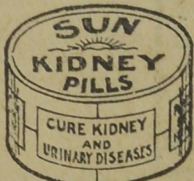

## FAMINE FEARED.

If the Snow Blockade in Nova Scotia is Not Soon Raised.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 25.—The numerous heavy storms in the Maritime Provinces have created a serious state of affairs in the district through which the Dominion Atlantic railway runs. This road which extends from Windsor Junction, near Halifax, to Yarmouth, the whole length of the southern Nova Scotia peninsula, has been blockaded for some time. A most serious state of affairs is reported from Wolfville and vicinity. The railway has not been able to move trains there for some time, and business has been completely tied up. The people have become alarmed that their food supplies may be exhausted before the trains can be again started. The Dominion Atlantic is reported to have exhausted its coal supplies and it is unable to operate its engines in clearing the roads of drifts.

Gangs of shovellers are at work and in many places the citizens have turned out to lend a helping-hand toward clearing the line. In several places the schools have been closed for the same purpose. The Intercolonial Railway has been appealed to by the General Manager of the Dominion Atlantic and has started from Windsor Junction, where the two roads join, to dig toward Wolfville.

## RAN MINT IN PENITENTIARY.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 25.—A complete counterfeiting outfit was found today in a cell in the State Penitentiary, owned and operated by convicts. With the find

were several spurious coins, mostly ten and twenty-five cent pieces. The discovery was made by officers of the penitentiary. Walter Turpin, a white convict, and a desperado, is said to have been connected with the gang, and it is believed two others were associated with him, one of them a life convict. The coins are perfect as to size, figures, milling and thickness, but feel a little "greasy," and are lacking in weight.

It was discovered on investigation that the men implicated in the counterfeiting had been using a large quantity of canned goods, and that they melted the tin and the lead from the cans, and in this way got most of the metal they used. Some of the lead used in the shoe shop also was smuggled in to them.

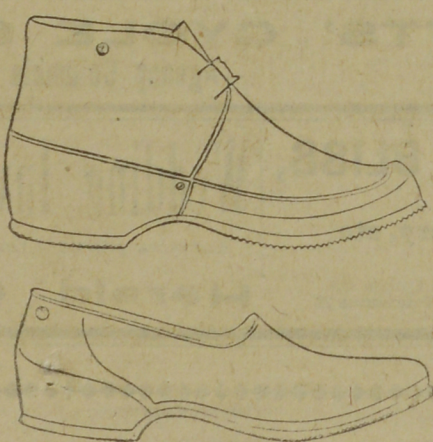
