

WAR AND STRIKE.

The Latter Has Apparently Disappeared.

JAPS ORDER COMMANDERS TO FIRE ON COLLIERIES

Accompanying Russian Fleet Regardless of Nationality.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 14.—The last visible vestige of the great St. Petersburg strike disappeared today, when the employees of the Putiloff Iron Works returned to work.

Ballots are being distributed for an election Sunday for representatives to a mixed commission of masters and workmen. There are current rumors of trouble on the holiday, on which occasion it is being reported that the revolutionaries planned an armed uprising, but these reports seem to be totally without foundation. The Associated Press has been informed at the headquarters of the governor general that there is not the slightest apprehension of a renewal of the disturbances. On the contrary, it is reported that the greatest confidence prevails that measures to be taken will prove satisfactory to the workmen. The latter will be heard regarding the formulation of new laws and the adjustment of existing differences.

The political side of the agitation is considered no longer a serious factor at present.

There are rumors that General Treppoff will be appointed minister of the interior, but in the best informed circles it is believed that the post of governor general will be continued to him for three months at least.

The Holy Synod has directed the priests to communicate the terms of the imperial ukase regarding the mixed commission to their parishioners.

Tokio, Feb. 14, 10 a. m.—Discussing the report that colliers had refused to accompany the second Pacific squadron on its way north, a member of the Japanese naval staff today said:—"Our commanders are instructed to fire and sink colliers found in company with Russian warships regardless of nationality."

Vice Admiral Togo departed Feb. 13, but his destination is being kept secret, it is presumed however that he is proceeding south.

Manchurian headquarters reporting today, says the Russians twice attacked Waitao Mountain, Sunday, Feb. 12, but were repulsed.

Small forces of Russian infantry attacked Lapatai and Hanshatai mountains, but were repulsed. The Russians continue to construct entrenchments in the neighborhood of Heikoutai.

Moscow, Feb. 14.—District Zemstvo adjourned today after adopting peace resolutions.

BLOCKED AGAIN.

PARLIAMENT OPEN.

Usual Pomp Marked the Great Function at Westminster.

NOT MUCH OF INTEREST IN SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

The Royal ProcessionS.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, Feb. 14.—The sixth session of the first parliament of his reign was opened this afternoon by King Edward with all historic pageantry that has marked the ceremony since his accession.

The Sovereign himself read the speech from the throne to the assembled Lords and Commons in the upper chamber.

The document was common place. The only reference to the war was when His Majesty said "the war unhappily continues," and "I have to announce that my government has been careful to observe in the strictest manner the obligations incumbent upon neutral powers."

The lengthiest paragraph is devoted to the Balkan situation, which continues to give cause of anxiety. Measures adopted at the instance of the Austro-Russian government have been instrumental in bringing about some amelioration of the state of the disturbed districts, but these measures have still to be supplemented by radical reforms, especially in the financial system before permanent improvements can be effected by the administration of these provinces of the Turkish Empire.

The royal procession was the same as last year. That of the Prince and Princess of Wales from Marlborough House consisting of three carriages.

An escort of household cavalry preceded the carriage of King Edward and Queen Alexandra from Buckingham Palace. Five carriages each drawn by six horses bearing state officials preceded the royal coach.

The coach of the sovereigns was drawn by eight cream colored Hungarian horses which have figured in state processions in recent years.

The household cavalry acted as a body guard and pursuance to an ancient privilege a detachment of the Yeomen of the guard marched alongside the state coach.

The scene in the neighborhood of Buckingham Palace was particularly animated.
