SOME WAR SPECULATIONS.

Whereabouts and Intentions of Rojestvensky and Togo
Very Much in Doubt--The Land Campaign.

Paris, May 20.—The apparently complete disappearance of the Russian far eastern fleet leads to the belief that either a battle is imminent, or that Admiral Rojestvensky has succeeded in establishing a naval base. On the other hand it is pointed out here that the position of the fleet May 16, in latitude 13.30 and longitude 11.30, indicated that it might have been decided to follow a course north of Luzon into the Pacific instead of going through the Straits of Formosa where Admiral Togo is believed to be awaiting Admiral Rojestvensky. It is maintained the Japanese difficulties have been increased by their inability to determine whether the Russians are proceeding unitedly or have divided their fleet into two squadrons.

Some experts maintain that the fleet has been divided for the purpose of permitting one division to reach Vladivostok while the other occupies the attention of Admiral Togo. Naval circles here are disposed to criticize the Japanese tactics in failing to harass Rojestvensky's transports during the long period of waiting for supplies. The results of Rojestvensky's movements are being awaited with intense interest in official quarters.

Ginsu Pass, May 20.—The weather has cleared and the roads washed out by the recent rains are impassable quagmires. They will soon dry. The present truce is expected to be broken by the Japanese. They are showing every evidence of preparation to assume the offensive, constantly changing positions and pressing the Russian left, where the cavalry forces are daily exchanging shots.

THE LATE J. J. LOGGIE.

(San Francisco Chronicle.) James Johnston Loggie, a well-known lumberman, president of McKay & Co., died at his residence, 712 Shotwell Street, very suddenly Tuesday morning. Mr. Loggie was born December 10, 1852, at Burnt Church, New Brunswick, and came to this city in 1876, since which time he has been engaged in the manufacture and sale of redwood lumber, occupying a prominent position in the trade.

He married a daughter of the late Allen McKay. His wife died some years ago, leaving two daughters, now living. Mr. Loggie was a prominent Oddfellow. His loss will be greatly felt not only here, but in

The attempts of the Russian scouts to pierce the curtain have not been successful.

Profiting by past experience, a new system for the transportation of wounded men from the battle-field by means of pack horses has been organized. Experiments have shown good results.

St. Petersburg, May 20.—The Russian charge d'affaires at Peking has informed the Chinese government that, according to reports, the Japanese intend removing the Emperor of Korea to Japan, in contravention of the treaty of Shimonoseki guaranteeing the independence of Korea. The Russian government has protested against such action to all the powers.

St. Petersburg, May 20.—The newspapers say again that General Kuropatkin is returning from the front, and is going to the Crimea to recuperate.

St. Petersburg, May 20.—A despatch from General Linevitch, dated May 18, says: "A small detachment of the enemy May 16 occupied Yandi Pass on the front of the armies. The Japanese also attempted to occupy Shahotze, but were repulsed and retired southward. The same day the Japanese approached Honkhu, about six miles south of Taul, but were forced to retire."

A NEW SURVEY.

G. T. P. Engineers to Run Line Via Chipman to Salisbury.

A new survey of the Grand Trunk Pacific, to go through Chipman, N. B., and tap the Intercolonial at or near Salisbury, is to be made, says the Telegraph. Work was begun this morning.

Engineers are at Chipman for this purpose, and were it not for the heavy downpour of rain yesterday they would have begun then.

The survey already made for the railway to cross the province in the vicinity of Chipman from Edmundston to Moncton has been found to carry the line eighteen miles above Chipman and thirty miles away from the Newcastle coal fields. Senator King, believing that better than this could be secured, went before the commission in Ottawa, and they have given instructions for a supplementary survey.

The object of this is to see if a line can be run satisfactorily from Edmundston to Chipman and thence to the Intercolonial railway at or near Salisbury, and the reason for the latter change is reported to be the desirability of carrying the line through the fertile and well populated section in the vicinity of Salisbury. Of course, locating the line does not necessarily mean that the G. T. P. will follow the route, even if it proves practicable; neither does it mean that this route may not be chosen.

It is understood that in about a week or so the question of suitability of the line suggested can be determined.

The survey will be made by Assistant District Engineer Foss, assisted by Engineer Bakam of Chipman. The suggested new line would connect the G. T. P. with the Central Railway, and would, it is claimed, be a short route than the first surveyed.

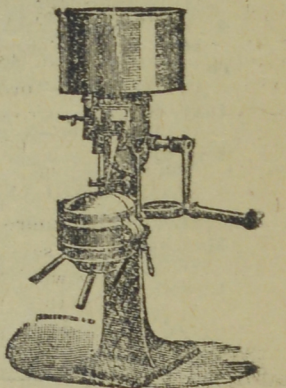
