

THE GREAT CANADIAN WEST.

An English Clergyman Amazed at Development of the Country.

The great Canadian west has never had a more enthusiastic admirer, a more determined "boomer" or a more devoted apostle than the Rev. Canon Armytage, who has just returned from a trip to the Pacific coast, and who sails in a day or two for England.

Canon Armytage, whose pastorate lies in the Manchester district, came out to Canada early in February with a batch of immigrants from his district.

After landing at Halifax he accompanied his party to its destination in the Northwest, after which he continued on as far as the Pacific slope, proceeding leisurely, acquainting himself at first hand with the vast country and its resources. He returns to London mightily impressed with all that he has seen, resolved to tell his people that, if emigrate they must, the country which holds the greatest promise to them is undoubtedly the Land of the Maple Leaf.

"I cannot speak too highly of what I have seen, and my eyes have been opened in a wonderful manner. I had absolutely no idea either of the vastness of your territory, of its wealth of resources, or of the immense possibilities which it contains. To the industrious immigrant who knows not where to establish his new home, I have no hesitation in advising him to come to this Canada of yours, and when I return to my flock I will advise those among it who through force of circumstances, are obliged to leave England, to set up their Laros and Penates in this the country where every man is as good as his neighbor, and where the

soil is ready to yield up her riches to those who will but till it.

"I have taken great pains to make myself as thoroughly acquainted with the country as I possibly could," continued the Rev. Canon. "In British Columbia what struck me as most remarkable was the great attention which was being paid to fruit-growing. The beautiful valleys of that province seem to be particularly well adapted to the raising of all kinds of the most delicious fruits, and great areas are being planted in fruit-bearing trees. The mining there seems to be done on a more substantial basis than, I understand, was formerly the case, and, as far as I could judge, there seems to be an utter absence of what is called 'wildcat' mining.

"In the northwest towns seem to be springing up on every hand, and the sounds of the hammer seemed to fill the air. Brandon, Calgary and Edmonton are growing very rapidly, and betoken much prosperity. While in Manitoba I saw great tracts of land being put in seed, the homes of the settlers are of a very comfortable nature, and every farmer seemed to be reaping the fruits of his labor. I also visited the Mormon and Doukhobor settlements, and, even here, I saw evidences of prosperity which spoke for themselves."

Canon Armytage stated that the ignorance of the English people concerning Canada was rapidly being dispelled, and that the numerous immigrants who have come over this spring from England may be regarded as merely the advance guard of those who are bound to follow.

London, May 17.—The Daily Mail publishes the following:—A painful experience has befallen a London visitor to the Llangollen district. It cannot be that many people have fallen hundreds of feet down a mountain side and lived to tell the tale.

Mr. William Mellum Marcus of Leatherhead, Surrey, had sought seclusion in a quiet part of Wales while engaged in literary work. He spent Thursday roaming about the Eglwysseg Rocks, and in the afternoon reached a point where a series of Titanic steps they drop to the banks of the Ede.

Here he by some means missed his footing or lost his nerve and slipped over the edge. Bounding like a ball from ledge to ledge, he fell many hundreds of feet to the foot of the rocks.

Horrible witnesses of the accident ran to the spot, but Mr. Marcus, though unconscious, was alive. He was badly bruised, his clothes were torn, and he had lost his gold watch and chain, money and other effects. He is now recovering from his dangerous experience.
