A NEW MINISTER.

The expected appointment of Hon. C. S. Hyman as minister of public works in the federal government was made at Saturday's session of the cabinet, and the new minister will immediately appeal to his constituents in London, Ont., for re-election, with excellent prospects of winning a substantial victory.

The Tory leaders will make the best fight possible against Mr. Hyman, and Mr. Borden is already at London organizing a campaign against the new minister. No pretense is made of fighting him on the general policy and administration of the government, but Mr. Borden and his friends will rely on the sectarian agitation which they have sought to arouse in the country over the north-west autonomy bill.

It is certainly a remarkable position for the leader of a great party to assume, and one which should receive a stinging rebuke from the electors of London.

Mr. Hyman is recognized as a very able and energetic man, one who will fill his new position with success and it is hoped that his constituents will rally around him with enthusiasm, and secure for him a substantial victory. He has been in parliament for several years, has taken a prominent part in the debates and business of that body, and enjoys a large degree of popularity among both political friends and opponents.

It seems from a contribution published in a local newspaper, which bears the ear marks of the party who is made the hero of the occasion that Hon. Mr. Emmerson was uttered in a discussion in parliament respecting freight rates to Fredericton. Poor Mr. Emmerson, how his friends must sympathize with him in his painful position. To be routed by the young man who by an accident misrepresents this county at Ottawa. Why is it awful!

There is a report at Ottawa that Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. Sydney Fisher will receive the honor of Knighthood on Victoria Day. Mr. Fielding was offered the honor some years ago in recognition of his services in connection with the preferential tariff, but he declined, recommending in his stead the late Sir Robert Boak, president of the Nova Scotia legislative council.

The Senators have won a victory over Sir Elzeaz Taschereau, who has decided that he will no longer act as deputy governor general. If he cannot be permitted to occupy the throne when assenting to bills, he won't play any more in Lord Grey's back yard, and the governor general will have to get another man for the job.

The mayor and aldermen did not put in an appearance at Mr. McGinn's opera house meeting and thereby lost an opportunity of explaining their policy to the assembled electors. Mr. McGinn seems to have had a good reception and made points against the alleged reform council.

The pleasing news comes from Ottawa that Mr. Logan, M. P., and Mr. Wade, chairman of the Transcontinental Railway Commission, are improving in health.

It looks as if there might be some interesting news from the war during the present week.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

The miners employed at the Port Hood, C. B. coal mines went out on strike Saturday because they have not been paid any wages since February last.

A. F. Messervy, of Halifax, has been elected grand secretary of the I. O. O. F., of the maritime provinces to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. C. P. Frazee.

W. B. B. McInnes, M. P. P., of British Columbia, will be the next commissioner of the Yukon. His appointment has been practically decided upon and may be announced tomorrow or next day.

Dr. Judson F. Clarke, provincial Forester, will be appointed professor

of Forestry at Toronto University. Dr. Clark is a native of Prince Edward Island, and a graduate of Toronto and Cornell Universities.

The Hon. Mr. LaBillois and Hon. P. J. Sweeney, as a committee of the provincial executive, at Moncton today met Mr. Gerow, of the Middlemore Home at Halifax, for English juvenile immigrants. The object of the conference is to arrange for placing some of these children in New Brunswick.

The first Baptist church of Dorchester, has pledged \$525 to the second Acadia forward movement fund, and the canvass in that place is not yet completed. This sum in connection with the \$5,000 pledged by Hon. H. R. Emmerson will make a very substantial offering to the educational institutions at Wolfville.

Rev. J. C. Steadman, one of the oldest Baptist ministers in the maritime provinces, died Sunday morning at his son's residence, Sackville, after an illness lasting many months. He was ordained in 1863 at Salisbury, N. B., and his most successful pastorates were in Albert county. He leaves a large circle of relatives. He was related to Judge Steadman of Fredericton.

In the St. John Probate Court Saturday, the last will of Alexander O. Hastings was admitted to probate and letters testamentary granted to his widow, Helen Maria Hastings, the executors named in the will. Real estate \$2,250, personal \$34,863. Under the will the property goes to the wife during her life and after her death to his children, Robert G. Murray, proctor.

The death of Mrs. Amelia Gordon, occurred Sunday at Pictou, N. S. Mrs. Gordon was 87 years of age and the widow of William Gordon, who was formerly well known in eastern Nova Scotia. Mrs. Gordon leaves one son, Principal Gordon of Queens College, and three daughters, Mrs. Geo. F. Smith and Mrs. Geo. McLeod of St. John, and Miss Gordon, residing at home.

The Spanish cruiser Reina Mercedes, which was captured during the Spanish-American war by the United States at Santiago, Sunday sailed from Portsmouth, N. H., remodelled as a receiving ship, for Newport, R. I. The cruiser has been at the navy-yard here for nearly five years undergoing repairs, costing \$145,000, and is said now to be one of the best equipped receiving ships in the United States navy.

After nearly a year in the Klondike, Rev. H. A. Cody, B. A., returned to St. John Saturday. He was formerly the Anglican clergyman at Greenwich. He left, however, on Saturday evening for Oak Point. After a short stay there he will go to his old home at Cody's Station. Before leaving for his parish again Mr. Cody hopes to induce some clergymen to join him in the northern field. He will make a trip to Nova Scotia with this end in view.

