REFORMERS TALK PLAINLY.

Czar Listened to Some Wholesome Truths from the Delegation Which Demanded Representative Government.

LINEVITCH SAID TO BE ANYIOUS FOR A FIGHT

And Armistice Proposals May be Delayed

St. Petersburg, June 21.—(Special.) The impression produced by Emperor Nicholas speech, Monday, at Peterhoff to the delegation representing the Russian congress of Zemstvos and Mayors, is reflected by the joyful acclaim with which it has been received by the Russian press.

The question of peace and the reports that another great battle has been begun in Manchuria, have become of secondary importance before the great fact that the emperor has again pledged himself to popular representation.

Russ declares that the history of representative government in Russia dates from Whit-Monday. "A hundred commissions elaborating schemes of reform on paper," it continues, "could not inspire the people with as much hope in the future of Russia as the Emperor's words to the delegation, whose members were characterized by reactionaries as traitors, conspirators and revolutionists."

"The fight is not yet won, bureaucracy will not capitulate without a further struggle, but the most important step in political regeneration has been taken."

Novoe Vremya thins that this renewed assurance, direct from the throne, imposes an obligation on all classes of society which have the welfare of Russia at heart, to unite in the suppression of the agitation which is shaking the foundations of the country.

The text of Prince Troubetskoy's address to the Emperor, when His Majesty received the delegation which

the former headed, is now published.

It reveals plain spoken yet withal perfectly loyal words which he spoke to the Emperor, telling him of the universal distrust of the classes attributable to the conviction that His Majesty is being deceived by those about him who were interested not in the realization, but the destruction of proposed reforms.

The Prince rose above details. He said those whom he represented had not presumed to indicate the exact form of national representation. They demanded but one principle which they regarded as vital, namely, that representation should be based on universal citizenship from which no class should be excluded.

"It must not be based on estates," the Prince continued. "You are Emperor, not alone of the land owners, merchants and peasants, but of all Russia. Bureaucracy, which has a place in every government must have a place in yours, but the national representation must be independent of the bureaucracy, which must not be allowed to build a wall between you and the people. Your Majesty will recognize that, when you stand face to face with the peoples' delegates."

At the conclusion the Prince declared it was absolutely necessary that facilities should be afforded both in the press and in public meetings for the discussion of the reform which so closely touched the people. The renovation of the government as pointed out must be built on confidence."

Ottawa, June 21.—(Special.)—Representatives of the Lord's Day Alliance have been protesting to Hon. H. R. Emmerson against running circus trains on the Intercolonial Sunday.

Mr. Emmerson asked General Manager Pottinger to look into the matter, and Mr. Pottinger reported that a circus train had broken down at Antigonish, and that the hands had to camp over Sunday.

DEATH OF MR. FRANK G. WINSLOW.

Late Manager of the Bank of Montreal at Chatham.

PASSED AWAY IN THIS CITY LAST EVENING—A LONG AND HONORABLE CAREER.

The death occurred last evening, shortly after eight o'clock, at Mrs. Colwell's, corner of St. John and Brunswick Streets, where deceased has been making his home for the past year of Mr. Frank Edward Winslow, in the eighty-first year of his age.

Deceased had been suffering from kidney trouble for some years past, and last year entered the Victoria Hospital, where he was operated upon by Dr. A. B. Atherton. The operation was partially successful, and during the past fall and winter Mr. Winslow has been materially better. About a month ago, however, he began to fail, and has been confined to his bed ever since.

For the past week his recovery has been very doubtful, and last night his death occurred.

Deceased was a gentleman of more than ordinary worth and integrity, a genial companion, of a kindly disposition and one whose loss will be keenly felt among his large circle of friends and relatives.

He was held in the highest respect by all who knew him, and his place will indeed be hard to fill. The greatest sympathy is felt for his wife and family in their sad bereavement.

The late Francis Edward Winslow was born in Kingsclear, 1824. He was one of a family of seven, the sons and daughters of John Francis Edward and Jane Caroline Winslow. Soon after deceased's birth his father moved with his family to Upper Woodstock, where he resided for the remaining part of his life, serving for many years as sheriff of Carleton County.

