HOUSE OPENED.

Formal Proceedings at Halifax.

MR. E. M. FARRELL ELECTED SPEAKER.

Halifax Chronicle.—The snowbound members of Nova Scotia's parliament were released on Thursday night and reached the city in time to take part in the formal opening at three o'clock Friday afternoon, when Lieut. Governor Jones again attended and delivered the speech from the throne.

The occasion was without the usual military guards of honor, but the scene in the council chamber lacked nothing in brilliancy. The chamber was crowded, among the audience being an unusually large number of ladies who seemed to take keen interest in the proceedings.

The usual formalities with regard to the election of the speaker were observed, and after the reading of the speech from the throne the Assemblymen returned to their chamber where the new members were sworn in. The popular chamber was crowded with visitors, the floors and galleries being filled. Bishop Worrell and Rev. Mr. Ball occupied seats immediately to the right of the speaker's dais.

The address in reply to the speech was moved by Mr. Robert M. MacGregor, the youthful member for Pictou, who on Dec. 15th downed that Tory Gladiator, Mr. A. C. Bell, ex-M. P. Mr. MacGregor acquitted himself with distinction. He is an easy and graceful speaker and from the outset made a very favorable impression on the House. His maiden speech was a model of good form, delivered without any pretence of oratory and gave promise that the junior member for Pictou would quickly win his spurs in the field of politics. Premier Murray and the other members of the House warmly congratulated the young member after the adjournment of the House.

Dr. C. P. Bissett, the new member for Richmond, who admirably seconded the address, also shared in the honors and congratulations of the day. The seconder on such occasions always has the more difficult task, but Dr. Bissett proved equal to the occasion, and his eloquent and interesting address was received with approbation on all sides. He will prove a valuable addition to the debating talent of the House.

The popularity of the election of Mr. E. M. Farrell, of Queens, as speaker was evidenced by the hearty congratulations extended to him by hosts of friends. Mr. Farrell has long been one of the most popular and useful members of the House of Assembly and his elevation to the speaker's chair has been received with general approval.

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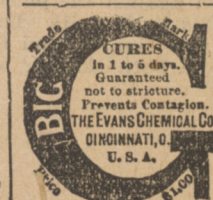
