

TROUBLE IMMINENT

St. Petersburg Strike Assuming Alarming Proportions.

ALL INDUSTRIAL ESTABLISHMENTS IN THE CITY CLOSED DOWN.

Government Forbids Assembling of Strikers.

AND ARE PREPARED TO ENFORCE ORDER WITH MILITARY.

Agitators Ready to Die in Their Tracks.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Jan. 21.—Despite the energetic measures taken to assure the safety of the city the inhabitants are in a state bordering on terror.

The wildest rumors regarding the intentions of the mob are afloat and many small retailers did not open their shops this morning. The edict has gone forth that the shops must open tomorrow, when the great assemblage takes place.

Although the authorities seemingly are determined to prevent it, preparations for a gigantic demonstration are proceeding, the men declaring that they are ready to die in their tracks.

Father Gopon, who is reported to have been kidnapped during the night, is understood to be at large this morning, going from place to place organizing and directing everything. The dictum is that the meeting shall occur in Palace Sq. no matter if it results in the massacre of the men. He says they must be resolved to die.

St. Petersburg this morning presents the appearance of a beleaguered city.

The military men are in complete possession, troops galloping in, squadrons are seen everywhere, gendarmes are concealed in the court, and factories and mills are surrounded with cordons of police Cossacks.

Bulletins are posted with the government's proclamation warning the people against assembling.

It is declared that Fr. Gopon has been arrested.

The list of 174 mills closed as the result of yesterday's coercive measures shows that every industry is involved.

In view of the probable failure of the electric supply, stores, offices, and householders are laying in a large stock of candles.

The public is nervous and excited, and the opinion is freely expressed that the government will be forced to concede the demands of the men.

The authorities hope to prevent the workmen tomorrow from entering the city proper.

Industrial sections beyond the Nerva, Moscow and Nevsky avenues are cut off and the bridges will be guarded.

Several batteries of artillery have been brought to the city.

The strikers are continuing their agitation with unabated activity.

Throughout the morning they have been parading the main streets of the centre of the city closing every industrial establishment.