One of the first public positions that deceased held was that of deputy sheriff, which office he held for some years. Later he was appointed custom's house official for Victoria and Madawaska Counties.

The duties of this office he performed in a faithful manner for some years. About the year 1860, upon the resignation of Mr. James Robert-

son, the late Mr. Winslow became the manager of the Central Bank at Chatham, and held that position for a short time, he was appointed manager of the Commercial Bank at Newcastle, which office he held for a short time.

About the year 1868 he became manager of the Bank of Montreal at Chatham, and held that position for thirty-two years, until his resignation five or six years ago, when he was retired on a generous pension.

During all the years that deceased held this position he performed the duties of his office in a painstaking and efficient manner, and won for himself hosts of friends by his shrewd business capacity and cordial hospitality. After his resignation and superannuation he went to England for two years. Since his return he has resided at St. John and this city.

Deceased leaves as one of his memorials the Winslow Records, 1776-1826, A. D., of which he was the chief compiler.

Out of a family of five brothers and sisters, but one brother survives, Mr. T. Bradford Winslow, secretary of the department of public works, residing in this city.

He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Constance Hansard, a niece of the late Archdeacon Coster; two sons, Edward P., manager of the Bank of Montreal at Stratford, Ontario, and Warren C., barrister at Chatham; and three daughters, Mrs. Montgomery Campbell, residing at Apohaqui, and Misses Edith and Constance Winslow, residing in this city. A large circle of relatives also survive.

Mrs. Campbell is in the city, and his sons left their homes yesterday, arriving here today.

The funeral will take place from Mrs. Colwell's boarding house tomorrow afternoon at 3.30. A short service will be held at the house, after which the burial service will be read at the Cathedral. Interment will be made at Forest Hill. John G. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

THE SUSSEX MILITARY CAMP.

Major Chipman Commanding 71st Regiment Was Here Making Final Arrangements.

TROOPS WILL LEAVE FREDERICTON NEXT TUESDAY MORNING--REGIMENTAL ORDERS.

Everything points to a splendid attendance at Camp Sussex this year which opens on Tuesday, June 27th. The captains of the different companies are all hard at work, and expect to go under canvass in fairly good strength.

Last night Major Chipman arrived in the city and held a long meeting at the Queen Hotel with the different officers, captains and lieutenants of the different companies in this city and Marysville, and the affairs of the whole camp were minutely gone over and discussed.

Preparations were made for the departure of the soldiers for Sussex, and the heads of the several departments were instructed to have everything in readiness for the departure and the life under canvass.

After matters had been thoroughly discussed, the meeting closed, Major Chipman expressing himself as well pleased with the progress of affairs so far.

The soldiers leave by special train for Sussex at an early hour on Tuesday morning, June 27th.

Major Chipman left for his home this morning.

REGIMENTAL ORDERS.

By Major J. D. Chipman, commanding 71st York Regiment, Fredericton, June 21st, 1905.

1. Annual training, 1905. The staff, band and Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 7 Companies of the 71st Regiment will parade at the drill hall on Tuesday morning, 27th inst., at 6.15 a. m., in marching order to proceed to annual training at Sussex.

2. Advance party. The quartermaster, Q. M. sergt and 3 men per companies (including cook) from above companies will proceed to camp on 9.20 train on Monday morning, 26th inst., and will be joined at Fredericton Junction by 3 men per company from Nos. 5, 6 and 8 Companies. 71st Regiment dress, marching order.

3. O. C. No. 2 Company will make the usual arrangements for carriage by team to Fredericton.

4. O. C. No. 3 Company will arrange with Y and C. R. and I. C. R. to be conveyed to Fredericton, so as to arrive at 6 a. m.

No. 5 Company will parade at Fredericton Junction at 8 a. m. and Nos. 6 and 8 Companies will leave St. Stephen at 7.25 a. m.

3. O. C. companies will provide one half cooked rations for their men en route.

4. O. C. companies will fill in Company Daily Parade State, and hand same into orderly room upon reaching camp.

5. Capt. Gray will take command of regiment marching into camp.

6. Officers for duty, Tuesday, June 27th. Capt. Gray and Lieut. Ryder. Next for duty, Capt. Thomas and Lieut. Douglas.
