A KESWICK BOY.

Appreciative Sketch of the Late Sterling A. Dunphy.

Whose Death in California Has Already Been Reported.

The Daily Press of Riverside, California, Feb. 1, publishes the following regarding the death in that city of Mr. Sterling A. Dunphy, formerly of Keswick, York county, son of Mr. Fred Dunphy, of that place:

Sterling Alton Dunphy gave up the bitter struggle with life at half past eight this morning and passed to that better land, where pain and sorrow and sickness are unknown. Congestion of the lungs and pleurisy were the causes of the young fellow's death, and his suffering during the later stages made his taking an immeasurable blessing. An acute attack of scarlet fever when he was a boy of ten left him with a hard cough, a cough which he could not rid, and which continually racked his frame and wore away his vitality. About Christmas time, during those sudden changes from rain to sunshine, he contracted a heavy cold in Pasadena. It settled to his lungs and turned into congestion, and three weeks ago he gave up business and came to Riverside to be beside and under the care of his favorite sister, Mrs. D. G. Clayton. His condition grew continually worse, though he fought off the end with his very last breath, never giving up, always cheerful, never with an outward show of pain, though suffering veritable torture within. He was conscious to the very end, speaking to his sister not two minutes before the spirit fled.

Sterling Alton Dunphy was born March 6, 1877, in Mouth Keswick, York County, New Brunswick. He was the only boy in a family of nine, the baby of the family and the particular pet and pride of his eight sisters, six of whom are living to mourn his death. In the fall of '97 he came to Riverside, seeking relief from the cough which was wearing away his life. He first associated himself with his cousin, G. W. Garcelon, in work on the ranch, but in less than four months he accepted a position in the Newberry grocery in Los Angeles and went to that city to live. He immediately won his way to a responsible position, having charge of the fruit department and the buying of all fresh fruit.

Last June he went East for a try three months visit to his home country, and on his return he was advanced to the position of traveling manager for the Newberry grocery, which position he held at the time of his retirement from active service, three weeks ago.

Sterling Dunphy was a young man

of genuine business ability, whose worth was truly attested by the regard in which he was held by his employer, and by the responsible positions he was called to fill. All with whom he came in contact liked him—liked him well and heartily, and especially with his old comrades in business, there is not one among them but mourns his loss as a true friend.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the First Baptist church, Rev. Dr. Taylor officiating. The young fellow was a member of Mojave Tribe of Red Men of Los Angeles, and the local order Hiawatha Tribe, will probably take charge of the cemetery rites. The pall bearers will be chosen from among his fellow-workers in Newberry's stores.

EXECUTED BY ACCIDENT.

Rope Gave Way and Rebound Broke Murderer's Neck.

Bridgeton, N. J., Feb. 16.—Frank Raisinger was hanged here today for the murder of his wife. The drop fell at 10.04. The rope broke and the body rebounded and the back of Raisinger's head struck a cross-beam of the scaffold and broke his neck. The physicians present that death was instantaneous. Raisinger was not officially pronounced until ten minutes later. When the rope separated Constable Tunny and others quickly caught the cord and lifted the body clear of the ground, but a quick examination by Dr. Stiles revealed the fact that the neck was broken, and it was therefore not necessary to raise the body again to the scaffold. Sheriff Dement said after the hanging that he was unable to account for the snapping of the cord, as it had been tested with a weight more than 100 pounds heavier than Raisinger's body. Raisinger made no statement on the scaffold, simply saying as he passed through the sheriff's office "Good-bye, boys."

The crime for which Frank Raisinger was convicted was the brutal murder of his young wife. On Oct. 18, 1904, Raisinger went into the kitchen where his wife was at work, and endeavored to caress her. She repulsed him, and Raisinger left the house. Later he returned and in order to protect herself Mrs. Raisinger seized a gun and threatened to shoot her husband. He again left the house, but quickly reentered his home, and, securing the gun, shot his wife. Death was not instantaneous, and Raisinger let another load of shot into the woman's body. He then arranged the body and clothing of Mrs. Raisinger to make it appear that she had been assaulted and murdered. Detectives, however, fastened the crime on Raisinger, who confessed.
