THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

A Variety of Business Transacted at the Closing Session.

Charlottetown, June 21.—At yesterday afternoon's session of the Methodist Conference, the chairman of districts were elected as follows: St. John, Rev. C. W. Hamilton; Fredericton, Rev. James Crisp; Woodstock, Rev. J. C. Berrie; Chatham, Rev. J. S. Strothard; Sackville, Rev. George Steele; St. Stephen, Rev. W. H. Sharp; Charlottetown, Rev. W. W. Lodge; Summerside, Rev. A. D. McCully.

Rev. C. W. Hamilton was elected secretary-treasurer of the conference; Rev. G. M. Campbell, delegate to the general conference; vice, Rev. John Goldsmith; Revs. C. W. Hamilton, W. R. Pepper, reserves. A resolution welcoming Rev. Mr. Dobson to the conference was passed by a standing vote.

The children's fund assessment for 1905 is as follows: St. John, \$920; Fredericton, \$520; Woodstock, \$325; Chatham, \$360; Sackville, \$630; St. Stephen, \$295; Charlottetown, \$555; Summerside, \$430; total, \$4,035.

The conference special committee was appointed as follows: The president and secretary, chairman of the districts, and the following laymen: Dr. Allison, John E. Irvine, E. R. Machum, J. J. Weddall, and W. D.

Baskin. At the evening session the report of the supernumerary fund was adopted. It showed that \$1,750 was distributed on the same assessment as last year.

The amended report of temperance committee was passed. The item formerly recommending the extension of prohibition now in force in P. E. Island to other provinces was changed in the wording so as to read "equally effective legislation" instead of "similar legislation."

Dr. Scott of the U. N. B., submitted an amended constitution to the conference. The constitution, which was characterized by Rev. Wm. Dobson as "sane and workable," passed.

The selection of the place of meeting next year was left with the special conference committee.

E. R. Machum, of St. John, was appointed delegate to the Dominion Alliance convention now in Toronto. It was decided that at the next conference a motion be made that the members of the conference entertain themselves.

After devotional exercises the conference closed.

Elmer Young, the Boston Guardian of the Children Coming to Digby.

LITTLE LIGHT YET THROWN ON THE MYSTERY.

Interview with Mrs. Young at the Digby Jail.

Digby, N. S., June 21.—(Special)—Your correspondent called upon Hope Young at the jail this morning. When asked if the mother of the dead child would be grieved to hear the news of its death, she said she supposed so, although she had heard the mother say that she never expected it to live so many years. When the mother last saw it in Boston, it refused to kiss her, and she said, "How large you have grown."

The prisoner also says that Mary Ward had another child which was found dead one morning four years

TRYING TO SAVE A WOMAN.

Lawyer's Efforts to Cheat the Vermont Gallows of a Murderess.

Windsor, Vt., June 20.—Governor Charles J. Bell, Sheriff Henry H. Peck and Supt. W. S. Lovel, of the state prison, were in conference for several hours this afternoon with reference to the arrangements for the appointed execution on Friday of Mrs. Mary M. Rogers. At this meeting it was decided that the Vermont statute would be followed as far as possible as to their provisions for execution, and particularly as to the law that only twelve citizens of the state shall be summoned as the official witnesses of an execution.

Nevertheless the conferees took into consideration that the latest legal step to stay the punishment of Mrs. Rogers might be successful and the arrangements therefore were not of the definite character which they would have taken on were it certain that Mrs. Rogers was to die upon the gallows on Friday.

Supt. Lovel stated that he had been ordered by United States Marshal Bailey to produce Mrs. Rogers before Justice F. H. Wheeler at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Windsor court. Sheriff Peck received a similar notification.

At this hearing tomorrow counsel for Mrs. Rogers will present good reasons why the condemned woman should be permanently released from prison. In the event that the court refuses to grant the writ of habeas corpus permanently, it is considered that an appeal will be taken to the United States supreme court.

Attorney E. B. Flynn called upon Mrs. Rogers today and explained to her the various parts of the writ which had been issued in the case. Mr. Flynn told Mrs. Rogers that there was some hope that the court would grant a postponement of the carrying out of the sentence.

This information came at a time when the woman was suffering greatly from an operation upon her teeth, and relieved a night and morning ago.

This child was younger than May and no one knew how it died.

It is buried in the cemetery known as Forest Hill in the vicinity of Boston, and on the tombstone appear the words, "Harry Ward Young."

The prisoner says that May Ward was no relation to her.

Halifax, N. S., June 21.—Nothing new has developed at Digby in connection with the murder of May Ward or Young, since the commitment of the prisoners to Digby jail.

