ALIEN LABOR CASE.

Trial of Oldtown Canoe Co. vs. W. T. Chestnut Continued at St. John.

The first of the series of cases of the Oldtown Canoe Club vs. W. T. Chestnut of Fredericton, was continued before Judge Forbes at St. John, yesterday afternoon. It will be remembered that a detailed account of the nature of these cases, which are about eight in number, appeared in this paper some time ago. It is alleged by the prosecution that A. F. Ayer, an American citizen in their employ, was induced by Mr. W. T. Chestnut to leave them and go from Oldtown, Me., to Fredericton to work in Mr. Chestnut's canoe factory, lately established.

The following witnesses were examined yesterday: Joseph Rustin, customs house official at Edinborough, Me.; Geo. S. Richardson, manager and treasurer of the company at Oldtown, and Dudley Spenser of Argyle, Me.

Mr. Richardson was called yesterday to prove that he had made a copy of the voters' list with the town clerk at Edinborough, and produced the copy. He said that Alie F. Ayer as he was generally known, appeared on the list as Almond F. Ayer.

Dudley Spenser testified that he resided about two and a half miles from A. F. Ayer and was acquainted with all the Ayer family, among them Alie F. Ayer, whom he knew practically since Ayer's birth in Edinborough, Me. He did not remember in what year he was born, but told the court that he saw Ayer when he was but a child about one month old. He said that there were but three Ayers on the voters' list at Edinborough, and he was acquainted with all three.

As these were the only witnesses that the prosecution had to produce, Mr. R. B. Hanson, defendant's counsel addressed the court. He said that the prosecution had to prove:

First, that the person imported was an alien or foreigner.

Second, that the contract was made between the alien and the defendant, and that the alien was assisted in transportation or in some other way by the defendant.

Third, that A. F. Ayer is in the Province of New Brunswick at the present time.

Fourth, that W. T. Chestnut is a domicile resident of Fredericton.

Fifth, and the prosecution has not proved that the United States has not in force an act similar to the alien labor act of Canada.

He moved for a dismissal.

Fred Taylor, counsel for the prosecution, then addressed the court, and argued that he had made out his case if the court ruled that the defendant encouraged an alien by agreement or contract, express or implied, before Mr. Ayer had become a resident of Canada, to perform labor in Canada.

The court adjourned until this morning at 10.30 o'clock.

A despatch to the Herald this afternoon says: "The case is still before court. No judgment yet."

THE SCHOOL BOARD.

A Lot of Business Transacted at the Monthly Meeting.

The monthly meeting of the city school board was held yesterday afternoon and considerable business transacted.

Secretary Sampson submitted a report on the recent conference held by the trustees with the school committee of the city council, in regard to an increased grant to teachers. The mayor and aldermen expressed hearty sympathy with the movement, but as the assessment had been made up nothing could be done this year. It was promised, however, that the matter would receive attention next year.

The committee appointed to consider the advisability of amalgamating the schools at Marrisons Mills and Doak Settlement, submitted a report. The committee thought the scheme quite feasible, but it would necessitate building a wing on the Morrison's Mill school, and means would have to be found for conveying the pupils to and from Doak Settlement.

As the cost of transporting the children to and from the school would be quite heavy, the trustees decided to take no action at present.

A letter was read from Mrs. Geo. E. Coulthard stating that the Coulthard memorial medal had been ordered from a London silversmith, and would be in the hands of the secretary some time in June.

The secretary also read a letter from Dr. Inch stating that the governor-general's medal would be continued by the present incumbent, Earl Grey. The letter also stated that if the trustees preferred the prize would be in some other form, providing the cost did not exceed that of the medal.

The board decided that the medal was preferable to any other form of prize.

The teachers' salaries for the month were ordered to be paid, and the usual routine business was transacted.

BARNARD--YERXA.

The Youngest Daughter of the Hon. H. D. Yerxa Weds at Cambridge.

Memorial chapel. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Fred E. Marble, pastor of the North Avenue Baptist Church.

The bride's gown was white liberty satin trimmed with chiffon and rose-point lace. She carried a shower bouquet of white sweet peas. Mrs. Wm S. Youngman, sister of the bride, was matron of honor, and the bridesmaids were Miss Elsie Barnard, sister of the groom, Miss Alma Oswald, Miss Cora Patrick, Miss Frances Locke and Mrs. John Bridges. The attendants were gowned in white messaline and carried shower bouquets of pink sweet peas. The groomsmen were James Otis.

MR. SUTHERLAND'S WILL.

Disposes of an Estate Worth Nearly Half a Million—Gifts to Charity.

Woodstock, Ont., May 17.—The estate of Hon. James Sutherland amounts to between \$450,000 and \$500,000.

The executors are the Toronto General Trust, and H. A. Little, barrister, Mr. Sutherland's nephew.

Mr. Sutherland's sister, Mrs. John A. McKenzie, receives an income of \$150 a month. On her death, each of her children receives the sum of \$5,000.

Mr. MacKenzie receives the income of \$10,000, which is to be divided among the children on his death.

Minor bequests, amounting in all to \$5,000, are to be received by J. B. Hunter, Mr. Sutherland's late secretary, his nurse and others a long time in his employ.

The sum of \$20,000 is given to Woodstock hospital as an endowment fund; \$2,000 to Knox church; \$2,000 to Presbyterian Home Mission scheme, and \$1,000 to Aged and Infirm Ministers' fund.

His niece, Miss Mary Little receives the income of \$60,000.

The residue, including the residence, "Altadore," is left to Mr. Little.

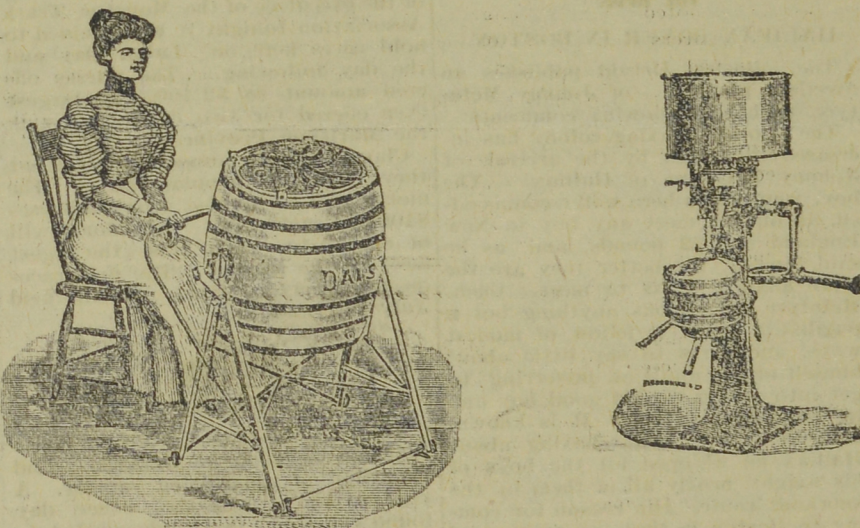

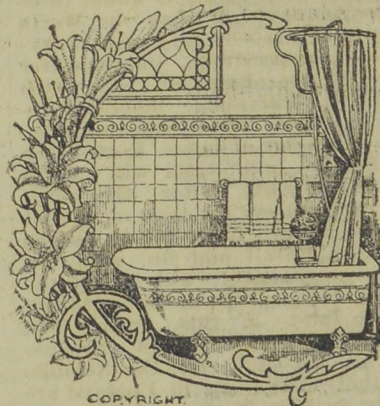
