TROOPS AGAIN IN COLLISION.

Japanese Advance Ran Up Against Russian Cavalry and Captured 2,000 of Them.

REMAINDER OF THE FORCE BEAT A HASTY RETREAT.

Tokio, April 3.—(Special.)—The following official advices have been received from the army headquarters, Manchuria.

"Our scouts, in advancing towards Hailung, collided with 300 of the enemy's cavalry at Shaucingtzu, 30 miles south-west of Seilung, on the morning of March 28.

The enemy, 4,100 strong, retreated to Hailung, leaving 2000 troopers. There are large stores of cereals at various points between Ningcheng and Sanchentzu, and at Yingcheng, 35 miles north of Hengcheng.

The situation is unchanged at Changchung, and in the Kirin direction. London, April 3.—The correspondent of the Tokio Times, says, "re-

ports from Manchuria show that the Russians are destroying the railway more thoroughly than hitherto. It is the evident inference that they do not contemplate recovering their situation.

A commission of which M. De Martens, will preside, has been appointed to examine the claim for compensation growing out of the sinking of the British steamer Hipsang. She was passing along within the three mile limit, July 16, when the forts fired four times across her bows. She refused to stop, and four more shots were fired into her side. She continued steaming ahead, and a Russian torpedo boat destroyer ran out and sank her.

Boston, April 3.—(Special.)—Charles M. Reed, about sixty years old, an attorney, having offices at 704 Exchange building, and residing with his wife, two sons and two daughters at 12 Gloucester street, Black Bay, has been arrested upon a warrant charging him with misappropriating

the funds of the Samuel W. Cushing estate of Kingston, Plymouth county, of which he was trustee.

LEGISLATURE'S BUSY DAY.

Large Number of Bills Passed at Saturday's Sitting.

DR. PUGSLEY EXPLAINED THE FACTORY ACT.

Amendments to the School Law Passed.

In the legislature Saturday afternoon, a number of bills were agreed to including the bill to amend the act incorporating the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Company.

Bill to incorporate the Second Advent Christian Conference of New Brunswick.

The bill relating to the city of Moncton.

The bill to authorize the town council of Milltown to provide a system of water works.

The bill to amend the act amending the consolidated statutes respecting rates and taxes in the city and county of St. John was committed.

Dr. Ruddick said that as some members were absent progress should be reported.

Mr. Hazen said he thought it was wrong in principle and unfair that the husband should be assessed for the separate property of his wife.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said he quite agreed as to the principle but it was more difficult to enforce payment by a woman than a man. No one would like to imprison a woman for her taxes. Progress was reported.

Mr. Flemming introduced a bill to authorize the municipality of Carleton to pay the grand jurors in the circuit and county courts.

The following bills were agreed to: Bill relating to the construction and inspection of buildings within certain limits in the city of Fredericton.

Bill to amend the act incorporating Gibson Village for water and fire purposes.

Bill to authorize exemption from taxation of the Canada Woodenware Company.

THE FACTORY ACT.

The factory act was taken up and as there had been an understanding that it was not to be committed until Tuesday progress was reported.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that quite a number of the provisions of this bill were in the bill that was before the house last year and were agreed to. A number of the provisions which were considered objectionable by the owners of factories had been omitted. He thought the present bill would be found fairly satisfactory.

The bill provided for proper sanitary arrangements, the safety of the employees, it protects young persons and fixes the hours of labor. It also provides that one or more inspectors should be appointed. He thought that one would be sufficient.

The fact of the act being on the statute book would have a good effect. The bill was the result of the most careful inquiry and the taking of much evidence on the part of the commissioners. They had carefully guarded it so that it would not interfere with the great industries of the province.

The bill in addition to and in amendment of the school act was then taken up. Mr. Flemming thought there ought to be a provision which would enable them to have more superior schools. He would suggest that a number of persons required

for a superior school in taking account of the population of a county should be reduced from 6,000 to 4,000.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley agreed with the honorable member that the number of superior schools should be increased, and promised that the matter should receive careful consideration during the recess.

The bill provides for scholarships to teachers taking a course of manual training and nature study, and also for the consolidation of school districts to the number of three or more. Large powers are given to the trustees where they desire to rebuild a school house.

Mr. Hazen said there was a number of bills now before the house to give school trustees the power to borrow money. What would be the policy of the government in regard to these bills? Would they be passed, or would these trustees have to do their work over again by making an application to the chief superintendent?

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said the bill would cover almost every possible case.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said the board of education was the proper body to exercise the power of granting leave to borrow money. In the case of the trustees asking for legislation where bills were before the house, there need be no delay, for a mere formal petition would be sufficient.

Mr. Hazen thought that where the school trustees wished to borrow money, there should be some provision for notifying the ratepayers.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said the board of education was in touch with all the school districts by means of the inspectors. A board of trustees asking for a loan would have to set out fully the reasons for the application. There might be a provision requiring the trustees to advertise their intention to ask for these powers.

Hon. Mr. Hill thought it was not wise to give school trustees too great facilities for borrowing money.

Mr. Hazen—That is what this bill is likely to do.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie thought all these applications should first come before the board of education, and there was no likelihood that the trustees would be allowed to borrow too much. The board knows what the indebtedness of every district is, while the legislature does not.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley did not think the trustees of any town should be allowed to borrow money on the authority of the board of education alone, without reference to the legislature.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—Certain towns have that power already. Why should not all be placed on an equal footing? The legislature meets only once a year, and that might cause great delay in doing the work required. St. John has borrowed large sums on the authority of the board of education, which is the head of the school system, and should exercise the control over the issue of bonds by the trustees.

The bill was agreed to.
