IN MEMORY OF KNOX.

Rev. Willard Macdonald at St. Paul's Recalled History of Famous Reformer.

Yesterday was the date set apart by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada for observing the quadri-centenary of John Knox, the leader of the Scottish Reformation, and at St. Paul's church Rev. Willard Macdonald preached two interesting sermons on the life and work of the father of Presbyterianism.

Mr. Macdonald traced the career of Knox from his birth in 1505 to his death in 1572, drawing a life like picture of the personal appearance of the Reformer, his educational career, his exile from his native country for twelve years, and his subsequent powerful influence on the religious and civil affairs of Scotland. The first general assembly over which Knox presided, consisted of six clergymen and thirty elders, and Presbyterianism has grown some since then, observed the pastor of St. Paul's.

The musical part of the services in the evening was of a very attractive character, solos being sung by Miss Maud McKee, Master Clarence Hoyt, a lad of ten years, here from Boston visiting his grand parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mitchell, and Mr. Ley.

HE SKIPPED OUT.

McManiman Wanted for Assault Now in the Land of the Free.

Frank McManiman, who is wanted by the authorities on the charge of assaulting the young girl employed at the residence of Chancellor Harrison, has made his escape to the United States. After giving the officers the slip on Friday night it seems he made his way back to the city, and, in company with Frank Valentine, a chum of his, procured a team and drove to Calais. Sergeant Phillips and Constable Hawthorn got wind of his departure on Saturday evening, and started in pursuit, but the fugitive had too much of a start on them, and succeeded in getting over the line. It is said to be his intention to go west, where he has a brother located.

Policeman Rideout informs The Herald that the statement published in these columns on Saturday that McManiman had been keeping company with the victim of the assault, was incorrect. He tried several times to force his attentions upon her, but she would have nothing to do with him. He says the only reason the young woman had for not sooner disclosing the name of her assailant was her objection to appearing in court. It was in fact, Policeman Rideout who laid the information against McManiman, and he is, therefore, familiar with the facts of the case.

DIED AT WASHINGTON.

Word was received here last evening of the death at Washington, D. C., yesterday, of Mrs. Annie L. Webster, of that place. The deceased lady, whose maiden name was Annie L. Hoolihan, spent her early girlhood days here at different times. She was of a disposition which made many friends who will sincerely regret to hear of her death. The late Mrs. Webster was 53 years of age. Her husband died some years ago. She is survived by one sister, Sister M. Estelle, who is in a convent at New Orleans. The late Mrs. James Boyle and Miss B. Driscoll, King street, were aunts of the deceased lady. Mrs. Webster had been a sufferer from heart trouble for several months and when she visited here last July was in poor health. The funeral will take place this week at Boston.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH.

Halifax Young Lady Carried Off by Cerebral Affection.

Halifax, May 22—(Special)—The death occurred suddenly this morning, of Gertrude E., second daughter of Claude R. Reynolds, I. C. R. ticket agent, North Street station. The deceased lady was in church last evening, apparently well. She awoke about five o'clock this morning and complained of feeling ill. A doctor, who was sent for, found her suffering from cerebral affection, and beyond medical aid. She passed away at 7 a. m.

JAIL BREAKER INGLIS.

Halifax Man who Gave Fredericton Police the Slip a Notorious Character.

Halifax Chronicle—"Is Darby Inglis, the jail breaker, wanted in Halifax?" The above was the wording of a telegram received by the police department on Thursday night from the chief of police, Fredericton.

When Chief O'Sullivan read the telegram he lost no time in replying that Inglis was wanted here, and he sent instructions to have him arrested and held until an officer could be sent from Halifax and bring him back. At eight o'clock yesterday morning Chief O'Sullivan received another despatch stating that Inglis had been arrested and lodged in jail. Chief O'Sullivan then started to have the necessary warrant prepared, and an officer was to be sent for Inglis. Fredericton was notified to hold him, and that an officer would start as soon as the papers were prepared. Just as the clock struck three in the afternoon a telegraph boy rushed into the office of Chief O'Sullivan and delivered a telegram, which conveyed the information that Inglis had broken jail and left for parts unknown.

The news surprised even the Halifax police, and Inglis' daring escape no doubt was a big surprise to the Fredericton authorities. Chief O'Sullivan wired to re-capture Inglis at all costs.

Inglis is a notorious jail breaker. He made his escape from the city prison about six weeks ago, and, as he was taking his departure, he also liberated four other prisoners who are still at large.

LUMBER DRIVES.

Kilburn's Longs Boomed Below English Lake--The River Rising.

Mr. John Kilburn, the well known lumberman, whose lumber drives on the St. John headwaters had to be abandoned last week, returned from Quebec by the I. C. R. on Saturday afternoon. He reports that his drive of six millions for Mr. W. H. Murray, is boomed a short distance below English Lake, and can easily be got out another season.

Mr. Kilburn says that in his forty-four years' experience he never saw the conditions for driving so unfavorable as he found them this year. He had a large crew at work about thirty days, and in all that time there were only four days when there was really good driving.

Mr. Kilburn is of opinion that Mr. Wm. J. Nobles' big drive on the northwest branch is through Baker Lake, and should under ordinary conditions reach safe water in the course of a few days.

The water in the river at this point has risen about six inches since Saturday night and is still coming up slowly. A good many new logs are running into the booms.

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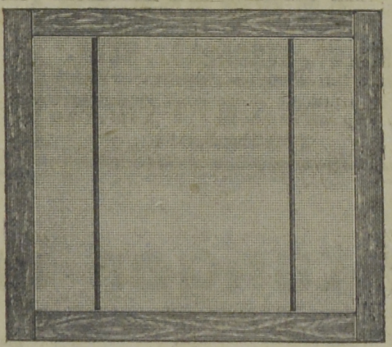
