DEATH OF MRS. PASS.

One of Harvey's Pioneers Passes Away at Ripe Old Age.

Our Harvey Station correspondent writing Friday says:

"Mrs. Charlotte Pass, wife of William Pass, of Acton, died at her home there yesterday. She had been in failing health for some time, being well advanced in years. She was a daughter of the late John Coburn, and came with her parents from Northumberland, England, to Harvey, among the first settlers in 1837. Besides an aged husband she leaves three daughters, Mrs. Annie Grieve of this place, Mrs. George Grieve of Naimo, B. C., and Mrs. C. Quimby, who resides in the United States, and one son, Mr. James Pass of Acton; two brothers also survive, Mr. Andrew W. Coburn of Harvey, and Mr. Ralph Coburn, residing in British Columbia. Deceased was possessed of many admirable qualities and was much respected."

THE YORK HOTEL.

May be Leased by J. A. Scott of Springhill in a Short Time.

Mr. John A. Scott, who has been conducting a hotel at Springhill for some time, is negotiating with Messrs. Bridges and McEwen for a lease of the York Hotel, this city, with good chances of success. The present proprietors have a five years lease of the house, but it is understood they have submitted a proposition to Mr. Scott, which he is likely to accept. Mr. Scott's lease of the Springhill hotel expires next September, but if he obtains a lease of the York he will likely move to the city the 1st of May.

The Last Chance.

Monday next is the last day for the paying of taxes to enable citizens to have a vote at the approaching civic election. All those who fail to pay up on Monday will be published as defaulters in the civic blue book. The present indications are that the defaulters list will be a fairly large one, although there will be some bustling done on Monday to escape getting attached to it. A good many persons have paid their taxes during the past week and the number who declare that they never received a notice is surprisingly large.

Cause for Comment.

There has been a number of property transfers in the city during the past month and the great difference in nearly every case between the purchase price and the assessed values is causing no little comment. In one case a property entered on the assessment roll for \$6500 is said to have been sold for some \$2000 less, but in other cases the valuation of the board of assessors seems to have been well below the market. This state of affairs seems to be furnishing a strong argument in favor of a revaluation of city property.

A most enjoyable musical and literary program was carried out after which light refreshments were served.
