DIED AMONG HIS BELLS.

Ringer Crashed in the Tower of a Parish Church.

London, Feb. 2.—The Daily Express publishes the following.—Thomas Rose, one of the bell-ringers at the parish church of Stock-on-Trent, has died among the bells he loved.

He took two of his children with him when he went to the church on Saturday evening to oil the bearings and thus prepare the bells for the morrow's peal.

Bidding them wait for him, he went up the dark, narrow staircase which led to where the bells hung.

The children waited long, but the ringer did not return, and when at last they ventured to the foot of the staircase there was no reply to their call of, "Daddy."

Frightened, they ran home and told their mother that their father had not come down from the bells. She went to the sexton, and he, taking his lantern to guide him on the unaccustomed way aloft, where a false step might mean death, hastened to the church.

He climbed the stairway, and then, looking around among the bells in the dim light, saw the ringer lying dead, his body pinned between one of the bells and a beam. Rose had evidently startled the bell accidentally, and it had swung and crushed him.

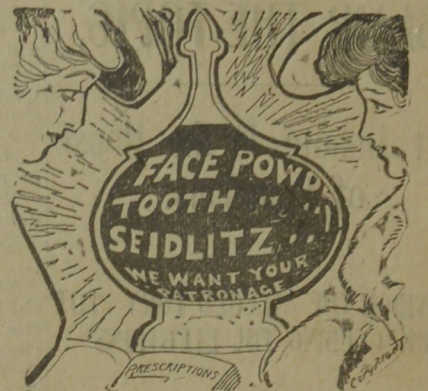
