A SUSPICIOUS DEATH.

Man Found at New Mills, Restigouche, in Dying Condition with Bullet Holes in Him.

Campbellton, N. B., June 17.—On the arrival of yesterday morning's freight train from Moncton, rumors of a man being killed at or near New Mills filled the air. It was learned that there was some ground for the story, as a passenger had died on the train before reaching here, having been taken on at New Mills while in an almost unconscious state, and with several terrible bruises about the head and body.

It appears that at an early hour yesterday morning the unfortunate man, Alex. Wood, was found beside the I. C. R. track just a short distance below New Mills. His wounds were thought advisable to bring him to Campbellton, where they could be attended to at the Hotel Dieu Hospital. Accordingly he was taken on board the train and everything possible for his comfort was done, but he expired before reaching Campbellton.

Immediately on the arrival of the train Coroner Doherty was notified. Dr. Price of Campbellton and Dr. Ellis of Jacquet River, who was with the deceased on the train, held a post mortem examination yesterday afternoon, the result of which goes to strengthen the belief that there was foul play. A bullet wound was found in the right shoulder, but the bullet could not be located. Two or three ugly wounds were also found on the head, any one of which it is thought would be sufficient to cause death. Besides these there were other marks on the right arm and about the body.

The coroner so far has been unable to locate any relatives of the deceased. One story is that he is a native of Dorchester, another that he comes from Memramouc, while still another is that he belongs to Hants Co., N. S. Up till recently Wood was employed by Wm. Currie & Co., as a shingle sawyer in their Mill River mill. He was paid off Thursday with about \$28, and came to town on the local express. He left here on the evening freight for New Mills, and nothing more is known of him until discovered beside the track, as above mentioned. A bottle was found beside him and the sum of \$21 in his pockets. The inquest will take place on Tuesday next.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Interesting Statistical Reports—Memorial Service—Educational Matters.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 16.—The Methodist conference opened at nine o'clock this morning with the president, Rev. W. W. Lodge, in the chair.

The date of the conference for next year was fixed for the 21st of June. The report of the Children's Fund Committee was read.

Rev. George Steel and A. C. Powers were appointed auditors of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Evans reported for the supernumerary fund committee. This report was for general fund of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland conferences. The capital account showed a capital at present of \$117,031.62, an increase of \$800. The income account showed a total income of \$15,556, an increase of \$600. Of this amount New Brunswick and

Prince Edward Island conferences contributed \$6,390.

The educational committee's report was read by Rev. C. H. Paisley, D. D. The total contributions to this fund was \$11,183.11.

E. R. MacLennan reported for the Sunday School committee. The number of schools 216; scholars, 16,457; 378 have united with the church during the year from the schools. The total raised by Sunday Schools, \$7,547. There is an increase of 57 in the home department. During long-ly discussion many important matters on Sunday School work were brought out.

The pastoral aid fund committee recommended a grant of \$350 to the Stanley circuit.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

At 4.30 a memorial service was

held for the late Rev. W. C. Matthews, who for nineteen years was a minister of this conference and who died in St. John on March 24th last. A very appropriate address was read by the secretary regarding Bro. Matthews, and adopted as the minutes of conference. Words of appreciation were also spoken by Revs. J. C. Berris, ex-president Hamilton, Jas. Stothard and George F. Dawson.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

A meeting of the Methodist Historical Society was held at 5 o'clock. The following officers were elected: President, Rev. C. H. Paisley, D. D.; 1st vice-president, Rev. F. A. Wright; 2nd vice-president, S. D. Scott, A. M.; sec. treas., A. Henderson; curator of library, C. D. Stevens; Dr. Sprague, Dr. Rogers, Rev. Thomas Marshall, with the officers, constitute executive.

The curator presented a report on donations received by the library.

EDUCATIONAL MEETING.

The curator presented a report on and in the interests of the educational society of the church. Rev. E. Evans, D. D., presided. Rev. Dr. Chapman lead in prayer.

Rev. C. H. Paisley, D. D., presented the report of the society. The income was \$1,183, an increase over last year of \$60.

David Allison, J. L. D., addressed the meeting. He gave a history of the early life of the Mount Allison institutions, dating as they do from 1842, when the old Wesleyan academy was founded by C. F. Allison. We have now three distinct faculties in our university: arts, theology, applied science, and by our affiliation with McGill we can give students the first two years of the engineering course and pass them into the third year at McGill. The year just closed has been the most successful year in our history. 172 students enrolled, 92 men being in residence, and the prospects are for a better year still.

Rev. C. H. Paisley, D. D., dean of theology, and Principal Palmer of the academy, also spoke.

The following changes have been made in the station sheet: Andrew, A. D. McLeod; Baie Verte, B. O. Hartman; Bonaventure, W. R. Popper; Cape Wolfe, S. W. Squires.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

Enthusiastic Meeting of Tennis Club Last Evening.

