Last year old Cy Young dumfounded the public by beating a club without a run or hit, only 27 men facing him in the nine innings, which means of course that that not a man reached first base.

In yesterday's game, Brown, who twirled for Chicago, also pitched ball that would win nine games out of ten, only one run being scored off him, and that in the last inning.

However, Hanlon upset that plan by turning the tables on the Denverite (some say, the referee helped him a good deal in his undertaking,) and Britt, who never loses sight of the commercial end of a prospective bout, realizing that there would be no great money in his fighting Hanlon again, called off the dog.

If Britt, however, is looking for a chance to make money, he can make a barrel of it by meeting and defeating Battling Nelson within the next few months. There is no doubt that the contest would draw far and away the biggest crowd that has turned out at San Francisco.

YOUNG CORBETT WON.

Butte, Mont., June 14.—After ten rounds of clever fighting "Young Corbett" of Denver was declared the winner over Maurice Thompson of Butte last night. Thompson lay on the canvas and was being counted out when his seconds threw up the sponge, and carried their man to his corner.

It was a good, clean fight and Thompson surprised even his friends when he knocked Corbett down in the second round. The little Denverite had rushed Thompson and was caught with a swing while off his balance. He was up in a second, however, and fighting back like a demon. Corbett carried the fight to his opponent in every round and landed some terrific swings that would have knocked out an ordinary man, but Thompson withstood them until the middle of the round.

Corbett made an excellent impression here and appeared like a champion in every round. He hooked and jabbed Thompson at will and drove him to the ropes on numerous occasions. His blocking was good and his feet work carried him out of danger. Several times he caught Thompson on the jaw with right and left swings and got away without a condition, he left the ring in the best of condition, he left the ring strong as when he entered it.

CAPT. HOOPER'S DEATH.

Former Resident of Fredericton—

Long Service in the British

Army.

The death occurred on Tuesday at Newark, N. J., after a lengthy illness of cancer, of Captain H. Filkes Hooper, a former resident of Fredericton.

The late Captain Hooper was a native of Albury, Eng., and was 64 years old. He served in the English army for 21 years, being connected with the 76th regiment. He was a retired officer, and for 24 years lived in Canada, the greater part of that time being spent in Toronto. He was also stationed in Fredericton with a regiment for a time, when he was a young man.

A widow, daughter of Arkdeacon Coster, and four sons and one daughter survive. The sons are: Louis Hooper of the Canadian Mounted Police, who served with the Strathcona horse in South Africa; Rev. E. B. Hooper, rector of St. George's Church, Moncton; Rev. J. Hugh Hooper, rector of the Church of England, Bathurst, and Basil, designer in the Mott Iron Works, New York. The daughter is Mrs. Wood, wife of Rev. E. J. Wood, late rector of the Church of England at Dorchester, and now at St. Ann, Maryland.

The deceased lived with his son, Basil, in Newark, but the last two summers he spent in Dorchester with

his daughter. The remains will be interred at Newark.

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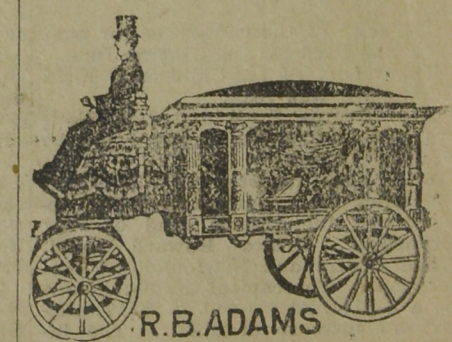
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