Dr. Inch, chief superintendent of education, and Professor John Brittain, addressed a meeting at Belleisle, Kings County, last Friday evening on the school question. They endeavored to show the necessity of better schools in that section and advocated strongly the consolidation of the school at Belleisle with a number of those in the surrounding districts. It is thought that Belleisle would be a good location for Kings county's second consolidated school.

An attempt to rob the stamp safe at the San Francisco post office early Sunday morning was frustrated by Watchman William O'Connell, who saw one of the burglars drilling the safe. The burglars escaped with \$14,000 worth of stamps found outside the safe. The safe contained \$14,000 in stamps and much money, while in the cashier's room, adjoining the stamp department, was a large safe which contained nearly \$500,000.

Sir Elzeaz Taschereau has asked to be relieved of acting as administrator and deputy for the governor general during his absence and Earl Grey has consented to this. It is said on behalf of Sir Elzeaz that he was not in the habit of notifying the senate of the hour at which he was to attend to assent to bills. The fact that the chief justice had been relieved of his duties will end the squabble of his taking a seat on the throne when giving assent to the bills the other day.

Richibucto Review—While Cyril P. Fournier and Miss Annie O'Brien were canoeing on the Gaspe River on the 14th inst., the canoe was overturned and its occupants found themselves in a very dangerous position, neither party being able to swim. After strenuous exertion, on the part of Mr. Fournier, Miss O'Brien and he clung to the canoe, and their cries were heard by Mr. Joseph O'Brien, who rescued them from what might easily have been a watery grave.

At New Britain, Conn., Sunday, George Walker, 15 years old, committed suicide because he was suspended from school and was afraid to have his father know it, and his body was found near Mountain Grove. A two ounce bottle partly filled with carbolic acid was lying near the body and also a note signed by the boy, stating that he had killed himself because if his parents had found out that he had been suspended from school he would get such a whipping that he never would forget.

It is understood that Mr. Thomas Fyche, general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, will retire from that institution towards the end of next month with a life pension of \$6,000 per annum and a handsome bonus into the bargain. It is also understood that the retiring general manager who now receives \$20,000 yearly, will be succeeded by J. G. Merritt, first agent of the Merchants' Bank of Canada in New York, who will be acting general manager until the amalgamation of the Merchants' and Royal becomes an accomplished fact.

THE NEWS OF GIBSON.

Church Services—Funeral of the Late R. F. Smith.

May 22.—The pulpit of the Baptist church was occupied at both services yesterday by the pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson, who in the morning preached a very interesting and practical sermon from 2nd Chronicles, II-XI.—"Then Hiram, the king of Tyre, answered in writing which he sent to Solomon because that Lord hath loved his people he hath made thee king over them." In the course of his remarks, the reverend gentleman dwelt at some length on the up-roar in Russia, of the bad and uncivilized state of the country, of the fearful cruelty among its people, and of the unsettled state of affairs in general.

In the evening his text was from the book of Job. The singing of the choir was a feature of the services. Mrs. J. H. Bradley presided at the organ.

The pulpit of the Methodist church was occupied by Rev. James Crisp, who preached in his usual able and pleasing manner. It is the intention of several of our Sabbath School workers to attend the session of the York Co. Sunday School Convention this evening, which is to be held in the Fredericton Free Baptist church, on which occasion several well known men will speak.

The funeral of the late Mr. Richard F. Smith took place yesterday afternoon from his brother's residence and was very largely attended. The remains were taken to the English church at St. Mary's where services were held by Rev. Dr. Duffy. Interment was made at Sunnybank. George W. Adams was in charge of the arrangements.

As the deceased had been a hero in the late South African war, the soldiers and band of the R. C. R. turned out to pay their last tribute of respect to a dead friend and soldier, who although only in Canada a few weeks, was respected and beloved by all.

The Sons of England also turned out strongly in honor of their departed brother and hero.

In the evening a large congregation assembled at St. Mary's church and heard a very able and eloquent sermon by Rev. Dr. Duffy, who preached a memorial sermon from the words: "A Christian Soldier's Burial," which was very touching. The preacher spoke in the highest terms of the departed man and soldier.

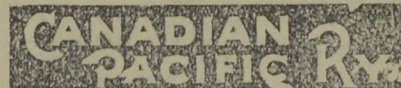

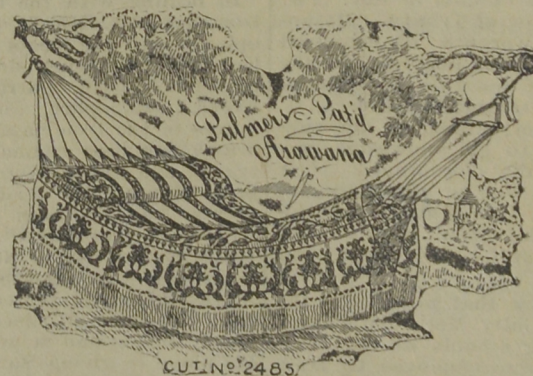