A largely attended meeting of the Fredericton Tennis Club was held at the club house near the courts last evening.

The meeting was called to discuss the matter of a tournament with Rothesay, to decide upon a date, and to make all necessary arrangements for their entertainment. President J. W. Bridges was in the chair. A letter was read by Secretary Chas. Randolph from the Rothesay club, accepting the invitation of the Fredericton club. The letter further stated that they would bring up sixteen men and fourteen lady players to compete in the match.

It was decided that the tournament should be held here on Saturday, July 1st. The players will arrive from Rothesay Friday night and will in all probability remain here over Sunday, finishing the play on Monday; as one day will scarcely be sufficient. In this case they will return Monday night.

Arrangements were made for the entertaining of the visitors while here.

Teas will be given by the ladies on the courts on Saturday and Monday, and on Saturday evening the visitors will be the guests of the Fredericton club at an informal dance. The courts will be put in first class condition, and as there are between forty and fifty players in the local club, a good match is looked for. Play will begin at 9 a. m. on Saturday morning.

MARYSVILLE NEWS.

The week of services at All Saints Church Trinity Sunday. The closing services of this highly successful week of religious effort will be held on Sunday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock, when, judging from the large attendance during the week, there will be a crowded congregation, weather permitting. The Rev. Dr. Duffy will preach on the Holy Trinity, and will give as an "instruction," the name "Jehovah," its etymology and historical significance.

The high order of the music will be maintained on this great festival of the Christian year under the direction of Professor Cadwallader. Mrs. John Black, who had given her rare musical talent so freely, will sing one of her beautiful solos. And we understand that Mrs. A. Pierce Crockett of St. John will take part in the service, and no doubt her numerous Marysville friends will be present to listen to her sweet rendering of sacred song. Mr. A. W. Coombes, the young baritone of St. Marys, will give "Nazareth" as an offertorium.

It is the universal feeling at Marysville that Rev. Dr. Duffy has been wisely guided in selection of time and mode of service, and that much good will result to the church and religion generally. We have heard the hope expressed that he may conduct another such series in the not distant future.

ST. MARY'S PARISH CHURCH.

Trinity Sunday.—This ancient festival of the Anglo-Celtic church will be specially observed at the 7 p. m. service. It was held as the Octave of Pentecost in the primitive church. In the Eastern church it has been known as "The Festival of the Holy Trinity." In the Roman church the Sundays till Advent are named Sundays after Pentecost. In the Anglican church they are called Sundays after Trinity. This kind of nomenclature was in existence in the British church prior to the coming of St. Augustine of Canterbury through St. Columba of Iona, Scotland, from St. Patrick, Apostle and first Bishop of Ephesus, the chief revealer of the doctrine of the Holy Trinity.

The Rev. Dr. Duffy announces a sermon to enquiring men especially who may have "honest doubt" on this Christian dogma. Mrs. John Black will sing a solo after the 3rd collect, and an offertorium at the close of the sermon. A very cordial invitation is given to men of a sceptical turn of mind.

The St. Mary's Young Men's Christian Society meets on Monday evening at 8 o'clock. An essay on "The Use and Abuse of Athletics" will be read by Mr. W. Bowden, to be followed by a discussion. Young men are affectionately invited and will be heartily welcomed.

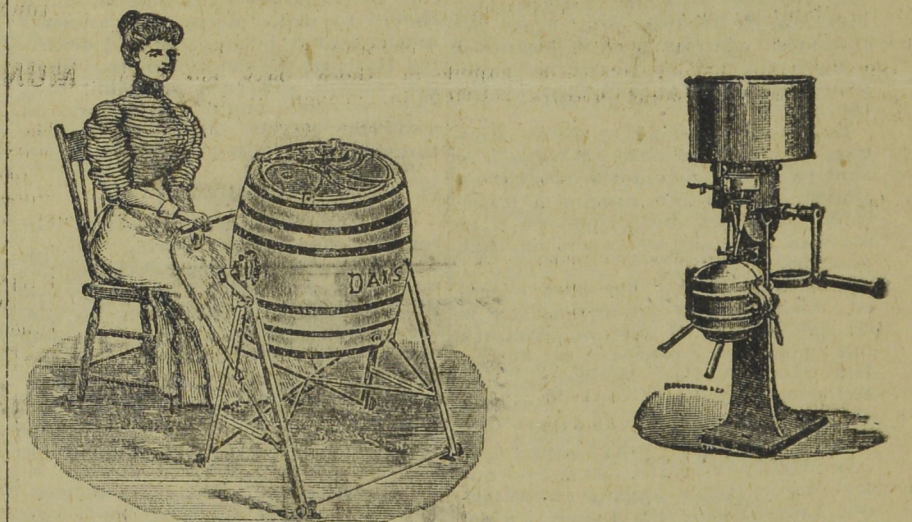
