope yet of a victory for the Russian arms, and in any event Russia had not yet lost one foot of territory nor was the Russian frontier endangered.

The ambassador pointed out that there was not the slightest official intimation from any source as to Japan's probable terms and that these demands, as stated unofficially, were "altogether impossible." If Japan's terms would prove anything like as severe as they have been reported, it was the opinion of the ambassador, that Russia could advantageously continue the war indefinitely and eventually win a victory on land. This his government would so decide he did not wish to predict, but at last accounts the emperor was for a continuation of the war.

Regarding his visit to the White House, all that Count Cassini would say was: "I had a most cordial conversation with the president yesterday, during which the whole situation in the far east was discussed informally and in a general way. No peace overtures were received from Japan, nor were any made. Our talk was confidential, of course, and of a very general character."

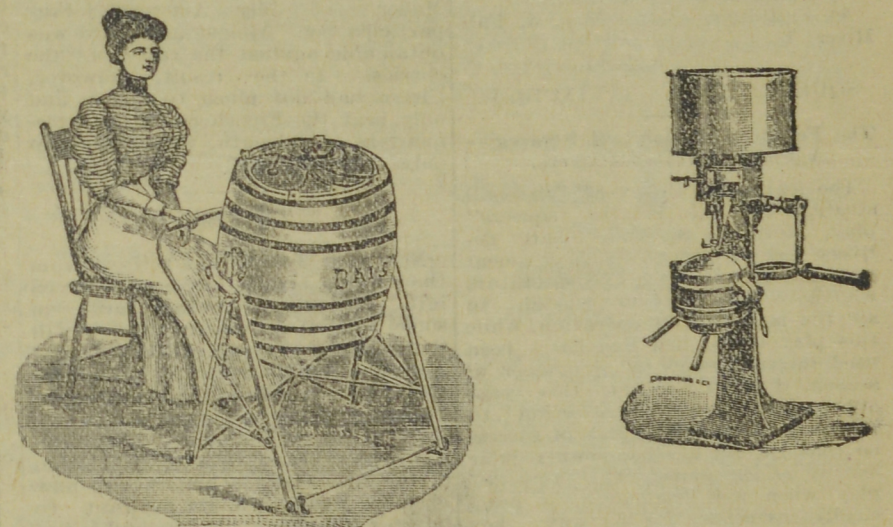
