LEAGUE FOR WOODSTOCK.

Woodstock, May 18.—The Presque Isle baseball team has written for a game on Thursday, June 1st, and promising a return match in Presque Isle in June. The Colts or Mysteries will accept the challenge.

A meeting will be called next week for the organization of a baseball league. It is expected that four clubs at least will compete—Colts, Mysteries, Barkers and Wellingtons. A majority of the games will be played in the evenings, also a match every Saturday afternoon. All details will be arranged at the meeting.

The ball game at the park on Victoria Day, between the Colts and Mysteries is creating great interest as there is a rivalry between the teams over past games. A large crowd will attend.

Pool, the Providence pitcher, is a leaguer of many years' experience. His work has reminded the regulars of the late Manager Gardner. He showed the same crossfire and worked the corners to perfection. He should win many games for Providence.

"Chief" Zimmer, the veteran catcher, who has umpired the last couple of games, has impressed the fans favorably. His enunciation is a little indistinct, but he is always on top of every play and makes a few mistakes on balls and strikes. There are lots worse umpires than Zimmer.

Ruelbach, the much talked-of prodigy, who lost his game for Chicago on Tuesday at New York, is a splendid-looking boy, with all the swagger of a college man that has been the idol of the campus. A magnificent physique—he stands over six feet and weighs close to 185, with not an ounce of superfluous flesh, he looks the part he is credited with—the king of the college diamond—and finished up his career at college by winning at 1 to 0 game from the Syracuse University nine.

Here is Manager Stalling's explanation of the famous passed ball episode of last week:—"If you had been present," said the local manager to a fan, "you would have seen where McManus was blameless. The ball was a low, wide curve. It struck the corner of the plate and bounded off into the stand, lodged in a hole for an instant, and then bounded out. McManus got the ball in time to head off two of the runners, but the umpire ruled that it was out of play and allowed the men to tally. It was only 44 feet away from the plate, and I do not think it was out of play. That game stands protested. As a matter of fact the ball did not bound out. It was thrown out by a spectator after two of the runners

had scored and Fuller was on third.

Jack Chesbro, generally regarded as the premier pitcher in professional baseball and the mainstay of the New York Americans, was taken suddenly ill at the Lexington Hotel, St. Louis, Tuesday, and later in the day was put aboard the train for New York and sent back home to recover from a general collapse. Physicians who were summoned agreed that he should go directly to a hospital, as he was suffering from a high fever, but the big twirler refused and said he would return to his home in New York. Chesbro has not been in the best form this year, but Manager Griffith of the New Yorks thought his condition was improving until his late attack. The famous twirler contracted a severe cold a few days ago and rheumatism developed. The doctors now fear a general breakdown, and say he will be lucky if able to pitch again within six weeks. Manager Griffith takes a less pessimistic view of the case, though, and hopes Chesbro will be able to take his turn in the box within two weeks.

Coached by Al Fields and Louis Mann, Jabez White, former lightweight champion of England, saw his first game of baseball Monday afternoon at New York. If he could remain there a little longer and see a few more games, he would assuredly develop into a crank of the first row variety.

He occupied a box in one of the extra stands in front of the main grand stand, and he watched the play with the greatest interest. When Devlin hit the ball a thundering whack in the second and tore it to third, only to be touched out at the plate, the Briton arose and said: "Oh, I say, don't you know, he should have tallied on that lifter. It's a beastly shame."

Then he fell to watching the pitchers, and the "rise" ball that McGinnity calls "Old Sal" caught his attention.

"My eye! But its wonderful the way he brings it up. It's not at all to be wondered at that the batsmen sky so many balls."

It was not till the sixth inning that he got a chance to see the real hustling work that ball players do on the bases when the opportunity offers. As the white-shirted boys scurried about the base-lines, and the crowd arose and cheered their favorites, the little Englishman became very enthusiastic.

"Blime, but it's the most exciting thing I ever saw. How they do it I can't understand, don't you know? Why, baseball is much faster than cricket. I think I shall like it better. Then the way the players throw the ball, the stunning velocity and the wonderful accuracy—why I would never have believed it if I had not seen it."

"Yes, indeed, America is a wonderful place and full of wonderful things but I don't think I have seen anything quite so remarkable as this game of baseball."

New York, May 17.—Jabez White, the English lightweight champion, who was beaten by Jimmy Britt, is in this town. White says he is greatly pleased with the treatment accorded him in San Francisco, and has no fault to find with the decision.

I think, though that in another encounter I will do better, and would like to meet the winner of the Britt-Nelson fight, which, I understand, is to take place this summer."

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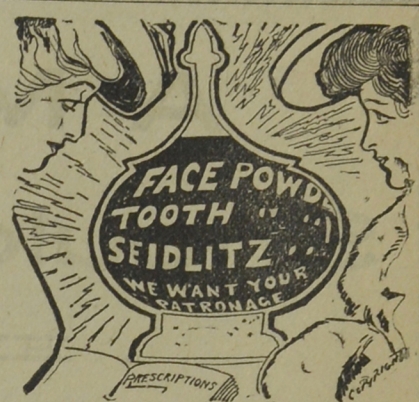
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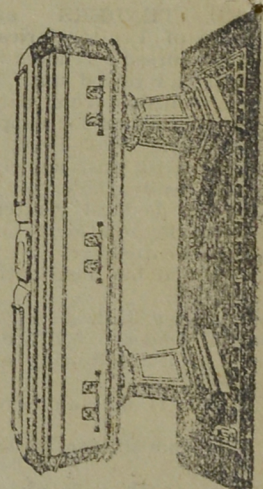
