

WAR AND STRIKE.

Russians Strongly Entrenching but Not Much Else Doing.

THEY HAVE ABANDONED NORTH EASTERN KOREA.

Strike Still in Force in Poland.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, Feb. 6.—Official announcement is made that every thing is quiet in the vicinity of Shang Tuag, with the exception that the Russians are strenuously entrenching.

On the afternoon of Feb. 4, and the morning of Feb. 5, Russian artillery west of Hanshan shelled the Manchurtzu mountain and vicinity. Small bodies of Russian infantry were repulsed.

Before abandoning Song Chin, in northeastern Korea, Jan. 24, the Russians burned all their stores.

It is thought that the Russians intend abandoning operations in northeastern Korea.

Lodz, Russian Poland, Feb. 6.—A few factories were enabled to partially resume work this morning through the return of some of the employees.

The majority of the strikers, however, are still out, and attempts are being made to prevent the workmen from returning to their employment.

Soldiers are guarding the factories and are not permitting the strikers to interfere. Some disturbances are reported to have occurred.

Tokio, Feb. 5.—There were a number of serious skirmishes along the Shakhe and Hun rivers Friday night and Saturday. The Russians shelled portions of the Japanese lines Friday night and small bodies of Russians attacked Waitao and Titi Mountains and places in those vicinities. Reports received from Japanese Manchurian headquarters say that all the attacks were repulsed.

Friday afternoon, Russian batteries stationed at Liuchientun and Sanpao Mountain, north of the Shakhe river and other places, shelled the Japanese positions. Saturday morning six hundred cavalry, comprising one force, and two companies of infantry and one battery, simultaneously attacked Chitaitse, on the right bank of the Hun river. The Russians appeared to have reserves.

Three hundred Russian cavalry, with two guns, occupied Sengchin, on Blaksin Bay, northeastern Korea, Jan. 24, but abandoned the town Jan. 28 and retired northward. Mukden, Feb. 4.—(Delayed in transmission)—During the night of Feb. 1 the Japanese artillery facing the Russian right, opened a terrific fire on the Russian position southeast of Sandiapu in preparation for an attack. The Russian artillery replied, and the cannonading lasted until afternoon.

During the night of February 2, the Japanese attacked the village of Schantan and adjoining Russian positions, but by daylight of February 3 they had been defeated along the entire front. The Russians even advanced slightly. The Russian losses were about 300 and those of the Japanese were heavy. The Japanese prisoners believe that an important movement is pending.