The mysterious manner in which Elmer E. Young, of Boston, appears to have been misleading himself to those looking for him in that city, and the fact that the address of his office given by Mary Hope Young, appears to have been misleading, tend to the idea that there is some reason for his non-appearance at this critical juncture. The prisoners will be arraigned before the stipendiary magistrate on June 27th, when the crown will produce witnesses and the preliminary examination of the accused will be held. Melanson exhibited wonderful unconcern while in the dock but Mrs. Young's eyes were red with weeping and she looked a mere child despite her somewhat varied career. Her twenty years sit lightly on her shoulders.

Boston, June 21.—"Until I see personally Mary or Hope Young," said Elmer E. Young, of 235 Washington street today, "I cannot say a word in regard to the finding of the dead child in the woods at Plympton, N.S."

"I cannot see how in the world any suspicion should attach to the mother of the Young child."

"Mrs. Young was the guardian of Mary Ward, and both were very much attached to each other. They left this city last July and were to return to Boston early in September. During the last month I went to bring them back, but the pleading of the children led me to allow them to remain."

"While in that vicinity I made a thorough inquiry as to how the children were being treated. All the people in that vicinity were loud in their praise of Mrs. Young."

"I asked the Ward child if she would not return to Boston with me, thinking in this way to find out the true condition of affairs, though I had absolute confidence in Mrs. Young but the child told me that she would not want to leave 'mother,' as she called Mrs. Young."

"One thing I am sure of, and that is that Mrs. Young is not the cause of the child's death. There was nothing to induce her to commit the deed. The life of the little girl was not insured, there was no trouble in any way, and that there was no need of money can be shown."

As to his official position in the case Mr. Young refused to say, except to state that he was acting for a client. He is a detective and for 30 years has made his business to locate lost people, especially children, act as guardian, and do other kinds of work in this line.

Boston, June 21.—Elmer E. Young, a Boston detective, who is said to have been the guardian of May Young, the child murdered at Plympton, N. S., left for Nova Scotia yesterday on the Dominion Atlantic steamer Prince George. Young said he would investigate the case. According to statements said to have been made by Mrs. Mary Hope Young, one of the prisoners at Digby her late husband, one Fred Young, was a distant relative of the detective, who was formerly a Nova Scotian.

Nova Scotia despatches have referred to Fred Young as a resident of this city for several years past, but careful inquiry has failed to disclose any person here who knew him.

"Governor Bell, East Hardwick, Vt.: Vermont is again threatened with the horrible disgrace of 22 years ago. The reputation and honor of the old green mountains is in your hands alone, and every true Vermonter believes in that highest justice that is the sister of mercy. Should this poor weak woman meet her doom on Friday, in a state where my brother has been so greatly honored, please face his portrait to the wall. Every real Vermonter would hang his head in shame before the world. Have the mercy of the Master, and may that peace of the bravely merciful be always yours."

"Lloyd and Alice Clark." Soon after Admiral Clark's daring performance of bringing the Oregon to Cuban waters, the Vermont legislature voted an appropriation to have a life-size portrait of Captain Clark placed on the capitol walls. It is with his brother's consent that Captain Lloyd Clark makes his request. He declared today that he has made provisions to see that it is carried out.

CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING.

Portland, Me., June 21.—Warrants charging smuggling of clothing were yesterday served on Raymond Albert merchant and town clerk of Madawaska; Elmer St. Anant, soda bottler, of Van Buren; Thomas Daigle, ferryman across the St. John river between Madawaska and Edmundston, N. B.; and Alexis Albert, driver of the stage between Fort Kent and Van Buren. They were taken to Bangor for arraignment and held for the grand jury.

The arrests were made simultaneously by deputy United States marshals on warrants sworn out by Frank E. Johnson, of Boston, special agent of the treasury department.

The respondents are alleged to be agents of a Montreal firm of clothing dealers and to have long assisted in passing goods from Edmundston to Van Buren without paying the customs, shipments being made from the latter point by express to various parts of the States.

It is alleged that thirty thousand dollars' worth of clothing has been thus shipped within the period of the federal investigation.

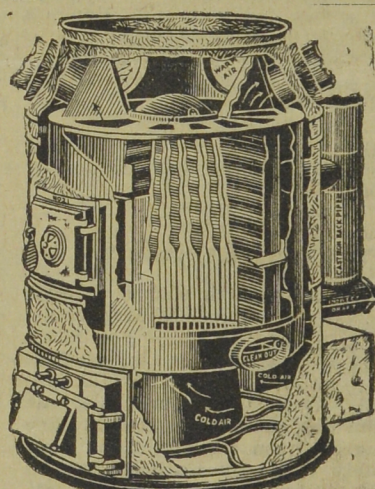
